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

Our lead article this month has been written by Alan Smith and gives a detailed account of the renovation work which commences this month. Many thanks to Alan for his extensive work on our behalf in the carrying out of this project.

OUR CHURCH ROOF PROJECT

This month will see the start of our long-awaited Roof and Gutter Renovation Project. After several years chasing funding to help repair our 175 year old Church fabric, we finally received a grant, early last year, of £87,800 from the 'Listed Places of Worship Roof Repair Fund'. This money, together with about £6000 from our own Restoration Fund, was intended to pay for relining the gutters as the first stage of the repairs. Unfortunately, our church architect retired at this time, so the PCC had to appoint a new, suitably qualified architect to progress the project. His first task was to carry out our Quinquennial Inspection and also to prepare the detailed drawings and specifications needed to carry out the project. It proved necessary also, to involve the assistance of a timber consultant and a structural engineer to determine the full extent of the work needed. It turned out that the parapets were bowed and insecure, particularly on the south side, and there was some timber damage due to damp. The architect pointed out that, because of the additional parapet renovation work needed, and possible remedial work on purlins etc. the quotes may be higher than the grant allocation that we had been awarded. Where this had happened to other churches, the project had been broken down into logical phases, with the remaining work spread over several separate claims and this is what we decided to do. The breakdown of our work will be something like:

First phase – Renew south gutter, parapet and rainwater goods
(work against current grant)

Later phases – Renew north gutter and re-slate north roof to ridge,
Re-slate south roof to ridge.
Re-slate sanctuary roof and repair both vestry roofs.
Renovate tower parapet and roof lead

So what does this mean for St Georges? The work is due to start on 11th April, but we will be continuing with all of our usual activities throughout the whole of the ten weeks of the renovation work, including services, weddings etc., the uniform group activities and the tiny tots, as well as holding the Spring Fair on the 14th of May.

As to the work itself, outside there will be scaffolding along all the south side of the church, plus a contractor's cabin located next to the tower, tucked round the corner. Inside the church, there will be end to end scaffolding over all the south (Lady Chapel) side, including over the Vicar's vestry. The scaffolding will be screened off from floor to ceiling with white sheeting. There will also be screened-off scaffolding along the bar side of the upper hall, so we will not be able to use the area along that side.

The renovation project itself involves removing plaster from the top of the inside walls to get at the beam ends and repair/replace them. At the same time, the parapet will be dismantled, section by section, the gutter relined, then the parapet rebuilt and secured in place with rods. The bottom three courses of roof slates will be renovated at the same time. Finally, the rainwater downspouts will be replaced with bigger diameter pipes which will take twice the water flow of the existing ones, and the tops will be fitted with overflows. Drawings of the planned work are on display in the church lounge.

For Phase Two, we expect to do the same work to the north parapet, and for this we will have to apply for a further grant and also raise a further £6000 to make up our share of the cost. There is still a lot to do, but this is the start to make our church sound and water tight for the next 50 years.



Saint of the Month
29 April Catherine of Siena,
Teacher of the Faith, 1380

Born at Siena in Italy in 1347, Catherine was the 23rd of 25 children. From an early age she was known to want to lead a life of prayer and penance, despite opposition from her parents and family. She refused marriage, and instead, opted for a life of solitude. She joined the

Dominican order as a Tertiary (lay volunteer) at the age of 16. She lived in solitude for three years, until she felt a call to leave her seclusion and care for the poor.

As Catherine became involved for caring for the sick, a diverse group of followers, both men and women, clerical and lay, gathered around her. This group soon became known for their desire for reform of the Church, their call for a life of total devotion to God, and their focus upon the crucified Christ. Unsurprisingly this group attracted criticism as well as praise wherever they went.

Catherine was a great correspondent, but had to dictate all her letters as she never learned to write herself. She wrote a 'Dialogue' in which explained her beliefs and expounded the sense of devotion to the crucified Christ, that so ordered her life. This work was dictated to others when she was in a state of prayer and ecstasy.

Eventually, as her calls for reform went unheeded, Catherine became more and more involved in the political life of the Church. She acted as a peacemaker between Church and State when relationships deteriorated. The schism of 1378, when rival popes were elected after the death of Gregory XI, saw Catherine attempting to intervene and bring clarity to the situation. She supported Urban as the genuine Pope, although she was not unafraid to challenge him on his more extreme and unbending attitudes to the Avignon papacy.

She died, of a stroke in 1380, before the papal split was resolved. Her devotion to Christ is evident throughout her 'Dialogue':

The soul begins to lose fear, knowing that fear alone is not sufficient to give eternal life. And so the soul proceeds, with love, to know itself and God's goodness

within, and begins to take hope in God's mercy in which the heart feels joy. Sorrow for grief, mingled with the joy of hope in mercy, causes the eye to weep, and these tears issue from the very fountain of the heart.
