Dear Friends,

Are we truly seeking God's will for our lives? The season of Lent gives us time to reflect on these things.





On Sunday 1 February, the congregation at Farnley Church celebrated the first plough service in the valley. Many thanks to Tom and Brian Grange who supplied the plough and to Graham who led the service. We hope to repeat the service next year.



WHEN Matthew Campbell made and presented a new notice board for the entrance to St Oswald's Church, Leathley he unwittingly came across a piece of recent history. Tucked behind the old board he replaced with a modern, cork-based piece of equipment was a selection of literature from more than half a century ago. Just why they had been put there is anybody's guess but they range from a beautiful copper plate notice for a service on December 28 signed by "Leviathan 1947-48" to a list of collections in late 1955. In between is a special form of service in commemoration of His Late Majesty King George VI of Blessed and Glorious Memory to be used in all churches in England either on the day of the funeral or on the "most convenient Day within the Octave" in 1952. There is a battered piece of paper dated 2nd November in the same year about the Presentation and Dedication of a Lectern Bible in Memory of John William Shaw "departed this life, November 14 1951". He was a Reader of Lessons for many years at St Oswald's. On behalf of his many friends the Bible was handed over by J Kenneth Crawford and received by Stanley Stephenson, churchwarden. The first lesson from Isaiah 40 was read

by Sir George Martin and the second from Matthew 5 by Martin Dykes. The list of collections for October to Christmas 60 years ago shows a total of £37=6=1 with £3-1-9 going to Earl Haig on November 6 and £9 to C of E Children on December 25. For some reason there were two copies of an order of service for Rogation Sunday with 1948 penciled on one. All these years on, the service is still held even if the nature of the village has changed with less emphasis on farming. We have no idea why this eclectic collection was placed behind the old board or if the items were placed there at one time. Any information would be much appreciated.

A mystery painting of St Oswald's, Leathley was left last month in the church porch underneath the new notice board. While it is not an unknown Turner (he spent a lot of time in the Washburn Valley) it is an interesting and different view of the ancient church. There was no point of contact for who left it, just a note saying "My father painted this many years ago. Can you use it in some way, or even sell it?" We think the note is signed by J Hansen. Anyone who can help please get in touch with 0113 2842432.

LOVE IN MAY

Love was never more popular. I write in February on Saint Valentine's Day - but not about sweethearts young or old, established or hopeful. Jesus reminded those who listened to him that love is at the heart of God and therefore at the heart of the way God wants people to follow. His Commandments, the famous ten rules for living, boil down to just two: love God and love other people as you love yourself. Plenty of opportunity for both, but I'm pointing to one for the second that comes in May. It's Christian Aid Week. That week, we invite our neighbours to give money to help other neighbours we and they do not see - neighbours living in poverty across the world. Just people, of any faith or none. The "Christian" bit is because the Churches organise Christian Aid both locally and nationally. The money raised works through partner organisations 'on the ground' where the need is.

A few examples -

* Haiti after the horrendous earthquake in January 2010 [partners

trained 35,155 people in disaster risk reduction, built 511 houses able to withstand earthquakes & hurricanes, planted 248,000 trees to help reverse the trend of deforestation];

* Partner the Centre for the Prevention of Violence in Nicaragua, turning around youth gang violence, drug abuse and machismo culture [big reduction in crime, 38 gangs demobilised, scholarships for 500 young people];

* Partner REACH in Iraq [hygiene kits and food distributed to refugees crowded into churches, mosques and disused buildings];

* Mothers Adi and Loko in Ethiopia - but I'll tell you about them next month.

Christian Aid Week is 10-16 May this year. If you would be willing to help - and have not done so before - please have a word with me when we meet or give me a ring on (01943) 851234.

JESUS COMES TO JERUSALEM AS KING



At a time when our agricultural system is under pressure to feed an increasing population, while simultaneously being placed under financial pressure by supermarkets, the 2015 St Wilfrid's Lecture series will discuss many issues close to the heart of communities across our Diocese and the United Kingdom. The St Wilfrid Lectures are jointly organised and sponsored by York St John University, Ripon Cathedral, the Methodist District of York and Hull, and the Diocese of West Yorkshire and the Dales.

12 From Donkey To Cross And Beyond

Those who experience the highs and lows, the roller coast journey that is Lent, Holy Week and Easter, find it emotional and powerful. From Tossing and Ashing and the Lenten Disciplines (with a break for Mothering Sunday), to the cries of 'Alleluia!' then 'Seize him!', 'You know him' and 'I've never seen him', 'My God, my God why have you forsaken me!', silence, and then 'The tomb's empty!', 'Touch my side', 'Throw the net over the other side', 'Go'. There is still time to get on board with Palm Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday Compline with reflection, Maundy Thursday supper, communion and prayers, Good Friday contemplations.

As Palm Sunday 29 March is a fifth Sunday there'll be a said Communion at St Oswald's Church, Leathley at 9.30 am followed by a noisy procession from Stack Point car park to Fewston Church. We'll gather at 10.45 am around a donkey or two, bless the Palm Crosses and then, as the Jews did for centuries, we'll walk and sing to worship God up the path to Church. Please wear appropriate clothes and footwear. At Church we'll have a dramatized reading of Jesus entry into Jerusalem (I'd like 3 volunteers for solo

parts and I'll ask for others to voice the group parts on the day.) The day finishes with the Benefice Choir leading us as we journey from Palm Sunday to Good Friday with songs, hymns and readings at 6.30 pm at St Oswald's Church.

On Monday to Wednesday at St Oswald's at 7.30 pm there'll be a short evening service with reflection. Thursday's venue is Fewston Parochial Hall at 7.30 pm to remember the events in The Upper Room. Friday at noon in St Oswald's Church will see us spend about an hour at the foot of the Cross in prayer, contemplation, and song, and then Norwood Chapel at 7.00 pm gives us another opportunity to step aside from normal life and contemplate the day. Holy Saturday is the pause, the time between, the slow change of gear before we shout out 'Alleluia!' in our churches and chapels and across the Benefice - HE IS RISEN! After the purple of Lent why not celebrate by wearing something yellow or gold to match the church colours? Join us for what you can and expect the unexpected; prepare for the unknown.



St ANGELA

It is not that long ago that most girls never had the chance to be educated. But one determined woman started the process, and her name was Angela Merici. She was born in Italy on 24 March 1474. Both her parents died when she was only 10, and then when Angela was 13 her elder sister died too, which led her to dedicate her life to God. When she was only 22 she started a school for young girls in her home town and this was so successful that she was invited to start schools in other places. Her faith led her to make pilgrimages to the Holy Land and to Rome.

It was when she was in Rome in 1524 that she suddenly lost her sight. Pope Clement VII asked her to stay in Rome to take charge of an order of nursing nuns but she refused and went home to Brescia. When she was almost 60 she started the Order of St Ursula, which is still involved in teaching today. Even though she was blind, St Angela Merici had a vision of what was possible with God's help.



Askwith with Weston WI had a very entertaining evening for their February meeting with a visit from Dereck Stansfield who has given many talks and demonstrations to WI's on his unique and unusual way of painting in COFFEE, he also paints with acrylic and watercolour but it is this different style of painting that was quite fascinating.

He had been spending some time in Florida with his wife and whilst waiting for her he noticed the coffee paintings. He had spent some time experimenting with sepia and experimented with coffee grinds, water etc so after trying out various grades of coffee he successfully demonstrated painting with coffee.

Dereck also gave a very quick demonstration in watercolour using nothing but an old credit card which to all our amazement developed into a wonderful mountain scene, he gave the light coming from the left and mixed cobalt blue with a little rose madder for a warmer effect, everyone was quite amazed how quickly he had done this and made such an effective painting. He explained how different brands of coffee made lighter and darker types of brown and he also used a very large

brush, which he said and demonstrated that it could also be made to paint very thinly much as an artist would use a rigger. The larger brush he said had been recommended by David Bellemy whom he had worked with, he thoroughly wets the paper first as coffee dries faster than water colour.

We had a super night and the demonstration was something quite different but everyone whether interested in painting or not thoroughly enjoyed the evening.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 12 March when Graham Cocker will be speaking about the Leeds Donkey Sanctuary.
