We in Acle are going to be getting to know some new names: Kemp Avenue, Cavell Road, Nichols Grove ... - street names in the "St. Edmund's Park" estate. They're not really new, but old: the names of notable Norfolk women, I gather. Some (like the first two) I recognise; others not. Perhaps they should be more familiar: I should do some homework. Whether that theme will be widely appreciated, time will tell. The penchant for naming streets after people doesn't necessarily honour them for very long. For me, Habgood was an Archbishop of York: I don't suppose that's the reference for the Close in Acle. It works best if there is some connection with the location: mills on the marshes perpetuating the names of their marshmen; or the farming connections of Englands Road or Daniels Close. The latter is in the "Oaks Meadow" estate, where the other names (Poppy, Daisy, Primrose ...) smack of the desire of developers for an association with rural features which, if they ever existed there, they have just obliterated with tarmac and concrete! (E.g. Yarmouth's "The Grayling" pub pictures a butterfly which you certainly won't find fluttering around Tesco car park). Contrast these artificial names with ones which live on even after the original feature has gone, or other names have been substituted (Stracey Arms comes to mind).

In the Hebrew Bible, names, of places and people, are often significant, intimately connected with their subject. The name can stand for the whole (as in *Hallowed be thy name*); or signify some characteristic (Jacob, grasping his brother's heel). New names are often bestowed by God (Jacob becomes Israel) indicating a change in status or the conferring of a blessing. In the New Testament, people sometimes have more than one name: often one Hebrew and one Greek: the Pharisee Saul becomes Paul – the Christian apostle to the Gentiles, circulating in the Greek-speaking world. Contrary to past popular belief, baptism isn't a naming ceremony; but it is possible to take an additional name, signifying a new (Christian) identity.

Conducting marriages, I often deal with someone who has changed their name at some point – which can complicate the paperwork! But it's a sign of the significance of a name. People can be known by more than one name – including those with names in other languages which we find difficult. It's not unusual, I observe, for natives of Norfolk to have more than one name. Irrespective of the name given at birth, family, friends or work-colleagues decided at some point to bestow a new name (e.g. Bubbles, Manny) – which stuck. Sometimes the "real name" only emerges when they go into hospital, or die (a man I knew as Dick turned out to be Basil William Charles). Or perhaps I should say "official name" – for our "real name" ought to be the one used by those who know us as we really are, whatever our official label.

That's how God knows each of us – by name: the name which says who we truly are. But as he works on us and shapes our lives, he's open to bestowing on us a new name, forging a new identity and opening up new possibilities.

- It was with sadness that we learnt of the death of Valerie Knights (funeral: I Iam, Friday 29th April at St. Andrew, North Burlingham). She was a significant figure in the local area: founder of Acle Voluntary Aid; long-standing churchwarden of St. Andrew's Church; attending accidents at the crossroads outside her house; and with a wealth of entertaining local stories to tell in the Norfolk dialect, naturally. No doubt many stories will now be told about her, as we remember her with fondness and celebrate her legacy.
- We also lost Don Edwards of Halvergate another appreciated local figure. There was no funeral service, because, like Josey, he donated his body to medical science. But a thanksgiving service is being planned for 10th May at 2.30pm at Halvergate Church.
- Christian Aid Week runs from Sunday 15th Saturday 21st May. In Acle we will deliver donation envelopes to as many houses in the village as we can: please help if you are able. Donations can then be dropped off at church services, Wilkerson's Hardware, The Rectory, and other designated addresses around the village. REEDHAM PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting held on Monday 7th March 2022 in the Village Hall.

There were I I Councillors present, the Clerk, District Councillor Grant Nurden, County Councillor Lana Hempsall and 3 members of the public. The meeting commenced at 7.30pm

The meeting held a minute's silence in respect of the people of Ukraine.

Broadland District Council will not be increasing their share of the Council Tax, or the charge for garden waste collections. Business Support Grants for this financial year are still available. Please see their website for further details.

Norfolk County Council will be increasing their portion of the Council Tax 2.99%. Reorganisation of Council Services has enabled an additional £11m investment in Child Services and £29m in Adult Social Care. A £6,000 investment in electric vehicle charging points at the village hall is awaiting approval.

Chairman of the Village Hall Committee Chris Bradbury gave the following report:

There were no issues with the play equipment safety inspections for February and March.

Reedham and District WI planted a walnut tree on the playing field yesterday, in memory of all those who lost their lives due to Covid 19.

To commemorate the Platinum Jubilee on the 2nd June we will be lighting a beacon on the playing field at 9:45pm. The Stage School Children and Adult Drama will be coming together to perform the new Commonwealth song "A Life Full of Grace". More information will be available after the next CA meeting.

The Broadland Tree Warden Network are providing a free oak tree to be planted for the Jubilee. The next film showing will be on the 8th April at 7.30pm and will be "House of Gucci".

The February Cash Bingo jackpot wasn't won, the jackpot stands for March at £260 in 51 numbers or less.

We have an Easter Egg Hunt on Sunday 10th April at 1:30pm to 3:30pm. £2 per child. One application for the vacant Parish Councillor position was received. Lesley George was unanimously co-opted on to the Council.

- 2 planning applications were considered:
 - a) 20220174 proposed new agricultural grain store at Hill Farm, The Hill, Limpenhoe, NR13 3HT. The Council resolved no objections, with 2 abstentions.
 - b) BA/2022/0048/FUL retrospective change of use to domestic curtilage and erection of a close boarded timber 6ft boundary fence at Nelsons Cottage, 38B Riverside, NRI3 3TE. Surprise was expressed that a planning application was required for a fence. Cllr Barnes explained that because part of the fenced off garden was actually deemed Highways land it was simpler to submit a planning application than to apply for a Stopping Up Order. The Council resolved no objections.

The speed sensor was located on Mill Road approaching the school in February. The 85% centile was 27.5mph, a very slight reduction, from 27.9mph, on the previous time. 8,000 vehicles were recorded with only 200 vehicles travelling between 30-35mph.

The Council approved the purchase of 2 new litter bins to be located on the junction of Mill Road and Church Road, and outside the Station.

Please consider using the bottle banks at Riverside and the Village Hall. Proceeds from claiming recycling credits from Norfolk County Council go towards helping the Village Hall.

From Yeoman Farmers to Lords Cricket Ground/The Edrich Family

The highlight of April's meeting of the Acle and District's 49 Club, chaired by John Harris, held at St Edmund's Parish Hall, was a fascinating talk by Acle resident Rodney Edrich

about the Edrich family.

By the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries the Edrich family had become very well established in Norfolk and by the eighteenth century had become confined to East Norfolk in parishes such as Irstead, Barton Turf, Horning, Neatishead and eventually in Lingwood, Blofield, South Burlingham and other nearby parishes.

Henry Edrich who died in 1881 was one of the county's leading drovers. The cattle drovers travelled all the way down the east coast from Scotland to Smithfield. Money made from the sale of animals was often used to rent or purchase more land for both grazing and forage crops. Henry Edrich of the Manor Farm, Blofield, played cricket for Burlingham during the 1870s, developed an interest in the game and fathered thirteen children consisting of nine sons and four daughters. He encouraged all of his children to take an interest in the game. His eldest son produced four sons who went on to play first class cricket, including W.J (Bill) who played for Middlesex and England. A younger son, Fred, had a son John who played for Surrey and England.

In 1931 there was a first attempt to produce an All Edrich XI and this was followed by another in 1938. After the War as the cricketing excellence of the Edrich family was recognised nationally, matches were played at Lakenham, then headquarters of Norfolk Cricket, and Ingham village, east of Stalham, against Norfolk and then the Lords Taverners teams of celebrities. The money raised from these events was donated to the National Playing Fields Association.

The Garden in May - Reedham Gardening Club

Look after your finished spring bulbs for next year. When they stop flowering, spread them through borders or plant up a container for next year's displays.

Optimise your watering regime, watering early and late to get the most out of your water and start collecting and recycling water whenever possible.

Prune Penstemons now; cut all the old shoots back to the base, providing there is new growth at the bottom of the plant. If there are no new shoots at the base, cut just above the lowest set of leaves.

Tie in rambling and climbing roses. Laying the stems horizontally will help to produce more flowers.

Continue earthing up potatoes. Pinch out broad bean tips to deter blackfly. Harvest rhubarb, picking only one-third of the total number of stems.
