# Of Which Country Are You A Citizen ?

I'm Yorkshire born and bred (although conceived in Scotland) so I'm flying the flag of a white rose on a blue background from August 1st – Yorkshire Day. I'm English (although Mum's Mum was Scottish), therefore British and a member of the UK. For the moment we're also Europeans as well as being part of the human race.

For Christians, regardless of where they were born, nurtured, live or what colour they are, language they speak, culture they are part of, are all citizens of Heaven, whatever that place actually is or looks like. St Paul says that we are in this world but not of this world. God is our Heavenly Father. We are made in His image and His Spirit was breathed into us.

In the Bible Heaven is described as the best place to be, where the saints and elders gather around God's throne praising Him. If being with God is heaven then the opposite must be true – without God is not Heaven - hell. I know where I'd rather be.

David, the Shepherd boy turned King, wrote a number of psalms, the most famous is the 23rd. This finishes with 'I will live in the house of the Lord forever.' Just before He died, Jesus told His disciples that he had to leave them and go back to his father so that his Spirit could come to them and that he could prepare a place in his father's house for us. Dying is actually going home, back to Dad, where all the flags will be flying.

Whether you fly the flag on 1st August, 1st March, 5th March, 17th March, 23rd April, 30th November etc., and whether the national emblem is a white rose, daffodil, pasty, pint of Guinness, haggis etc., Christians should fly the flag of peace with the emblem of a lamb or a dove.

I write this on the day of the funeral of Jo Cox MP, and the people of Nice are, with the rest of France and all people of peace, recovering from the atrocity yesterday on France's National Day, which commemorates the Storming of the Bastille on 14th July 1789. The *Fête de la Fédération* on 14 July 1790 was a celebration of the unity of the French nation during the French Revolution. The aim, one year after the Storming of the Bastille, was to symbolize peace. Let's pray that they can still celebrate their day of peace next 14th July.

All people of peace must continue to unite against evil in thought, word, deed and especially in prayer, which influences the first three. Where ever you live be at peace with each other.

May the peace of God, which passes all understanding, be with you, your families and neighbours, now and for ever. Graham





# Lower Washburn Parish Council

## Parish meeting 14 July 2016

The Parish members are concerned about the erosion of the riverbank at Castley and have advised North Yorkshire County Council of their concerns. The County Council have accordingly appointed consultants to advise on appropriate measures to stop the erosion. Hopefully there will be some action later this year.

Flooding at Castley also occurred over Christmas with water backing up behind the flood defences and several houses were damaged. A representative from the Environment Agency has visited the area and consideration will be given to finding a solution to prevent similar flooding in the future.

The parish website is now live and can be found at [www.lowerwashburnnpc.co.uk](http://www.lowerwashburnnpc.co.uk) and we welcome any feedback.

Harrogate Borough Council currently provide a free wheeled bin garden waste collection service but with the financial constraints the Council are under the service will move to one where residents choose to subscribe to it by paying an annual fee. From June 2017 the owners of properties which have had a free collection service will have to pay a fee of £39 to continue to have the green waste collected.

The next parish meeting of the parish will be on Thursday 8 September 2016 at Leathley parish rooms commencing at 8.00pm.







# All in the month of AUGUST

It was:

90 years ago: on 17th August 1926 that George Melly was born. This flamboyant British jazz/blues singer; music, TV and film critic was also an expert on art history, particularly Pop Art and Surrealism.

80 years ago: on 1st August 1936 that the 11th Olympic Games opened in Berlin. It was the last Olympics for 12 years due to WWII.

75 years ago: on 15th August 1941 that Saint Maximilian Kolbe, Polish Franciscan friar and martyr who sheltered 2,000 Jewish refugees from the Nazis, died. He had taken the place of a condemned man at Auschwitz concentration camp.

70 year ago: on 13th August 1946 that H. G. Wells, British science fiction novelist (The War of the Worlds, The Invisible Man) died.

60 years ago: on 27th August 1956 that Britain's first nuclear power station, Calder Hall in Cumbria, began operating. It was the first nuclear power station in the world to generate power on an industrial scale.

50 years ago: on 1st August 1966 that the Cultural Revolution began in China. It was intended to preserve China's Maoist/Communist ideology by banishing capitalist and traditional elements from society. Millions of people were persecuted.

40 years ago: on 1st August 1976 that Austrian racing driver Niki Lauda suffered life-threatening burns and permanent disfigurement when he crashed in the German Grand Prix. As a result, the Nurburgring circuit was made less dangerous.

30 years ago: on 9th August 1986 that British rock band Queen performed their final live concert before the death of Freddie Mercury. It took place at Knebworth Park, Stevenage.

25 years ago: on 8th August 1991 that British journalist John McCarthy was released by Islamic Jihad in Lebanon after being held hostage for more than five years.

Also 25 years ago: on 24th August 1991 that Mikhail Gorbachev resigned as First Secretary of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union.

20 years ago, on 23rd August 1996 that Osama bin Laden issued a fatwa entitled A Declaration of War Against the Americans Occupying the Land of the Two Holy Places. At that time few people knew who he was and so it received little attention.

15 years ago: on 6th August 2001 that U.S. President George W. Bush received a daily briefing warning that Osama bin Laden was determined to strike in the USA. (Six weeks later came the 9/11 terrorist attack.)

10 years ago: on 9th August 2006 that British police arrested 24 terrorists who were plotting to blow up at least 10 aircraft travelling from the UK to the USA using liquid explosives.
