From the (Reedham) Rectory

Earlier this month every Parish in the Church of England received a letter from our two Archbishops, Justin Welby, Archbishop of Canterbury and John Sentamu, Archbishop of York. It was a letter concerning the General Election and encouraging us all to vote in the general election. I have always voted. I was brought up by a family that was evacuated from the Blitz in London during the war and, following that, my mother believed that everyone should be aware of the freedom they enjoyed; a freedom which others had fought and died to secure for them. She believed it was our duty to embrace that freedom by exercising our vote because we live in a democratic country. But I think you have probably heard quite enough about the election already so I will not add any more about it. See you at the Polls on June 8th!

This afternoon, as I write, it is far too nice a day to be concentrating on politics anyway. It is much more encouraging to watch the woodpecker picking out the insects from the old fallen apple tree in the Rectory Garden. The missing link: the 'lost' Roman building discovered at Reedham

The photo on the front cover shows massive stone blocks, resting on Roman mortar in a test pit just north of Reedham church tower – it appears we have at last found our lost Roman lighthouse! What follows is an extract of a press release from our chief archaeologist. To read the full report see the Facebook page of Reedham and District Local History and Archaeology Group – well worth looking at any way, or see the report on the display boards in the church.

'Geophysical survey using ground-penetrating radar inside the church and in the surrounding churchyard produced promising results which have been followed up with targeted, small-scale excavations. Two weeks ago two of these produced convincing evidence of a substantial Roman foundation running over a distance of over 23 metres more or less parallel with and adjacent to the north wall of the church and its great tower at its west end. One trench revealed a bed of mortar over a metre in width, the second, unworked blocks of stone, including the Leziante rock, resting on a similar bed of mortar, also over a metre in width. In neither trench was the full extent of these remains exposed. Trenches to the west of the tower revealed further evidence of foundations, but in these locations they had been completely robbed out. Although the excavation has yet to demonstrate their full width, the geophysical survey suggests that the foundations might have been as much two or even three metres in width.'

What can we deduce from these preliminary results? First, that the church of St John the Baptist is on the site of a substantial Roman building, the dimensions and scale of whose foundations already imply a defended or military structure rather than a domestic building such as a villa. Second, the overall dimensions, while indicating rather more than just a lighthouse, do not suggest a fort of any great size. Perhaps what we are looking at are the remains of a fortified watch tower (or burgus), with the tower at the west end of a small, rectangular, defended enclosure, capable of housing a small garrison. Such a structure can be compared with those found along the Rhine and Danube frontiers of the Roman empire in the third and fourth centuries. Later, in the late fourth century, a series of fortified signal stations is found in Britain along the Yorkshire coast. Our Reedham structure could have fulfilled most of the functions previously speculated: watch tower, lighthouse, signal station, watching over the then open water of the estuaries of the Bure, Yare and Waveney, and co-ordinating communications between other nearby, late Roman coastal forts at Caister and Burgh Castle and the fortified capital of the Icenii (Venta Icenorum), a dozen or so miles to the west.'

As at last we are getting some rain, we can apply some fertiliser to our flowers. A phosphate rich mixture, such as tomato fertiliser, will encourage flowers to bloom. Dead heading and watering frequently will also help, especially baskets and pots. We should think of bees and butterflies, as they prefer open and scented flowers, when we are planning our planting.

All vegetables can be planted out, providing mulch and fertiliser to beans, peas and leeks. They also need plenty of water.

Reedham Primary School calls out for votes to bag a share of bag charge fund

Reedham Primary School is bidding to bag a massive cash boost from the Tesco Bags of Help initiative.

Tesco teamed up with Groundwork to launch its community funding scheme, which sees grants of £4,000, £2,000 and £1,000 – all raised from the 5p bag levy – being awarded to local community projects.

Three groups in every Tesco region have been shortlisted to receive the cash award and shoppers are being invited to head along to Tesco stores to vote for who they think should take away the top grant.

Reedham Primary School is one of the groups on the shortlist. They are looking to completely redevelop their library area in school, making it a more comfortable and inviting place to relax and read in.

Chris Edwards, head teacher, is desperate to see the transformation. “As we are a very small rural primary school and in light of recent government cuts, we simply do not have enough money to redevelop our existing library area. We have been trying to raise money through our PFA and search out grants to help us but unfortunately these are harder to secure in times of austerity.

Securing a shortlisting in this scheme will help to dramatically improve our library area – one of the most important parts of the school. Our reading results have been very strong since I became head here just over three and a half years ago but this is in spite of the state of our library, not because of it. A vital cash injection will go a long way to improving the education of the children in our care even further. If we were lucky enough to secure the most votes in the scheme, then the transformation would be incredible, helping us to start improving the stock and quality of the reading books the children use as well.”

Olivia Brzeczek, head of the School Council and school librarian added, “I would love for our library to be more colourful and welcoming. We do our best to make it a nice area by putting up displays but we all know it looks really tired now. Hopefully people will get out and vote for us as it will make an enormous difference to our school.”

Voting is open in stores throughout May and June. Customers will cast their vote using a token given to them at the check-out in store each time they shop. Tesco's Bags of Help project has already delivered over £28.5 million to more than 4,000 projects up and down the UK. Tesco customers get the chance to vote for three different groups every time they shop. Every other month, when votes are collected, three groups in each of Tesco's regions will be awarded funding.

Lindsey Crompton, Head of Community at Tesco, said:

"We are absolutely delighted to open the voting for May and June. There are some fantastic projects on the shortlists and we can't wait to see them come to life in hundreds of communities."

Groundwork's National Chief Executive, Graham Duxbury, said:

"We've been thrilled to see the diversity of projects that have applied for funding, ranging from outdoor classrooms, sports facilities, community gardens, play areas and everything in between.

"We're looking forward to learning the results of the customer vote and then supporting each group to bring their project to life."
