Dear Friends

One of my favourite books in the Bible is the book of Nehemiah. It might not be one of the books of the Bible we turn to very often, but it is a gem of a book with a great deal to teach us about working together, managing change and embarking on new things. Remember, it's Nehemiah's vision to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem.

So, what has it got to teach us?

- Success comes only when we work together. The people of Jerusalem each played a part in rebuilding bits of the wall. And for many of them, this was a new experience.
- So, be prepared for God to ask you to do something you'd not have previously thought possible. Be open to the bidding of the Holy Spirit.
- Keep going when the going gets tough. That's exactly what the people of Jerusalem did when faced with opposition to their project of rebuilding the walls.
- Give thanks to God for successes, even when they seem relatively small.
- Pray for guidance. Prayer was at the heart of all that Nehemiah did.

There's some good advice in the book of Nehemiah, which does seem to speak directly to the situation, which many churches find themselves in today...faced with managing change.

I firmly believe that churches are at their very best when everyone pulls together and works together. It's working in this way which enables us to find solutions to problems ...to discover talents and skills we never thought we had ... and have fun together!

We should never be afraid of change. If we take to heart what the book of Nehemiah has to teach us, we'll have a good blueprint for building church and engaging in mission in our church community.

If you've never read Nehemiah, please do so. If you haven't read it for a long time, read it again. May the story of Nehemiah be an inspiration to all of us in the Washburn Valley, as we seek new ways of working closer together.

BAPTISMS

OVER the next two or three months there will be several Baptisms across the Churches. This is a time of celebration and welcome as a child is brought into the Family of the Church, parents and God-parents make their vows before family, friends and God, and the regular worshippers play their part in the service and afterwards through prayer and support.

Do you take in what you say and hear? Someone said that before a service you listen to God, during the service you listen to and talk to God, after the service you talk about God.

Our God is an amazing God who calls all sorts of people to work together for Him – just read again about the Disciples or look around at Church! For me, Christening someone is a great privilege, and like a lot of my work, is sowing seeds, but we can all have a part in how the seeds grow.

ST OSWALD'S CHURCH CLOCK

AFTER more than 10 years of sterling work winding the iconic clock at St Oswald's Church, Leathley, Gill Wood and Jackie Goodwin have decided to call time. The Parochial Church Council have thanked them warmly for their efforts which have involved climbing the steep ladders of the tower every week so that villagers and visitors alike know what time of day it is.

The pair are being succeeded by Tony and Deana Delaney, regular worshippers at St Oswald's since they were married there some years ago and members of the PCC. They said: "Not many people appreciate the huge amount of voluntary work that goes in to ensure that a church runs smoothly. We just want to maintain the long tradition of the clock being there for all to see and hear."

Gill and Jackie said: "We have really enjoyed doing the job but time marches on. We are not as fit as we once were. We have been helped by younger members of the family but they are now mainly away from home. However we have promised to help Tony and Deana in whatever way we can."

The Vicar of St Oswald's, the Rev Graham Shield said: "We are all very grateful for what Gill and Jackie have done over such a long period. It is not quite the same when the clock is out of action. We wish Tony and Deana all the best in their new role."

ST ANDREW'S CHURCH, BLUBBERHOUSES has served Blubberhouses as an iconic place of worship for nearly 150 years. Would you like to see it open for the next generation? Could you be part of the worshipping community? Could you help start and run a Friends of St Andrew's group? Could you join the team that will oversee the roof project and other essential repairs? Could you promote the church and help with fundraising?

St Andrew's Church Blubberhouses is an architectural gem of a church, Grade 2 listed, within our landscape and community. It is an unspoilt example of the work of architect Edward Buckton Lamb, for Lady Frankland, and consecrated in 1856. It serves everyone in Fewston and Blubberhouses parish and is an important part of our national heritage. For some years now there has been concern that the future of St Andrews, Blubberhouses as a place of worship was in jeopardy due to a serious fall in the numbers worshipping and a rise in running costs. This issue deepened following the latest 5 yearly report on the fabric which has revealed the extent of what is required to maintain the building in a safe state for the future. At its meeting on May 13th 2013 at St Andrews, the PCC (Church Council) resolved to produce a project plan and associated costs report to show what was required to keep the church open and viable for worship together with some options for the future. These appear to be:-

1. Keep St Andrews open for worship following repairs.
2. Start the process to close it as a place of worship.
3. Keep the building within the PCC family (Fewston Church, Washburn Heritage Centre, Parochial Hall) as a "mixed use" facility (worship and something else).
4. Dispose of the building to a private buyer (if possible).

In considering these options the main factors that seem to be in play are:-

1. The potential to recruit and retain a larger congregational attendance than at present.
2. The ongoing financial effect of trying to run two resource hungry listed buildings.
3. The restrictions we have as a PCC in trying to change the use or dispose of the building.
4. The likely success of any financial appeal to raise funds to repair & maintain it.

Some local response was sort with general support for the building but not necessarily for worship, the parish church at Fewston could be used. Partnerships were looked into for a mixed use building. After initial positive feedback this eventually came to nought. In November 2014 a 3 month consultation began with press releases. Again there wasn't much practical support. Now, having had £14,800 allocated for roof and rainwater goods (with a clause stating that the building needs to be kept open primarily for worship for 10 years) and more money needed for other essential repairs, the PCC needs to know if St Andrew's Church has a future as a worship centre for you or not.

Some people think that the number 13 is unlucky but did you know that other countries and traditions have different 'unlucky' numbers?






