

## The View from the Vicarage

One of my late mother in law's favourite films was the 'King's Speech.' You will remember that the film tells the story of King George VI and his struggle to overcome his speech impediment in order to serve his people better. I could never tell if she liked the film so much, because of her love of the late King or because she had a soft spot for Colin Firth. Whatever the case she went to the cinema three times in a week, when the film came out.

King George by sheer hard work and determination conquered his handicap. And the encouragement he gave to the nation during the years of the Second World War played no small part in keeping our morale high.

His Christmas broadcast in 1939 was heard by the peoples of these islands and the Empire (as it then was) at a time when the future seemed very bleak indeed.

In that broadcast he quoted some lines from a poem by a Christian Missionary worker, Minnie Haskins, written while she was working in India.

I said to the man who stood at the Gate of the Year,  
'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'  
And he replied, 'Go out into the darkness, and put your hand into the Hand of God.  
That shall be better than light, and safer than a known way.'

The comfort and support that these words gave to those who heard them has become legendary. Let's hold on to these words ourselves as we journey into our New Year.

It is hard to imagine that 2021 could be any worse than the year just gone. However, there is still so much uncertainty around our future. The new vaccines will take some time to roll out to the general population but then we should be able to get back to some semblance of normality. And normality is this: some of us will have a wonderful year, for others the New Year may bring pain and grief. For most of us we will have the usual mix of good and bad which is called real life.


been changing on a regular basis which meant that making any contingency arrangements became almost impossible to organise. I do hope next year will have a better outcome.

# All in the month of January

It was:

500 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> January 1521 that German Protestant reformer Martin Luther was excommunicated from the Roman Catholic Church by Pope Leo X after he refused to recant his writings. A few weeks later, on 23<sup>rd</sup> January, the Diet of Worms was called by the Holy Roman Empire and ran until 25<sup>th</sup> May. This imperial assembly culminated in the Edict of the Diet of Worms, which branded Martin Luther as a heretic, and banned his writings.

150 years ago, on 26<sup>th</sup> January 1871 that the Rugby Football Union (RFU) was founded in England.

125 years ago, on 28<sup>th</sup> January 1896 that Walter Arnold of Kent became the first person in the world to be convicted of speeding. The speed limit was 2 mph and a person carrying a red flag had to walk in front of the vehicle. But Arnold drove at 8 mph without a flag bearer. He was chased by a policeman on a bicycle, arrested, and fined one shilling.

100 years ago, on 28<sup>th</sup> January 1921 that the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier was installed beneath the Arc de Triomphe in Paris. It honours those who died in WWI (and later also WWII) who were never identified.

80 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> January 1941 that Amy Johnson, pioneering British aviator, drowned in the Thames Estuary, aged 37. She had bailed out after her plane ran out of fuel and crashed in adverse weather conditions.

75 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> January 1946 that William Joyce (‘Lord Haw Haw’), British fascist politician who broadcast Nazi propaganda from Germany during WWII, was hanged for treason.

70 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> January 1951 that the United Nations moved into its present headquarters in New York City. It is a 39-floor building in the Turtle Bay area of Manhattan, overlooking the East River.

65 years ago, on 27<sup>th</sup> January 1956, that Elvis Presley’s hit song ‘Heartbreak Hotel’ was released. It topped the US charts in April and became his first UK hit in May of that year.

60 years ago, on 20<sup>th</sup> January 1961 that John F. Kennedy was inaugurated as the 35<sup>th</sup> President of the United States.

50 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> January 1971 that Idi Amin became President of Uganda after deposing Milton Obote in a coup.

40 years ago, on 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1981 that British serial killer Peter

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Sutcliffe (the 'Yorkshire Ripper') was arrested in Sheffield, South Yorkshire. He was charged with murdering 13 women. He died of Covid-19 in November 2020.

30 years ago, 17<sup>th</sup> January to 28<sup>th</sup> February, that the Gulf War's 'Operation Desert Storm' took place. Invading Iraqi forces were expelled from Kuwait and the Kuwaiti monarchy was restored. It was a decisive coalition victory.


25 years ago, on 27<sup>th</sup> January 1996 that the first Holocaust Remembrance Day was observed in Germany. It became International Holocaust Day in 2005 when it was adopted by the United Nations. It marks the day (27<sup>th</sup> January 1945) when the Auschwitz-Birkenau concentration/death camp was liberated.

Also 20 years ago, on 31<sup>st</sup> January 2001 that a Scottish court in the Netherlands convicted Abdelbaset al-Megrahi of the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 over Lockerbie in 1988. He was the head of airport security for Libyan Arab Airlines and a suspected Libyan intelligence officer. He was sentenced to life imprisonment but released on medical grounds in 2009 and died in 2012.



## BTO Garden Bird Watch Free Offer



The free offer does not include the book or magazines and will be online only. It will include



Garden Bird Watch is designed to find out how, when and why birds and other animals use our gardens.

Participants send in weekly lists of garden birds and other wildlife, which are analysed by scientists working under the BTO's urban and garden ecology research programmes, to investigate the links between changes in wildlife populations and factors such as garden management, food, weather and urban structure.

During this current period of uncertainty, many of us are looking to our gardens to enjoy nature and be outdoors, to learn, and to improve our well-being. BTO Garden Bird Watch (GBW) offers a great opportunity to learn more about garden birds and other wildlife, and to contribute directly to BTO's important scientific research on the value of gardens for wildlife. The more we know about how wildlife uses our gardens, the more we can make our cities, towns, villages and individual gardens better for nature.

The survey involves simply keeping a list of the birds you see visiting your garden over the course of a week, and then entering this into the BTO's online recording system. You can also record other garden wildlife, such as butterflies and mammals.


GBW is normally membership only, with an annual fee of £17, which includes an ID book and a quarterly magazine. The generous financial support of participants is what allows BTO to carry out its work monitoring garden wildlife and our scientific research.

However, we want to enable more people to get involved in garden wildlife recording under the current circumstances, to discover an enjoyable purpose in garden bird-watching, and to feel part of a community all working on the same project, even though all of us are confined to our own gardens. Therefore, we are offering free membership of the BTO Garden Bird Watch during the COVID-19 lockdown.




## The three wise men colouring—in

## The story of the Weston Series



The road between Ilkley and Otley north of the River Wharfe, is an alternate route to the A659, which winds uphill towards the villages of Denton, Askwith and Weston. A few years ago I had the desire to stop at Weston and go explore Church Lane to find All Saints Church, which is as far as it goes. It was a damp, cold and wintry afternoon similar to this month. It was a pleasure to find this Grade 1 listed building from the 11th century although not open at least I was able to access the key, of which later ...


On another day the following week I took a walk from what I would describe as a 'wayside' into 'Weston Park' which is the most easily accessed area from the west of Otley. My complete surprise was to find the most tantalising view of the Banqueting House, which stands at the edge of the Hall gardens. This is considered to be one of the finest examples of

Elizabethan architecture of its sort in the country.

I followed up my enquiries by research at Otley archive and began to piece together the associations with Farnley Hall, Washburn and Lower Wharfedale. These initial visits gave me a

have a large 'archive' of material which I can reference, although much of my print examples allow me to use my imagination to conjure some elements of this 'other' special place ...

passion for the place that inspired me to begin a three-year project to capture what I have called my 'Weston Series'. Since those first times at Weston, I have established a friendly association with the owners of the estate, and on a few occasions been able to see the Banqueting House up close, the Garden and inside the Hall.


During visits I was able capture the place with on-site drawing and supporting photography, which then enables me to produce hand drawn printing plates. These are 'etchings' and 'drypoints' which basically means to engrave, scratch or etch with acid into metal plates from which I can make copies. I

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A BTO news release a couple of weeks ago talking about the numbers of Blue Tits and Great Tits in our gardens being lower than usual got me wondering, as mine is buzzing with them.

The article said that both species have been seen in fewer gardens and in smaller numbers this year. It suggested that the fifth-warmest April in a 100 years meant that invertebrates, such as butterflies and moths, made an early appearance, which in turn altered the relative timing of their abundance and the tits' requirement for food for their hungry offspring.

Caterpillars are an important food for tit nestlings, but in warm springs they develop earlier, so there are fewer

available during the main tit nesting season, reducing the number of birds fledging.

Blue Tits are one of the most common garden birds, being seen in more than 9 out of 10 gardens during the winter months, frequently visiting garden bird feeders. They can be easily distinguished from other garden birds due to their small size and bright blue and yellow colouring.

Not all our tits have had a terrible year though. Long-tailed Tits, those small, black-and-grey birds with long "lollipop" tails, were reported more often than usual. Suggesting that they have had a successful breeding season.



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One aspect of the large numbers of tits around at the moment, is that it's easy to study the feeding strategies of the various species.

Blue tits typically take seeds away from the feeder and perch somewhere nearby to eat them. This behaviour makes it quite difficult to work out exactly how many are around. Is it the same two or three birds coming back again and again, or is it several different birds coming back from time to time, or even a flock of a dozen or so birds just passing through? They do have to stick around longer when feeding on suet balls, however, and these are an irresistible attraction for all our garden tits.

Great Tits tend to feed lower down in the undergrowth than other tits, presumably because they are larger and less agile, eating invertebrates when available, and seeds when they are not. Although sociable birds, they don't form foraging flocks, and their behaviour around feeders is decidedly hierarchical, with the dominant adults using the best feeders (closest to cover) leaving the younger birds to feed on more exposed ones where the risk of Sparrowhawk attack is greater.

They are unmistakable given their larger size, together with a black cap, collar and bib plus white cheeks. Their backs are green to blue-grey. Underneath they are lemon yellow with a central black stripe running downwards from the throat. It is wider and more strongly developed in males than in females, and it is this stripe, together with the black head that differentiates them from their smaller cousins, the Blue Tits, with their blue heads.



Both species will look for bugs on tree branches and plant stems, with the Blue Tits being just that bit lighter and more agile, and able to exploit thinner branches.

Add to this mix the Coal Tit – smaller still and less colourful, but striking due to its black and white head. They don't usually stay long, but since they cache a lot of what they take, can be very frequent visitors. Again, just how many are there? They can be quite combative too, and often you only realise that you have more than one when they chase each other off. Frequently!

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An Ordinary meeting of Mid Wharfedale Parish Council (MWPC) was held via Zoom on 20<sup>th</sup> November with all councillors attending along with Councillor Lumley of North Yorkshire County Council (NYCC) and Councillor Oldham from Harrogate Borough Council (HBC) the Clerk and one member of the public.

Items carried over from the previous meeting included the confirmation that NYCC would pay for a replacement road sign top at the Denton junction. No reply had been received from HBC regarding litter bins in the lay-by at Denton, so Clerk to write again. Nesfield phone kiosk was now available for adoption. After some discussion it was resolved MWPC would adopt this kiosk which would be looked after by Nesfield Village Committee. The Clerk had prepared a budget for the 2021/2022 precept from budgets for the previous year and next year's costing. After a discussion it was resolved that the budget should be increased by £200.00 to £4785.00 to allow for Training matters.

The appointment of the internal auditor was discussed. It was resolved that Yorkshire Internal Audit Services should be appointed for the 2020/21 year. MWPC policies had been updated and it was resolved that the following policies should be adopted en-bloc. Standing Orders, Procedures & Policies, Financial Regulations, Financial Risk Assessment, Code of Practice for Handling Complaints, Freedom of Information Publication Scheme, Freedom of Information cost, Code of Conduct.

Askwith phone kiosk was also available for adoption and after a discussion it was resolved that if a village working party could be formed to look after the kiosk then MWPC would adopt it.

Under Highway matters Councillor Caton asked for the pot holes on Moor Lane, Weston to be reported as these had been repaired in heavy rain and many had been missed and were poorly repaired. Councillor Whitley asked for the pot holes on the bend on Moor Lane, Askwith to be yet again sorted and the road crumbing away on the junction

of Askwith Lane and Moor Lane to be reinstated. Councillor Whitley also asked if the Road Narrows on Moor Lane could be reinstated as it has been knocked down. Councillor Powell asked for the roadwork's at the Junction of Hunger Hill that had started over 3 years ago to be completed. Councillor Broderick asked for the salt heaps to be replenished at Denton. Clerk to report all these items

Councillor Lumley gave a lengthy and detailed report on the current proposal for a NYCC Unitary Authority. This proposal will be submitted to the Government by the end of November with further consultation in January.

Under County and Borough matters it was reported that there was plenty of Covid19 support for residents and businesses on their respective web sites. Cllr Oldham also reported that there was a current delay approximately 30 days on house property searches. The last three months invoices were presented, resolved and cheques signed. Planning items were discussed and recorded.

The web site was up to date and transferred to the councilspace WACG web compliant site. New web address is midwharfedale.councilspace.com this address will change again soon after the application for a domain name is complete. The old WordPress site is to have a link to the new web site. Cllr Broderick and Cllr Bush reported the continuing problems with litter; fly tipping and possible drugs use in the lay-bys at Denton. Clerk to contact our local Police to try and get some police presence.

The next meeting is 18th February 2021, how and where this meeting is conducted will depend on the Covid19 situation.

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## Huevos Rancheros (a Mexican favourite)

Very quick, easy, hot and tasty, and quite light after all the rich Christmas food. Delicious with crusty bread and a crisp green salad.

### Ingredients:

- 1 tbs vegetable or olive oil
- 1 red onion, finely sliced
- 1 each red and yellow pepper deseeded and finely sliced
- 1 red chilli, deseeded and finely sliced
- 2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes
- Half tsp dried mixed herbs
- 4 large eggs
- Small handful flat leaf parsley, roughly chopped

### Method

Heat oil in large frying pan, fry onions, peppers and chilli for 3 minutes. Add tomatoes and herbs, season to taste and simmer for 3 minutes

Break an egg into a small cup. Use a wooden spoon to scrape a hole in the tomato mixture and pour in the egg.

Repeat with the remaining eggs, spacing evenly around the pan. Cover and simmer for 3 - 5 minutes until eggs are just set. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.
