View from the Pew

Greetings from St Edmund's

I'm writing this just a couple of days after celebrating Easter – and there are snow flurries in the air! It, sort of, sums up what a STRANGE YEAR we've all had but, at least this year, we were able to gather to worship on Easter Day – with all the hope the resurrection brings.

Acle Churches Together did meet, via Zoom, for a Lent Course which this year was based around the Diocese of Norwich's "40 words for 40 days". Each day a different word, with an accompanying picture, was presented to us, along with a reflection based on both word and picture – and proved to be, at once, enlightening and challenging in equal measure.

The pictures predictably included some depicting bible stories but included plenty from other sources like 'The Chronicles of Narnia' and 'Wind in the Willows' as well as flowers and wheat fields. The 'words' also varied widely – including quarantine, resilience, vaccine, justice, silence, laughter and sparrow as well as vulnerable, fear and betrayal.

Pictures and words – both provoked much discussion (in the breakout groups that I ended up in during the Zoom sessions), around a wide variety of topics. We may have started out our discussions from a Christian perspective but frequently, perhaps inevitably, we drifted into discussions on what was happening during the pandemic and its effect on our lives - and if, and when, we might return to something approaching our previously-established normality.

Of course we talked about Sir Tom and his amazing achievement in galvanising people, not only into giving in support of the NHS, but also into their own self-sacrificing acts of charity, as well as encouraging us to think beyond 'today' with his "Tomorrow is a good day" motto.

And we often found that we ended up, as in fact so often did the reflection of the day, on the theme of hope – sometimes, even in the most unlikely picture or word ('Bitterly' for example, with its picture of Peter sobbing as he snuck away following his denial of Jesus, encouraged us to see 'hope' in the stones at Peter's feet - pointing to the rock on which the church would be founded).

I'd just completed this 'letter' when the sad news of the death of Prince Philip was announced. He was an inspiration to many – he displayed, what I believe was, sincere and consistent commitment to God, Queen and Country and, through his (D of E International) Awards Scheme, provided much needed real hope to many thousands of young people throughout the Commonwealth.

So that is where I would like to close this message – on HOPE – hope that the hard-working emergency services might find their workload easing, hope that Government targets relating to vaccine roll-out will be met and, especially hope that all of you will enjoy easier days ahead.

Wishing you all, every blessing.

Rogation at Wickhampton

Not as well-known as Harvest Thanksgiving, but much older, **Rogation Days** are the weekdays leading up to Ascension Day (which this year falls on 13th May). In medieval times processions took place with the aim of driving out evil spirits from the parish; promoting reconciliation within the community; and seeking God's protection for the growing crops. The "bounds" (boundary) of the parish might be walked and "beaten" – helping to lodge it in people's consciousness. In more recent times, the season has been used to bless all human labour, not just working the land. Having been denied Plough Sunday this year, we will mark Rogation at Wickhampton in the 11am service on 9th May (all welcome: please book with a churchwarden). It would take a marshman to beat the bounds of that parish: given that and Coronavirus restrictions we will content ourselves (weather permitting) with blessing the crops from the churchyard.

Bee Lines in St Edmund's Churchyard

St. Edmund's Church is participating in Acle Parish Council's "Beeline" project: allowing wildflowers to grow throughout the season for the benefit of crucial pollinators and other insects, as part of a chain of such sites throughout the village. Two delineated areas of the churchyard have been selected : a central area without graves on the south side of the church; and reinstating a former "conservation area" between the Rectory drive and the church hall path. At the end of the season the areas will be cut by volunteers and the cuttings removed: over time this will suppress fertility and improve the flora. See

The Garden in May

13.

Look after your finished spring bulbs for next year. Once they've gone over, resist the temptation to cut back the foliage. Instead, let it die and break down on its own. This will give you an even better display next spring.

Optimise your watering regime — watering early and late to get the most out of your water — and start collecting and recycling water whenever possible.

Prune penstemons now — cut all the old shoots back to the base, providing there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves.

Tie in rambling and climbing roses. Laying the stems horizontally will help to produce more flowers.

Continue earthing up potatoes. Pinch out broad bean tips to deter blackfly. Harvest rhubarb, picking only one-third of the total amount of stems.

Have a wonderful time in your garden.

REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting held on Monday 12th April 2021 online via Zoom

There were 8 Councillors present, the Clerk, County Councillor Brian Iles, and District Councillor Grant Nurden. 4 members of the public were in attendance. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

There are 2 Councillor vacancies on the Council. The Council adopted a Co-Option Policy at the meeting in order to set a procedure for all co-options going forward. The document can be found on the website on the Policies page. If you are interested in becoming a Parish Councillor, or want more information on the role and responsibilities, please contact the Clerk.

County Councillor Brian Iles confirmed that he will be retiring as at the elections on the 7th May. He was thanked for his service and all that he has done for Reedham over the years.

District Councillor Grant Nurden reported that Broadland District Council is supporting the reopening of local businesses, providing materials (posters, 5m bunting, and floor stickers) and Covid safe certification for premises.

Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury gave the following report: There were no issues with the play equipment safety inspection for April.

The government Coronavirus restrictions relaxed today and the village hall gate was opened again. The village hall is still on target to open its doors on Monday 19th April. We have seen a growth in the use of our outdoor tennis court and new members.

The new disease resistant Elm tree was planted on 29th March on the playing field by John Fleetwood. The Elm tree was gifted by the Tree Council, to celebrate 30 years of the National Tree Warden Scheme. Our thanks to Jo, the tree warden, and her partner for their involvement in suggesting the village hall playing field, and Jo will also undertake the watering of the tree.

The WI contacted us to see if they could plant a tree also on the playing field in memory of people who have died of Covid. This tree is likely to be planted the end of this year or early next year. The tree will be a Walnut tree.

No planning applications were considered but 2 properties have changed their names:

- Tarn Hows will now be Tarn House, 22 Station Road, NR13 3TA
- 2 The Hills is now Avocet House, 2 The Hills.

The speed sensor was located at Newtown measuring vehicles leaving the village. The 85% centile was 43mph, with 4,700 vehicles travelling at between 40-45mph. This is the largest number of speeders recorded in any location.

In April it is located opposite the War Memorial measuring vehicles travelling up the hill. The last time it was positioned here the average speed was quite low, probably due to the number of parked cars vehicles have to navigate.

There are currently no plots available at the allotments but if you would like to go on the waiting list please contact the Clerk or any member of the Allotment Association. Details are on the website or allotment noticeboard.

Please remember to keep your dogs on a lead on the Permissive Path, and under control on all footpaths around the village. All dogs should be on a lead near livestock.

TUNSTALL CHURCH RECEIVES A LIFELINE GRANT FROM THE GOVERNMENT'S CULTURE RECOVERY FUND **15.**

The church of St. Peter and St. Paul, Tunstall, Norfolk, has received a financial boost from the government's £1.57 billion Culture Recovery Fund to fund roof repairs during the coronavirus pandemic.

Lifeline grants from the Culture Recovery Fund are designed to protect heritage sites and ensure that jobs and access to culture and heritage in local communities are protected during the months ahead.

Tunstall (Norfolk) Church Preservation Trust has been awarded nearly £24,000 for essential re-roofing work which will stop water penetration and more harm to the interior – especially erosion of the interior walls and plasterwork. The grant arrived at a crucial point because, if left much longer, damage to the much-loved church would have been beyond repair.

Grants of up to £25,000 are being allocated to cherished heritage sites, like St. Peter and St. Paul, across the country to cover urgently needed maintenance and repairs. This vital funding comes from a part of the Culture Recovery Fund called the Heritage Stimulus Fund and is administered on behalf of the government by Historic England.

As well as rescuing precious heritage buildings in need, the injection of cash will protect livelihoods for some of the most vulnerable heritage specialists and contractors working in the sector.

St. Peter and St. Paul's church is a listed building which dates from the early 14th century and continues to hold a valued place in the community. While the tower and nave have been a picturesque ruin for some 300 years, the chancel and vestry – the area to benefit from the repair and restoration work – have remained in constant use for services, latterly on traditional dates in the rural calendar and for occasional weddings and baptisms. Relatives of generations of local people buried in the graveyard (which is maintained by Halvergate PCC), plus regular walkers and those travelling the Weavers' Way make for a steady stream of visitors to this landmark site.

Robert More from Tunstall (Norfolk) Church Preservation Trust, custodians of St. Peter and St. Pauls, said: "We are delighted to receive this funding from the Culture Recovery Fund. It makes possible the work needed, using a local contractor, to preserve the church – a place of worship held dear in the community and a place of history attracting many to it from far and wide. We are able also now to consider additional uses of the building and further extend its reach."
