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

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## Dear Friends,

Here we are in summer! As I write this (19 May) the sun has been shining gloriously recently and I hope it continues to do so. We all need the sun to lift our spirits.



We continue to have good relations with our Christian friends in the other churches in Stalybridge and we all come together to celebrate our Whitsuntide Walk of Witness on Sunday 8 June in Armentieres Square. I hope that the sun comes out for us then, too! We have been asked to keep in our prayers all the churches in our town, and especially to remember the Revd Alessandra Di Chiara, who is the priest-incharge at St James, Millbrook and also at All Saints Micklehurst, the Revd Karen Hilsden from the Methodist Church and the Revd Jennie Wakefield as she retires from the Baptist Church where she has done sterling work and where she will be sadly missed. Along with me, I'm sure you all will want to wish her a very long, happy and healthy retirement and that God will continue to bless the Baptist church on Ambleside.

In the morning service of the same day, members from our church who have been part of the group reading the *Bible in a Year*, will tell us about the challenges, opportunities and faith that they have encountered as they have met together to discuss, with each other, their own particular experiences.

June is also the month when we celebrate the Anniversary of the consecration of our present building which, this year, will be 174 years old. As is common with older things (and people!) they start to show their age, a fact to which I can personally testify. We have recently had ingress of water into the church from two different directions – the ceiling and a burst radiator. At the moment we don't know what damage may have been caused, and I trust it might not be too much.

As we approach Anniversary Sunday, our first priority is that we must give thanks to God for his continued presence with us as we all walk the path of faith together. It also gives us a chance to tell other people about our faith and why we come to church – to tell of the love of Jesus and what he does for each of us; how he died for

each one of us and how we put our trust in him. This must be at the heart of our weekly attendance at St George's.

It was decided at the PCC Meeting in April that we should have a gift day on Anniversary Sunday and that you might like to think of it as *Give a birthday present to the church*. It would be wonderful if we could meet our target, as we managed to do last year, of paying our Parish Share in full, and meeting our other commitments, but there is still a long way to go. We need to raise approximately £65,000 per year to pay our way.

But it mustn't be all about money, which is why we're also trying to nurture more social gatherings. These have lapsed over recent years as people's lives and commitments become more demanding, but we should not neglect the chance to spend time together in friendship and fellowship. The choir did us proud with their recent quiz which was held on 9 May and we propose to continue to develop these with our second quiz which will begin at 8.00pm on 21 June. I hope you will be able to come along and tax your brains. Further events are also planned, and in the pipeline, and we will be able to tell you more about these as the year progresses.

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## The New Seekers 'Read the Bible in a Year' Group

Our monthly meeting was held in the Lounge on Monday 28th April with nine New Seekers attending. After an opening prayer we began discussing the things we have discovered during the past four weeks as our attention has turned to Deuteronomony and Joshua in the Old Testament, several Psalms, verses from Proverbs and the Gospel of Luke in the New Testament.

We noticed that Jesus often acts in a very forceful and authoritative way, not exactly the 'Gentle Jesus, meek and mild' from our Sunday School days. He has to be firm on many occasions, especially when dealing with the religious leaders of the time. We also felt that the books we are reading in the Old Testament is like an early version of the Citizen's Advice Bureau as it covers all manner of things that were happening to the Israelites at that point in their history. They were brutal times, too, with many a battle going on where the Lord has to deal harshly with the inhabitants of the land He had promised to His people. We felt sorry for Moses, however, as he wasn't allowed to enter the promised land due to his disobedience years earlier.

We are also finding many verses in the Old Testament are quoted in the New Testament, particularly by Jesus, for example when He is being tempted in the wilderness by Satan, Jesus quotes, 'Man shall not live by bread alone, but by every work that proceeds from the mouth of God'. This is found in Deuteronomy 8:3. It's like recognising an old friend when these verses crop up. There are many occasions, too, when visual aids are useful in understanding truths about the Kingdom of God. In Luke 6:3 Jesus says that God will give us a '...good measure; pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap.'

The book of Proverbs continues to give us many useful verses to guide us in the way we should live e.g. Proverbs 12:9 'Better to be a nobody and yet have a servant than pretend to be somebody and have no food.' Finally we discovered that meditating on a verse of scripture is rather like placing the verse on the tip of your spiritual tongue and slowly sucking from it the refreshment it contains.

On 8th June (Whit Sunday) we shall be sharing with our church family at St. George's some of the things we have discovered during the first six months and hopefully we can say what has challenged us from the Bible, what has encouraged us from the Bible and what we have most enjoyed up to now. Please contact me if you would like any further information about the New Seekers and any comments you would like to make would be gratefully received. Our next meeting will be Monday, 26th May (even though its a Bank Holiday there will still be a meeting) and the following Monday, 2nd June as well to finalise our contribution to the 8th June service.

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

However the day before, Lee had to drop out through injury and his Son Thomas who had run very little in his 15 yrs, stepped in. Nevertheless, Becky and I finished in position No. 20,148 and 20,149. My worst ever finishing place in any sport by thousands of places but probably one of my best and most worthwhile endeavours.

After a McDonalds and drink or two, we went home managing to get a much needed seat this time on the train. I then noticed that the seats were very comfortable---something you may soon experience on our church pews in the not too distant future. In addition to our church which will benefit from around £500 from church members/friends, I also raised over £200 on-line from non-church members which has gone to our local Willow Wood Hospice. 
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## **DO YOU WANT A CHALLENGE**

## Saint of the Month 22 June Alban, first Martyr of Britain, c.250

Records of Christians living in Britain have been found as early as the second century, and in 314 three 'British' bishops attended a council in Arles, a city in the south of France.

Alban, held to be the first British martyr, has traditionally been regarded as having being martyred in the Diocletian persecution of 303. But his death is more likely to have occurred in the reign of either Septimius Severus c.209, or Decius c.250.

Alban was a Romano-British pagan living in Verulamium, known today as St Albans, Hertfordshire. He met a fugitive priest and gave him shelter in his home. Alban was so struck by the way of life and the commitment of the priest that in time he was converted to the faith. When soldiers came searching for the fugitive Alban disguised himself in the priest's cloak and was arrested and condemned to death. The priest was subsequently arrested and stoned to death some days later.

Holmhurst Hill, where Alban's martyrdom is traditionally located, became the site first of a shrine and then of a church dedicated to his memory. By the Middle Ages this church had grown into the Abbey of St Albans and is now the cathedral of the diocese which bears his name.

Bede, writing in the early eighth century, recorded the torture and trial of Alban. He mentions the crowds at his execution, a spring of water rising up at his feet at the top of a hill, and the miraculous conversion of the appointed executioner. Bede also records that his executioner was unable to see the death of Alban, as the instant he beheaded him his own eyes fell out.

Saint Alban suffered on the twenty-second day of June near the city of Verulamium ...Here, when the peace of Christian times was restored, a beautiful Church worthy of his martyrdom was built, where sick folk are healed and frequent miracles take place to this day.
