I have already met with many of the Churchwardens and we have started exploring how we might develop governance, patterns of worship and bringing the parishes of the Benefice closer together in a way that will provide a really attractive and positive opportunity for an enthusiastic and mission focussed priest to take up the incumbency.

These concerts, which feature both established and rising national and international artists, complement the short Thursday lunch time concerts arranged by the Music Department of the Cathedral. Below is a summary of the concerts - I have attached a brochure with more details.

The season opens on October 9th with UK's leading cello and piano duo, Raphael Wallfisch and John York.

The Pelleas Ensemble - flute, viola and harp will include popular requests and some old favourites. which will take place the more intimate surroundings of St Johns, Sharow on Nov 13

The pianist Ivana Gavric returns to a balanced programme of music by Haydn, Grieg, Chopin and Schumann on 4 Dec.

Anna Tilbrook, a regular to Ripon will be in action with the Marlborough Quartet in Schubert's Trout Quintet on 8 Jan

The baritone Roderick Williams, a leading interpreter of Schubert and Iain Burnside will be giving a very special performance of Schubert's Winterreise on 12 Feb

Herschel Trio of harpsichord, viola da gamba and baroque flute/recorder will close the season with a concert of baroque music on 12 March

The concert offer the opportunity to enjoy familiar and less familiar chamber works in the magical and spiritual setting of the Quire of the Cathedral. We are always amazed by the distance that people will travel on a regular basis to hear excellent performances. We have arranged for the Old Deanery Hotel, opposite the Cathedral to provide a special pre-concert diner (two courses and coffee/tea for £15).

Individual tickets, which cost £17 to £20 depending on the concert (£5 for students and free if under 18) can be purchased on line at our web site www.riponconcerts.co.uk, from the Cathedral's Gift shop and the Little Ripon Bookshop or via the Harrogate Theatre's Box office (www.harrogatetheatre.co.uk) or from the Music House in Harrogate or at the door. Regular attendees of our concerts can opt to become members by paying an annual subscription of £70-£80 for the whole season.




The Fewston Band


The collection was for All We Can, the Methodist charity which supports those in need abroad including the victims of the recent hurricanes on the Caribbean.

Enigma

‘S eventy-five years ago, on 30th October 1942, U Boat U559 was spotted in the Eastern Mediterranean, and was badly damaged by depth charges and ‘pom-poms’ from various ships, including a P-class destroyer, HMS Petard.

‘Three members of Petard’s crew, Lt Tony Fasson, Able Seaman Colin Crazier, and Canteen Assistant Tommy Brown managed to board U559 in the dark, and were able to get hold of the Enigma code books, although the Enigma machine itself went down with the submarine. Tragically, so too did Fasson and Crazier. Only Brown was able to escape, only to die in 1945 attempting to rescue his infant sister from a house fire.

‘So this poem remembers the enormous number of sailors from the merchant marine and the Royal Navy lost during the war, and also marks the brilliance and dogged persistence of those like Alan Turing who worked tirelessly to discover the secrets of the German code machines.’

The U-boats used a code


St HUGH of LINCOLN 17th November

All in the month of November

It was:

100 years ago: 5th to 7th Nov 1917 that the October Revolution took place in Estonia. Bolshevik revolutionaries overthrew the provisional government and seized power.

80 years ago: 5th to 19th Nov that the fall of Shanghai, took place, during the Sino-Japanese War. Japanese forces captured the city, which they occupied for the rest of the war.

75 years ago: following Britain's victory at the Second Battle of El Alamein, Winston Churchill announced: 'This is not the end. It is not even the beginning of the end. But it is, perhaps, the end of the beginning.'

70 years ago: on 20th Nov 1947 that Princess Elizabeth (now Queen Elizabeth II) married Philip Mountbatten at Westminster Abbey in London. (Philip had been given the title Duke of Edinburgh by King George VI the previous day.)

Also 70 years ago: on 29th Nov 1947 that the United Nations General Assembly voted to partition Palestine into separate Jewish and Arab states. (Israel became an independent Jewish state in May 1948. Arab leaders rejected the partition, leading to civil war.)

65 years ago: on 1st Nov 1952 that the USA carried out the first successful detonation

of a hydrogen bomb, in a test on the Pacific island of Elugelab, Marshall Islands. The island was completely destroyed and no longer exists.

Also 65 years ago: on 25th Nov 1952 that the world's longest-running play, *The Mousetrap*, by Agatha Christie, opened in London. (It is still running.)

50 years ago: 3rd to 22nd Nov 1967 that during the Vietnam War, the Battle of Dak To (South Vietnam) took place. This battle saw some of the bloodiest engagements of the war. US/South Vietnamese tactical victory, North Vietnamese strategic victory.

Also 50 years ago: on 18th Nov 1967 that during the massive foot-and-mouth disease outbreak, the movement of all farm animals was banned in England and Wales.

50 years ago: on 27th Nov 1967 that French President Charles de Gaulle vetoed Britain's application to join the Common Market. (de Gaulle resigned from office in 1969 and Britain reapplied and was accepted. It joined the EEC – now the EU – in 1973.)

40 years ago: 14th Nov to 12th Jan '78, that British firefighters went on strike for the first time, demanding a 30% pay increase. Their duties were taken over by the British Army, using Green Goddess fire-engines.



Also 40 years ago: on 19th Nov 1977 that Egyptian President Anwar Sadat became the first Arab leader to make an official visit to Israel. On 20th Nov he became the first Arab leader to address Israel's parliament, the Knesset.

30 years ago: on 8th Nov 1987 that the Remembrance Day bombing in Enniskillen, Northern Ireland, took place. 11 people were killed and 63 injured when an IRA bomb exploded during a Remembrance Day service.

Also 30 years ago: on 18th Nov 1987 that King's Cross underground station fire in London took place. 31 people were killed and more than 60 injured when a fire broke out in an escalator shaft and spread to the ticket hall.

25 years ago: on 11th Nov 1992 that the General Synod of the Church of England voted to allow women to become priests. (The first women were ordained as priests in March 1994.)

Also 25 years ago: on 12th Nov 1992 that the first episode of the TV comedy series Absolutely Fabulous was broadcast in the UK.

Also 25 years ago: on 20th Nov 1992 that the Windsor Castle fire took place. A fire broke out in a private chapel and spread to a large part of the building. Damage was extensive and took five years to repair, at a cost of £40million. Buckingham Palace was opened to the public for the first time to help raise the money.

20 years ago: on 12th Nov 1997 that Brazil's Supreme Court rejected Britain's request to extradite 'Great Train Robber' Ronnie Biggs. (He returned to Britain voluntarily in 2001 and was immediately arrested. He was released from prison in 2009 due to his declining health and died in Dec 2013.)

Also 20 years ago: on 17th Nov 1997 that the Luxor massacre took place in Egypt. Islamic militants killed 62 people (mainly tourists) outside the Temple of Hatshepsut archaeological site in Deir el-Bahari.

15 years ago: on 25th Nov 2002 that the Department of Homeland Security was established in the USA.

10 years ago: on 3rd Nov 2007 that the death of Martin Meehan, Irish republican and Sinn Fein politician, took place. He was the first person to be convicted of membership of the Provisional IRA and spent 18 years in prison.

Getting the builders in

‘S’uppose one of you wants to build a tower. Won’t you first sit down and estimate the cost to see if you have enough money to complete it? For if you lay the foundation and are not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule you, 30 saying, “This person began to build and wasn’t able to finish.” (Luke 14:28-30)

This is a great verse for lawyers, as are many others in the Bible. I like the way the advice to ‘sit down’ comes first - that makes sense. If you are having some work done on your house, have a good think first.

What other advice would you need? The first thing is talk to people. Perhaps your neighbours or people in church have had work done. Can they recommend someone?

Get several estimates and take time and research to choose the right person. Often a local builder or tradesperson is best. A firm that advertises locally – perhaps in the parish magazine, might be the right one.

Ask for a reference. If you want double glazing or whatever, ask for details of somewhere they have worked. Always choose the contractor, don’t let them choose you. There is nothing wrong in answering an advertisement in a leaflet but do not get talked or pressured into agreeing something.

Get a proper quotation for the work. Not only cost, but how long the work will take. How much mess will they cause, and when can they start?

Do you need advice, plans building regs, corgi, and planning permission? Get it in writing. In these days of email, it should be easy to get the contractor to confirm it.

Even if the builder says, “I should be able to start next week,” it is an indication only and not what we solicitors call a fundamental condition of the contract. You could change, by insisting on an agreement at the start that the work must be done by a date.

Be reasonable. Sometimes work really does take longer than anticipated; jobs get held up, and things change which are of everyone’s control. As always, this is a light-hearted guide and always get proper advice.

Lastly, do you really need a tower (extension) anyway?

Women and the priesthood – 25 years on

On 11th November 1992, millions of people were watching the unfolding events at Church House, Westminster. The General Synod of the Church of England was in session, and, after 20 years of debate, here was another chance for the Synod to allow women in the priesthood. The BBC were there to broadcast the debate to the nation.

There were crowds outside: plenty supporting the legislation, plenty opposing. During one debate, a small procession had borne a black coffin into Dean's Yard proclaiming the death of the Church of England, should it ordain women as priests.

Chairing the Synod, the Archbishop of York, Dr John Habgood, invited the Bishop of Guildford, the Rt Revd Michael Adie, to propose the motion. The Ven David Silk, Archdeacon of Leicester, stood to oppose the motion, only to be interrupted by a fire alarm.

The Archdeacon started again and the debate continued, one speech for, one against, for five hours. Synod sat in silent prayer before casting their votes: House of Bishops 39 'for' and 13 'against', House of Clergy 176 'for' and 74 'against', and House of Laity 169 'for' and 82 'against'. That was two-third majorities in each House, as required: just two Laity votes the other way would have halted the legislation.

On 12th March, 1994, at Bristol Cathedral, the first women were ordained into the Church of England's priesthood. Many reports sought to name the 'first woman priest' but none were accurate. Most chose the first name alphabetically but actually all the candidates are ordained simultaneously, so there were, in fact, 32 'first women priests'.

But it wasn't that simple. Parliament had insisted the Church of England make provision for those opposed: 1000 clergy had threatened to leave. The Act of Synod, passed in 1993, allowed parishes not to accept ordained women and to seek oversight from a Provincial Episcopal Visitor (flying bishop) if their own bishop ordained women. The legality of ordaining women was even challenged in civil courts.

Today, of 19,550 clergy in the Church of England, more than a quarter, 5,690, are women. Of 7,790 stipendiary (paid) clergy, 2,160 are women. Of 544 future clergy beginning training this autumn, 274 are women. And, in November 2014, 22 years after that historic vote, the Synod voted for women as bishops. The Rt Revd Libby Lane, Bishop of Stockport, was the first to be consecrated. Canon Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, as the first Bishop of Loughborough, will be the eleventh.

An Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 24th August 2017. All parishes were represented, along with NYCC Cllr Lumley, the Clerk and 13 members of the public.

New councillor David Powell was welcomed for the Middleton parish.

Members of the Burley Bridge Association attended the meeting and during the Public Session they informed the council and members of the public of what action has been occurring since planning permission was granted and also included what they hoped for in the future. They then answered questions from council members and members of the public and it was quite clear that Askwith, Weston and the surrounding area have totally different views than BBA

The minutes from the Annual and Ordinary meeting on 24th May 2017 were adopted.

Under matters from the previous meeting the Clerk confirmed that efforts are still being made to get a replacement councillor for Langbar. The Clerk confirmed that every household in Langbar had been sent a letter asking for volunteer councillor with no response.

The Welcome to Askwith sign that had been knocked down was discussed, with the Clerk informing the meeting that NYCC had confirmed that if the post is reinstated to a vertical position they would then fix the sign back to the post with the correct brackets. Cllr Shepherd to pursue erecting the sign post.

Nesfield Village Fund had written to MWPC asking for a contribution of £180 towards to repair of the Postman's Shelter. As the council have funds in hand, it was proposed by Cllr Whitley seconded Cllr Caton and carried that the contribution should be made.

The annual insurance is due for renewal on 1st October and it was proposed Cllr Stewart, seconded Cllr Marston and agreed to continue with Zurich Municipal at a rate of £293.15 this is an increase of £9.38 due to an increase of tax implemented by the government.

Under Highway matters items discussed were Japanese Knotweed growing in Denton. Denton triangle and hay Lorries that are causing the road to collapse and these Lorries mounting the green to get around the corner. Over grown hedges on the Nesfield to Beamsley road, and site lines due to vegetation when coming off Denton suspension Bridge. Clerk to write to Highways about all the above.

Cllr Shepherd asked about MWPC role in the Harrogate District Local Plan. Only Askwith could be included in this as it is the only village large enough to be listed under Category C. As no land had previously been available then Askwith were not included in the HDLP. Further investigation is to be made in the village to see if any land was now available.

Accounts were presented and adopted and planning matters were discussed with all planning matters and decisions available on the MWPC web site.
