

As 2017 begins, let us all resolve to be better family members, neighbours, friends and colleagues and may you all have more joy in 2017 than in 2016.







All Saints' Church, Farnley – a curate's eye view

I started my placement in the Washburn Valley and Mid-Wharfe benefice (part of my curacy training) at the beginning of October. At the time of writing, it's early December, and the end of my placement is rapidly approaching. It's been a wonderful opportunity for me to journey with the people of the benefice for a little while, learning about the joys and challenges of being Christian disciples in the Washburn Valley. During my time here, I've very much enjoyed meeting and getting to know people across the benefice, including the members at Farnley. I've been asked to share some thoughts, through the eyes of an outsider who has had the privilege of spending some weeks with the people of All Saints' Farnley, about what I've seen.

All Saints' Farnley has a lot going for it. The church building is beautiful, and in a great location, with the benefit of a good car park, and kitchen and toilet facilities. Its fabric is in need of some attention, and the PCC is getting on with this, organizing the required inspection, planning decoration, and thinking about how to improve its heating. The condition of church buildings is vital to our continued witness and ministry. First impressions really do matter, and if we want our churches to be places where people feel welcome, and may encounter God, then they need to look cared for and be warm. Our buildings send out a message, and it's up to us what that message is. All Saints' Farnley has bucket loads of natural advantages, and the PCC (through the newly established Farnley Fabric Folunteers) is working really hard to make the most of them.

But first and foremost, a church is people rather than buildings – and Farnley has great people. The church members have been warm and welcoming. The PCC in particular (the people I've spoken mostly to) are committed to the church's continued development and flourishing. They want it to continue to reach out and serve the whole community. At the meeting on the 23rd November, there were various ideas about how to do this, particularly around serving the many keen cyclists who come out to enjoy the area.

As Paul writes in his first letter to the church in Corinth, the church is the body of Christ – "Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it" (1 Cor. 12:27). There are no redundant parts of the body – all are needed in order for it to function properly and flourish. All parts have a role to play, whether visible or hidden, a major part or a smaller (but no less important) one. All who are baptized and who consider themselves to be part of the church are

part of the body of Christ – all have a role to play. This is true for Farnley – everyone who is part of the church at Farnley has a part to play in seeing it continue to develop and flourish. If you're part of All Saints', Farnley, what part are you called to play?

We call the life of a body, its spirit - and the life of a church is found only in the Holy Spirit. Human wisdom and effort takes us a long way, but the church needs more than this if it is to fulfil its calling and be fully alive. A church that does not seek the leading of God's Holy Spirit will be being led by something else - probably simple human wisdom, which is good, but not sufficient. A church that is not equipped and sustained by God's Holy Spirit is relying on human energy, which will run dry. As individual disciples, we need to be sustained and resourced frequently (if not daily) through prayer and encountering God in Scripture. Then we need to come together as the body of Christ to be fed and refreshed corporately as we worship God, in prayer and praise, and as we receive bread and wine. We are fed and sustained so that we can share in God's mission to the world, showing and telling others that God loves them. If we get this bit right, then we get better at working out what our part in that mission is. To change the metaphor, our roots deepen, Our relationship with God grows and gets stronger, and our faith deepens. We get better at seeing what God is calling us to do, and we become bolder in asking God to give us what we need for the task.

Of course, this doesn't only apply to Farnley. It's true for every church. So here are some final thoughts, as I prepare to say goodbye to the Washburn Valley and Mid-Wharfe benefice, with grateful thanks for your kindness and hospitality, and for all that I've learned:

- Remember the purpose of the church to be the place where Christ is
 most readily seen and found in the world; to be a meeting place of
 heaven and earth, where we orientate ourselves towards God, offering
 praise and worship, and receiving what we need; to be the place from
 which we are sent to play our part in God's mission to the world that He
 loves.
- Are you being fed and sustained for the part that you are called to play? Or are you running on empty? If so, what can you do about it?
- Have you sought to discern what God is calling your church to do and be? How might you do this?
- Pray regularly for Graham, Barry, Michael, Stuart, other clergy (retired and otherwise) and lay readers, and for your PCC as they seek to lead your church.

You will all be in my prayers, with my love and thanks.

All in the month of JANUARY

It was:

100 years ago:- on 31st Jan 1917 that Germany resumed unrestricted submarine warfare in the Atlantic, and said it would attack any ships, including civilian passenger liners.

90 years ago:-on 15th Jan 1927 that BBC launched its first live sports broadcast on BBC radio. Teddy Wakelam commentated on the England vs Wales rugby match from Twickenham.

80 years ago:- on 1st Jan 1937 that speedometers and safety glass in windscreens became compulsory in all vehicles in Britain.

75 years ago:- on 26th Jan 1942 that the first US troops arrived in Europe. 4,508 soldiers from the 34th Infantry Regiment docked in Belfast, Northern Ireland.

Also 75 years ago:- on 29th Jan 1942 that the first episode of Desert Island Discs was broadcast on BBC radio in the UK. It is Britain's longest-running radio show.

70 years ago:- on 6th Jan 1947 that US President Harry S Truman gave the first televised State of the Union address.

60 years ago:- on on 16th Jan 1957 that the Cavern Club opened in Liverpool. This jazz venue became an important rock venue when the Beatles played there during their early years.

50 years ago:- on 27th Jan 1967 that the Apollo 1 tragedy took place. Three US astronauts were killed when their command module caught fire during a pre-launch test at Cape Canaveral, Florida.

40 years ago:- on 6th Jan 1977 that former British Home Secretary and Chancellor of the Exchequer, Roy Jenkins, became President of the European Commission. He was the first – and only – Briton to hold this role.

30 years ago: - 20th Jan 1987 that Terry Waite, the Archbishop of Canterbury's special envoy in the Middle East, was kidnapped in Beirut, Lebanon while on a peace mission to negotiate the release of hostages. (Released November 1991.)

25 years ago:- on 21st Jan 1992 that the United Nations ordered Libya to hand over two intelligence agents accused of the Lockerbie airliner bombing, or face sanctions. (Sanctions were imposed 31st March, and lifted April 1999, when the agents were handed over.)

20 years ago:- on 20th Jan 1997 that Bill Clinton was inaugurated as President of the United States for a second term.

15 years ago:- on 1st Jan 2002 that the Euro became the official currency of Austria, Belgium, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, the Netherlands, Portugal and Spain.

Also 15 years ago:- on 29th Jan 2002 that President Bush first used the term 'Axis of Evil' to describe countries which sponsor terrorism and seek weapons of mass destruction. (The countries were Cuba, Iran, Iraq, Libya, North Korea and Syria.)

10 years ago:- on 1st Jan 2007 that Bulgaria and Romania joined the European Union.

St PAUL

St Paul's day is the 25th January and we remember him because he was one of the Church's greatest teachers. Called Saul by his parents, he was brought up a Pharisee and became a tent-maker. He was completely against the early Christians and was there when Stephen, the first Christian martyr was stoned to death. He searched out many Christians and handed them over the prison and death.

So why did he change? Like many people since, although few so dramatically, Saul changed because Jesus came into his life. You can read all about it in chapter 9. Everything changed for Saul but he had a hard time persuading people that it wasn't a trick. Even his name changed, and as Paul he travelled teaching and founding churches. To encourage these growing communities he wrote the 13 letters (or Epistles) we can still read today. These letters are the earliest parts of New Testament to written, some only 20 years after Jesus.

Meeting Programme


11 January 2017 – Line Dancing; An active start to our new year programme to burn off some of the extra calories we will have all consumed over the festive season.

Lower Washburn Parish Council

At the parish meeting in November Mr. Jones from the Yorkshire Ambulance Service NHS Trust told the meeting about the purchase, installation and usage of a public defibrillator mentioning that recently the use of one in Pool in Wharfedale had saved a local residents life. When someone has a heart attack there is only a time period of four minutes before death but by using a defibrillator this period can be extended allowing an ambulance to attend and possibly saving a life. The intention is to fit the defibrillator to an outside wall of the parish hall at Leathley in a secure cabinet. If the defibrillator is needed someone would ring the emergency 999 number and be given the code to access the cabinet. The machine itself is simple to use. The Ambulance Service would also provide demonstrations on the use of the machine.

The Parish Council are concerned about the poor broadband speeds in the parish area and have written to your local MP Mr. Julian Smith asking for his support on improving broadband speeds in rural communities.

As we have mentioned before the parish council is only one voice in asking for action and we would suggest that local residents contact Superfast North Yorkshire e mail: info@superfastnorthyorkshire.com to add their concerns about poor broadband speeds.






A new year!
