DEAR FRIENDS,

I'm fascinated by the blue plaques on the side of buildings. You learn such a lot of history from them. Recently I learned about an old inn in London with the fascinating title The World Upside Down Pub. It's no longer a pub and I believe there are others with this name elsewhere in the country. But I found it fascinating. It seems that this one may have been the place on the River Thames from which ships departed with convicts bound for Australia. The local people said the convicts were bound for the 'world upside down'....of course Australia is still referred to by some as 'down under'.

Sometimes we think the present world is upside down; or we ask 'has the world gone crazy?'. There is so much in the news about the way things are and I don't need to reiterate them here.

Personally (and you may think it strange) when thinking about the Christian faith I think of it as an 'upside down faith'.

It seems I'm not alone in this. Patrick Appleford wrote a hymn in the sixties which had this upside-down-ness as its theme. One verse is particularly apt at the present time:

This world lives divided and apart.
You draw us all together and we start
In your body to see that in fellowship
We can be turning the world upside down.

The 'You' he is referring to is of course Jesus and Appleford believes that the fellowship (body of Christians) **can** make a difference.

Just think of Jesus' ministry: while he held the deep Jewish belief in God, he rather expressed it in ways which were far from orthodox. Look at the unlikely people he mixed with: chiefly the outcast of society, usually referred to as 'sinners' by those who wished to retain the rigid laws. His way of going about things seemed to turn the world upside down. His teachings followed the same vein: blessed (happy) are the meek, the peacemakers, those who mourn, the merciful. He assured 'sinners' that they were forgiven and were children of God. And this way of Christian living is echoed time and again in the teachings of the early church. Although the church over the centuries has come in for much criticism, there are very many Christians who have been, and still are, pioneers for change working to bring about peace, justice, freedom from oppression, from hunger and from sickness. Often their determination and efforts have been in the face of much resistance.

Faced with division and apart-ness we need to continue to believe that together we really can make a difference. In our own communities and in our own individual ways we can 'turn the world upside down'....or better still, the right way up!!

Emma Charlotte and Anne initially tried self publishing a volume of poems with little success. Their first stories were written under pseudonyms, females at that time were not expected to be so educated. Anne is buried in Scarborough and the rest of the family in the crypt at Howarth Church.
The Parsonage Museum opened in 1928.





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ALL IN THE MONTH OF SEPTEMBER

It was:

400 years ago: on 15th Sept 1616 that the first free public school in Europe was established in Frascati, Italy by Spanish priest Joseph Calasanz.

250 years ago: on 29th Sept 1766 that Princess Charlotte, eldest daughter of King George III of the UK was born.

150 year ago: on 21st Sept 1866 that H.G. Wells, the British science fiction novelist was born. (The War of the Worlds, The Time Machine, The Invisible Man, etc.)

125 years ago: on 14th Sept 1891 that the first penalty kick in the English Football League was taken by Wolverhampton Wanderers in their match against Accrington.

100 years ago: on 3rd Sept 1916 that the first German airship was shot down over Britain, near St Albans.

Also 100 years ago: on 13th Sept 1916 that Roald Dahl, British novelist, short story writer and screenwriter was born. (Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, James and the Giant Peach, The BFG, and more.)

90 years ago: on 8th Sept 1926 that Germany was admitted to the League of Nations. (Spain withdrew in protest.)

80 years ago: on 6th Sept 1936 that British aviation pioneer Beryl Markham became the first person to fly non-stop from Britain to North America, and the first woman to fly solo from east to west across the Atlantic Ocean.

75 years ago: on 1st Sept 1941 that Nazi Germany issued a decree ordering all Jews in Germany and occupied territories to wear a yellow Star of David badge.

65 years ago: on 11th Sept 1951 that Florence Chadwick of the USA became the first woman to swim the English Channel in both directions.

50 years ago: on 8th Sept 1966 that the Severn Bridge was officially opened. It links England and Wales, spanning the River Severn and River Wye.

40 years ago: on 3rd Sept 1976 that NASA's Viking 2 landed on Mars. It photographed the surface, analysed soil samples and searched for signs of life.

Also 40 years ago: on 16th Sept 1976 that the Episcopalian Church in the USA approved the ordination of women as priests and bishops.

30 years ago: on 7th Sept 1986 that Desmond Tutu became Archbishop of Cape Town – the first black person to lead the Anglican Church in South Africa.

25 years ago: on 6th Sept 1991 that the Russian city of Leningrad was renamed Saint Petersburg, restoring its original name.

20 years ago: on 27th Sept 1996 that the Taliban seized control of Kabul, Afghanistan, ousted President Burhanuddin Rabbani and executed former President Mohammad Najibullah.

15 years ago: on 11th Sept 2001 that the September 11th terrorist attacks on the USA took place (also known as 9/11). 2,973 people were killed.
