Dear Readers

In the meantime, some of us who lead worship have agreed to provide an item over the coming months. This is the first of those missing letters.

Such a title reminded me of a story I heard many years ago. It was of a church that had a very beautiful east window depicting the nativity scene complete with angels. The inscription read: GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGHEST.

One day some vandals damaged the window by throwing stones. In particular, they damaged the words of the text. It now read: GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGH ST. The missing letter provided a new message! The message of the angel is not to be restricted to, or only confined in, religious places – or even expressed in strictly 'religious' language.

At the time of writing this, I am preparing to conduct a funeral and several weddings. Each of them includes music and readings of what it is tempting to call a 'secular' as well as a 'sacred' nature. Nowadays many services feature this variety. Perhaps this distinction between sacred and secular is no longer a necessary or helpful one.

Whether sacred or secular, in the High St. or villages, in the rural farming community as well as in our local churches – all these places are spheres of God's presence in which Glory can be expressed and God's love experienced.




A HARVEST PUZZLE





The grant fund opportunity

The community defibrillator grant fund scheme is a partnership project funded equally between Harrogate Lions Club and Harrogate Borough Council.

The purpose of the defibrillator grant fund is to support communities across the Harrogate district to purchase a Public Access Defibrillator (PAD). A PAD allows 24 hour access to life-saving emergency equipment that is available for anyone to use when a cardiac arrest is suspected.

The successful grant applicants will be provided with a defibrillator approved by Yorkshire Ambulance Service and cabinet to enable the defibrillator to be mounted on an external wall for maximum public access. In return the successful applicant must agree to pay for installation through a local electrician (at a cost of approximately £150) - there is £20,000 available in this grant funding pot.

Applications for defibrillator grants of up to £1,195 (the cost and delivery of the defibrillator and cabinet as purchased by the Harrogate Lions Club/Harrogate Borough Council project) are available to community organisations, businesses and schools across the Harrogate district.

A total fund of £20,000 is available, it is

envisaged that this will be allocated through up to two grant application rounds. If the full allocation of funding is not achieved in the first application round a second window for applications will be in early 2019.

Applications are welcome from community organisations, businesses and schools across the Harrogate district but in particular communities with a high footfall that do not currently have access to a defibrillator. Meeting Reports

13 June 2018 – Crime Scene Investigator; Gill Donnelly a crime scene investigator gave a fascinating insight into her job and its contribution to the conviction of criminals. Gill described that protection clothing she generally donned – very similar to that worn by military personnel at chemical, radiological or nuclear scenes and told us about the 43 powders and range of tools and equipment that she used to identify all the various traces of activity and clues that are left behind at a crime scene.

Her work involves embracing medical, scientific and technological developments and she now uses a digital camera where as once she would have taken exposed film back to her dark room for development – a welcome period of peace and quiet that she misses.

She felt that television has popularised and rather falsely glamorised the work of the forensic investigator and currently there are some 250 university courses with forensics somewhere in their title. Unfortunately many have sufficient forensic content for the graduates to enter a career in the field.

She also gave us an understanding of when DNA evidence can and can't be used explaining how corroborative evidence is required since DNA traces can be transferred between people.

11 July 2018 – Crown Green Bowling; On a warm and sunny evening in July about 16 institute members gathered at Wharfemeadows Bowling Club in Otley for an introduction into the sport of Crown Green Bowling. Only four of us had played before but with the instruction and guidance of a number of helpful and encouraging club members we all enjoyed some competitive and fiercely fought games. It was a tricky green, especially after the long spell of hot weather, but we all made some good bowls and some members may even be considering joining a club!

All In The Month Of September

It was:

100 years ago, from 26th Sep to 11th Nov that the WWI Meuse-Argonne Offensive took place in France. It was the last major battle of WWI, and the American Expeditionary Force's largest and bloodiest operation of the war. Allied victory.

90 years ago, on 28th Sep 1928 that the use of cannabis was made illegal in the UK. (Medical use of cannabis was made illegal in 1973.)

80 years ago, on 30th Sep 1938 that British Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain returned to England in triumph after signing the Munich Agreement, declaring there would be 'peace in our time'.

40 years ago, on 8th Sep 1978 that the 'Black Friday' of the Iranian Revolution took place. Thousands of protestors gathered in Jaleh Square, Tehran, and ignored calls to disperse. The Imperial Army opened fire and foreign journalists reckoned that up to 4,000 people were killed. This was the pivotal event in the Iranian Revolution, and marked the beginning of the end of the Shah's regime.

Also 40 years ago, on 17th Sep 1978 that the Camp David Accords were signed in Washington DC by Israel and Egypt. They led to the Egypt-Israel Peace Treaty in 1979.

30 years ago, on 6th Sep 1988 that 11-year-old British boy Thomas Gregory became the youngest person to swim the English Channel.

20 years ago, on 4th Sep 1998 that Google, the internet search company, was founded by Larry Page and Sergey Brin, both students at Stanford University in California. The company was initially based in a friend's garage in Menlo Park.

10 years ago, on 7th Sept 2008 that the 2008 Financial Crisis was underway. The troubled US mortgage-financing giants Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac were placed into government conservatorship, under the Federal Housing Finance Agency.
