



it possible, once again, for us to pay our Parish Share in full. This is the second year running that, together, we have mastered this onerous but important aspect of our Christian giving and it couldn't have been achieved without our strong volunteer force who work with such enthusiasm and give innumerable hours of their time, in so many ways, to our church.

After the ingress of water on the north side of the building last May, we have now had the ceiling and wall re-plastered and both the north and south walls re-painted. For this we had to call in 'the professionals' and our grateful thanks go to Dave Etches and to Brian Allsopp and their crews for an excellent job.

During the first week of January a new carpet is being laid throughout church and. again, many thanks for all your donations. This means that the internal fabric of our building is in excellent order for the start of 2015, the year marking the 175th Anniversary of St George's Church, which was dedicated on 24 June 1840. Our parish, however, goes back much further than that.

The actual parish of St George, dates back to the year of 1776 when it was consecrated in July as the "Chapel of St. George in Staley Bridge within Ridgehill and Lanes in the parish of Ashton underlyne" (sic). This title of St. George was never used and the Chapel was only referred to in documentation as "The Chapel of Ease, Staley Bridge". You will know it as Old St George's, or the church on Cocker Hill.

After 239 years of history, of there being a place of worship in Stalybridge, you might very well expect that there have been some disagreements between clergy and laity, and you wouldn't be wrong, but you can read all about this in Paul Denby's book, *Two Into One Will Go.* This book was written to mark the 150th

Anniversary in 1990 and we still have some for sale at £2.95. Please see one of the wardens or myself if you would like a copy—it makes for some interesting reading, especially during the earlier years of both parishes of Old and New St George.

So what celebrations are we planning for our 175th (or 239th) Anniversary? We have many ideas which, hopefully, will come to fruition as the year progresses. Our first event, in what we hope will be a year of renewal and wonderful times together, will be a Sunday Lunch to which you are all invited. This will take place on Sunday 8 February 2015 at Stamford Golf Club from 1.30 p.m. There will be a list in the lounge for you to sign up for this special meal and I do hope that as many as possible will be able to come along. If you have no transport, then please have a word with me, and we will arrange lifts for you.

The Bishop of Middleton will be presiding and preaching on Anniversary Sunday which will be celebrated on 21st June. Following the service we will have a Bring and Share Lunch where people will get an opportunity to chat with him. Hopefully, possibly that same weekend, we will hold a celebration concert of 'homegrown' talent, If you have a special party piece that you would be prepared to perform at the concert, then please let me know as soon as possible so we can get an idea of an outline programme.

Over that Anniversary weekend, there will be an opportunity to come along to church and look up baptism and marriage records and dig into your family history, when we will have the old registers open for you to peruse.

We are also planning a Bavarian Night, and other similar events over the year, besides our regular quiz nights which are proving very popular (next one is January 31st), So lots to look forward to.

May I wish you all a very happy and healthy year in 2015 as we move forward with hope and prayer to face whatever opportunities God presents to us.

SENIOR CITIZENS' PARTY





Saint of the Month 28 January Thomas Aquinas, Priest, Philosopher, Teacher of the Faith, 1274

Thomas, was born in Roccasecca, in the Aquino county of the Kingdom of Sicily (present-day Lazio region, Italy, about 80 miles southeast of Rome) in 1225, and was the

youngest son of the Count of Aquina. He was, by all accounts, a large man, who moved slowly and serenely through his daily tasks. He studied at Naples University and his fellow students christened him the 'dumb Ox'.

In 1224 Thomas joined the Order of Preachers, otherwise known as the Dominican Friars. At this time the Dominicans were spreading rapidly throughout Europe, and in particular focusing their work within the universities. The Dominicans were a relatively new order, and Thomas' family would have preferred him to join the more established Benedictine order, membership of which opened doors into influential positions in society. In response to his decision to join the Dominicans, Thomas' family kidnapped him in an attempt to make him change his mind. Although they detained him for two years they were unsuccessful.

Thomas also studied at Paris and Cologne, returning to Paris to lecture in 1252. From that time on he taught in both Paris and Italy until he died in 1274. He wrote 'Summary against the Gentiles' between 1252 and 1255, and in 1266 began his most famous work, Summa Theologiae, in which he considered key aspects and doctrines of Christianity.

A clear challenge which faced Thomas was whether to integrate or challenge the philosophy of Aristotle which had begun to enjoy a resurgence in the universities. Thomas chose to integrate the philosophy, and combined Aristotle's teaching with Catholic doctrine, basing his theological considerations on an Aristotelian framework. Unsurprisingly his views aroused passions and debate, and did not go unopposed. Indeed after his death some of

his teachings were relegated or ignored, and it was not until recent centuries (especially since Vatican II) that he has become more widely appreciated.

Thomas is well known for his teaching on the Eucharist in which he defended the doctrine of the Real Presence of Christ. His understanding of Christ continuing the work of redemption through the sacraments was highly influential for the development of Catholic ecclesiology and doctrine.

On 6 December 1273, Thomas announced that he would write no more, and that all he had written was straw. The reasons for this are unclear. It may have been the result of either an immense spiritual experience, or simply a breakdown from overwork. A prayer attributed to Thomas reveals the motives and desires of this forward-looking theologian:

Most loving Lord, grant me a steadfast heart which no unworthy desire may drag downwards; an unconquered heart which no hardship may wear out; an upright heart which no worthless purpose may ensnare. Impart to me also, O God, the understanding to know you, the diligence to seek you, a way of life to please you, and a faithfulness that may embrace you, through Jesus Christ my Lord.

Amen.

May his prayer be ours also.
