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

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Come Together

On Tuesday, 1st May 2018, the Come Together group was formed. It resulted from the Time and Talents forms that were filled in by our congregation as part of our Mission Action plan, where people stated what they could offer to enhance our fellowship.

The format of the Come Together sessions was based on the kind of activities people suggested on the forms and we tried to cover as many interests as possible. This resulted in the following structure:

1st and 3rd Tuesdays 'Singing for Pleasure' plus Bible Study

2nd and 4th Tuesdays 'Craft' and informal natter time

Each session has refreshments half way through and there is no charge as its all free and open to anyone and everyone.

The Singing for Pleasure started rather tentatively at first with a warm up of our voices followed by a general sing song of well known pieces. This has since developed into more of a gospel focus with many songs now in 2 or 3 part harmony. We have had the privilege of sharing a couple of these items in the morning service on special occasions, where we have been joined by our Junior Church children. These have been very well received and we hope there will be further opportunities to share items in the future.

The first of the Bible Study series focused on the Armour of God (Ephesians chapter 6 verses 10 - 17) and we looked at each piece of armour to explore the meaning of how each part protects us against spiritual assault. This proved to be very challenging and rewarding as we encouraged each other to make sure we are equipped to face whatever lies ahead for us in our day to day lives as Christians in the 21st century.

We are currently studying the book of 1 Peter which covers such topics as having good reason for hope, living as God's holy people and not letting suffering take us by surprise.

We are also being challenged to learn verses from the Bible by heart in order that our witness to others may be more effective and to build up our confidence when sharing our faith.

The intervening weeks have given the group the chance to make props for Junior Church, cards, poppies etc. in a relaxed and caring atmosphere of fun and friendliness together with the additional benefit of free refreshments.

As you can see, the Come Together group is now an established weekly church activity and although the numbers are relatively small at present we know that each time we meet God blesses us richly with his presence and love. The only time there isn't a session is if there are 5 Tuesdays in the month then we cancel the 5th one.

May I take this opportunity to invite anyone who may be reading this article to come and give it a try if you are free any Tuesday afternoon from 1.00 - 3.00pm and you would be most welcome.

Holy Days or Holidays?

Some porters were hired to carry a group's possessions on a trip through the jungle. The pace quickly increased until the head porter called a halt: *'We've come so far, so fast we need to take a break and allow our souls to catch up with our bodies!'*

How often do we feel like this? July is a month when many of us take a break. Jesus and His disciples often took time to withdraw from the crowds: *'because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, He said to them, 'Come with Me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest.'* (Mark 6: 31,32).

Jesus saw how tired and stressed His disciples were and wanted to give them a break from their busy lives. He loved them and cared about their wellbeing. He longs to do the same with us, so we can restore the balance of work, rest and play in our lives. Going on holiday or taking time off gives us an opportunity of letting go the burdens of everyday life and renewing our rest in Him. This enables us to entrust Jesus with our issues and concerns, as we take time aside declare a *holy day or holiday!*

The story is told of the aged Apostle John playing with doves. A passing hunter expressed surprise at what a man as pious as John was doing. John pointed to the bow in the hunter's hand and asked him why he carried it with a loosened string. The hunter replied, *'it loses its strength unless it is given the chance to unbend'. John replied, 'why are you surprised that a servant of Christ should not relax to keep himself stronger for his work?'*

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Saint of the Month
Thomas More, Scholar,
Reformation Martyr 1535

The accounts of Thomas More's happy home life at Chelsea, recorded after his death by his son-in-law Will Roper, the growth in More's popularity following his canonization by Pope Pius XI in 1935 and Robert Bolt's 1960 play *A Man for All Seasons*, with its widely popular film version, have left a delightful but anachronistic picture of an enlightened twentieth-century family man trapped in the political bear garden that was Tudor England.

The real Thomas More was born in London in 1478, the son of a judge, and educated at Oxford and Lincoln's Inn. Called to the Bar in 1501, elected to Parliament in 1504 and appointed under-sheriff of London in 1510, the young More was left a widower with four small children. He subsequently married Alice Middleton, a widow, to provide his children with a mother. An articulate Renaissance humanist, More's best known work was *Utopia* (1516), a satirical account of life on the fictitious island of Utopia where conditions there are contrasted favourably with those of contemporary English society. Encountering the growing force of the Reformation, More had no sympathy with either the Reformers or their beliefs. He endorsed the burning of heretics and conducted an acrimonious pamphlet war with William Tyndale.

More came to the attention of Henry VIII and the two men became friends, the king greatly valuing More's company, conversation and advice. More's rise in the royal favour was indicated by his becoming a member of the Privy Council in 1518 and being knighted in 1521. Two years later he became Speaker of the House of Commons and in 1529 Lord Chancellor, the first layman to hold the post. His fortunes changed, however, when he refused to support Henry's divorce from Catherine of Aragon, his religious principles making him unwilling to support any defiance of the Pope. He resigned from the Chancellorship in 1532 and withdrew from public life at great personal financial cost.

But a private life did not exempt More from the requirements of the 1534 Act of Succession and he refused to take the accompanying oath since it would have involved a rejection of papal authority. After a trial at Westminster Hall, More was condemned to death and was beheaded on Tower Hill on 6 July 1535, declaring himself on the scaffold to be 'the King's good servant, but God's first'.







A Grand Day Out.

June the 6th this year marked the 75th Anniversary of D-Day. But it also marked the day that Wingco Brian Reynolds became one of those magnificent men in a flying machine.

Brian had invited me as Tail End Charlie, to travel with him to Wellingborough where we stayed at a hotel just a few miles from Sywell Aerodrome. The airfield is set in the heart of Northamptonshire.

Sywell is one of the best General Aviation Airfields in the United Kingdom and hosts a variety of public and private events that are held at the Aerodrome and adjoining facilities throughout the year. There are flying schools for Microlights, helicopters plus other aircraft.

The Aviator Hotel located at the aerodrome that in the early days would have been the Departure and Arrival lounges, was built in the Art Nouveau style. The conversion work in later years resulted in numerous en suite bedrooms and function rooms. Walking through the building seems to catapult you back in time to the glamorous days of flight. It needs be mentioned that during the war years Sywell was used by the Royal Air Force for pilot training and where Wellington bombers were repaired.

Wingco Reynolds training began with an introduction to the pilot ex Sdn Leader 'Parky' Parkinson, this was followed by a briefing session that included where to find the 'sick' bag in case of emergency! The briefing also consisted of safety instructions and how to deploy the parachute.... made me wonder about the condition of the aircraft! No worries there, the Spitfire is excellently maintained by professional technicians.

The Spitfire as you will see on the photograph is called 'Elizabeth' and once flew with 411 Sdn of the Royal Canadian Air Force. During the briefing, Brian, plus another daredevil, were told about the flight plan that included route and of course, what I call, the 'loop de loop' and 'victory roll' which was only undertaken if asked for. Yes, the brave Wingco Reynolds volunteered to participate in both.

Sadly, I didn't witness that event. However, the pilot came to chat with me after landing his aircraft reporting Brian's description of the aerial manoeuvre as 'ruddy marvellous' or something like that!

It was smashing to see my chum standing there in his flying suit & boots grinning like the proverbial Cheshire cat. As for me, it was pure joy to be out on an airfield again reliving very many memories. Brian was still flying high when we returned to our hotel an hour or so later. The day was rounded off when Brian's daughter & granddaughter turned up. G&T's all round!

Yes, it most assuredly was a 'Grand Day Out'!
