

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The View from the Vicarage

'The kiss of the sun for pardon, the song of the birds for mirth, one is nearer God's Heart in a garden than anywhere else on earth.' These words by Dorothy Frances Gurney were the first lines of poetry that I ever learned. They were, and I believe still are, on a plaque in a public garden in my hometown of Stranraer. The 'Gardens of Friendship' as they are called, officially, were developed by my local town council in the 1920's. They get their official name because of the number of 'friends of the garden' who supplied plants and shrubs to the council to get the garden going. The flower beds are all bordered with granite rocks which give the garden the name that it is known by in the town; 'the rock gardens.'

Whatever their name it was here that I first read Dorothy Gurney's words about gardens. You may or may not agree with them. I am not sure that I do, at least not all of the time. As you may have noticed, I have a bit of a love hate relationship with gardens, certainly with my own garden. Just now it seems more like a sentence of hard labour, trying to get it under control, rather than a place where I might encounter God. Though God is certainly to be found in places of suffering. And there are times when looking at the delicate beauty of a flower that a glimpse of the vastness of God's glory can be seen.

If I am honest, I prefer to search for my closeness with God in the Bible, in Prayer, in the Sacraments, but that is just me. I know that many of you will feel close to God in the beauty of nature either in your own garden or in the countryside. And we are so blessed with wonderful countryside in this place. I know that many of you feel close to God in the Churchyards of our Benefice. Many, many of you have told me so and they are such beautiful places, each very different. They are places where even I can see beauty and enjoy it, especially as I don't have to do any gardening there.

News from Norwood Chapel

Dear Friends.

This year in the month of May, the Church celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost Sunday (also known as Whitsun). There are several scriptures that reference the Holy Spirit. The most popular one speaks of the Spirit descending upon the disciples, like tongues of fire (Acts 2:1-4). This occurred after Jesus was resurrected and then ascended into the heavens. Therefore, one of the symbols for the Holy Spirit is fire and the colour for Pentecost season is red. Fire also represents the passion within ourselves that the Spirit gives us ... to seek and do God's will and to share God's love with others.

There's another significant date in May for us Methodists . . . Aldersgate Day, 24th May. This date in 1738 is when John Wesley's heart "was strangely warmed," during a Bible study in a friend's home on Aldersgate Street in London. He had a personal conversion experience where he felt assurance that God in Christ had taken away his own sins and saved him from "the law of sin and death." This assurance felt like peace from God. This conversion experience happened after John was an ordained Anglican priest! So there's hope for us, clergy!

This year Pentecost and Aldersgate Sunday are on the same day, 23rd May. How appropriate that is! The Spirit was highly involved in John's experience of his warmed heart. This spiritual encounter spurred him in his theological development on grace and in his personal faith journey. This experience became a pivotal point for him which filled him with more fervour for seeking and preaching God's will and grace. And we are still talking about it 283 years later!

Several years ago I participated in a Rural Ministry retreat led by the Arthur Rank Centre. It was there that I learned about BEN and ANN. These 2 names aren't real people! They describe two different authentic spiritual journeys of Christians and these names are really acronyms.

Here is what they stand for:

- B = Before the spiritual encounter happened, this is what life was like.
- E = the Encounter: think of the Apostle Paul who was blinded by the light of Christ on his way to Damascus. A spiritual experience doesn't have to be this dramatic, but a person can usually identify that an event or encounter has happened.
- N = Now: how life is lived differently after the encounter
- A = Always have known God: Someone who has possibly grown up in a Christian family going to church and praying on a regular basis.
- N = Need to develop an owned faith: a person will need to make a personal commitment to believe in and follow Christ.
- N = Now: how life is lived differently because of this commitment

I believe the Holy Spirit is involved in both types of faith journeys. One is not Continued on next page

more real than the other; in both people seek to listen to and do God's will. In both, people receive many blessings along the way. The fruit of the Spirit can be seen; there's the presence of love, peace, joy, patience, kindness, goodness faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

As restrictions of Lockdown continue to ease, may we, as Christ's Church, seek to offer an effective Christian presence to our communities, promoting fellowship, well-being, comfort, hope and justice. I'm looking forward to a haircut - at the time of writing in Easter week, that is! Just a first small easing of coronavirus restrictions announced in March should make it possible to keep my appointment. Hopefully by the time you are reading this there will be more good news.

Rose and her community are hoping for good news. About water. Water on tap near home. And the means to conserve enough of what falls on the fields to grow and mature vital crops to feed their families. Such good news starts here, with people like us. Rose lives in Kenya and is caught in a cycle of climate chaos. From severe drought to flooding, extreme weather robs her of what she needs to survive: a reliable source of water.

When Rose was a child, there was plenty of rain that fell at the right times. It provided ample nutritious food to eat. Now, Rose's community lives with drought and hunger for months at a time. When the rains do come, they can be too heavy and lead to flooding. This has been an issue across Kenya in the last year, damaging crops that had struggled to grow. There is an earth dam just minutes away from Rose's home which collects rainwater. It should be a lifeline, but it runs out of water too guickly. Then, Rose has to walk long and exhausting journeys to fetch water for her grandchildren. The coronavirus pandemic has made this lack of water more critical for Rose's family. As we know, handwashing is one vital aspect to staying safe against the virus.

With a reliable source of water, Rose could grow fresh vegetables to eat, washburnwharfe@btinternet.com improve her livelihood and protect better her family from coronavirus. Christian Aid wants to help. Christian Aid Week 2021 is 10-16 May. As Covid -19 has not gone away we plan our collection to be mostly by distributing the familiar red envelopes and asking householders to return them locally instead of having them called-for at the door.

The Birds in Your Garden

Feeding Garden Birds during the Breeding Season

A question I am often asked is whether or not you should feed garden birds during the breeding season. Could it result in some sort of dependency on supplementary food - could it reduce the rate of growth of the young birds? The high protein content of invertebrates is vital in promoting the rapid increase in body mass of chicks, and supplementary foods rarely matches this.

Tim Harrison, when at the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO), examined this issue during his PhD and commented:

"Several studies have looked into the effects of providing extra food for birds during the breeding season, and the vast majority of these have found positive effects - for example, more young successfully reared. There remains a shortage of direct evidence from garden habitats, but the consensus indicates that spring and summer feeding will help birds as they nest."

Food shortages can occur at any time of year, and the extra food we provide via our feeders can make a big difference to the survival of many garden birds, as long as we provide the sort of high energy food that is most likely to help. Initially, most birds with young to feed will use it to sustain themselves, but if their preferred food is in short supply, they will probably take it to the nest.

Last year was a good example. Breeding is timed to exploit the availability of natural foods: earthworms for Blackbirds and Song Thrushes, and caterpillars for tits and most finches for example, so a successful outcome does require a helping hand from the weather, but not too much so! The early warm weather last year resulted in caterpillars and many other bugs emerging early in response, but birds can't change their egg laying as quickly. Egg laying dates have moved forwards by several days over the last couple of decades, but this is a slow process.

The result was a poor breeding season, certainly for most tits, and probably for other species reliant on a plentiful supply of invertebrates, and I'm sure it would have been worse had the parents not been able to top-up on the supplementary food we all put out.

Which foods are best, though? A high energy content is vital, and that means avoiding starchy foods such as bread, and instead choosing sunflower seeds, sultanas, raisins and currants soaked in water, mild grated cheese, mealworms, good seed mixtures, preferably without peanuts, soft apples and pears cut in half, bananas and grapes. These are all foods that could give nesting birds a boost. If you do put out peanuts, make sure that they are fresh and dry, and are in mesh feeders that will not allow sizeable pieces to be taken away.

So, eyes open and good luck in identifying the various scruffy individuals you will see out there before they develop their characteristic pattern of feathers! It's not always easy to identify juveniles unless mum or dad are there to help.

One final thought: if you do have cats, it's a very good idea to keep them in overnight when there are fledglings around. Much of the mayhem takes place in the early hours when adult birds



are urgently trying to fill hungry young stomachs that have had no food since the previous evening, and can be too busy to see danger lurking.

All in the month of May

It was:

200 years ago, on 5th May 1821 that Napoleon Bonaparte, Emperor of France (1804 – 1815) died of stomach cancer. He was in exile on the island of Saint Helena in the South Atlantic, aged 51.

175 years ago, on 30th May 1846 that Peter Carl Fabergé was born. This Russian goldsmith and jeweller was best known for his fabulously decorated Fabergé eggs.

150 years ago, on 11th May 1871 that John Herschel, British astronomer, mathematician, chemist and pioneering photographer died. Amongst other things, he named seven of Saturn's moons and investigated colour blindness. He was also President of the Royal Astronomical Society three times.

100 years ago, on 3rd May 1921 that Ireland was divided into Northern Ireland and Southern Ireland (now known as the Republic of Ireland).

Also 100 years ago, on 15th May, that the Royal British Legion was founded.

90 years ago, on 1st May 1931 that the Empire State Building in New York City was officially opened.

80 years ago, on 1st-7th May 1941 that the German Blitz on Liverpool left nearly 3,000 dead and 70,000 homeless. Liverpool was the second most heavily targeted British city, after London.

Also 80 years ago, on 10th May 1941 that the last major attack on London during the Blitz caused heavy damage to many important buildings,

including the Houses of Parliament, Westminster Abbey, St James Palace and Lambeth Palace, several railway stations and hospitals, the British Museum and the Old Bailey. More than 1,300 people were killed on one night. At one point during the Blitz, London was bombed for 57 nights in a row.

75 years ago, on 11th May 1946 that the first CARE packages for Europe arrived in Le Havre to help people who were starving after WWII. The first CARE packages were actually surplus US Army rations.

70 years ago, on 3rd May 1951 that the Festival of Britain and the Royal Festival Hall in London were opened. The aim of the Festival was to lift the nation's spirits by celebrating British industry, arts and science.

Also 70 years ago, on 9th May 1951 that the Lake District National Park was established. It was Britain's second national park.

Also 70 years ago, on 25th May 1951 that the British spies Guy Burgess and washburnwharfe@btinternet.com Donald Maclean fled to Moscow. They were members of the infamous Cambridge spy ring, and their whereabouts remained unknown until 1956

65 years ago, on 24th May 1956 that the first Eurovision Song Contest was held in Lugano, Switzerland. It was won by Switzerland.

60 years ago, on 1st May 1961 that betting away from racecourses was legalised in the UK and the first betting shops opened.

Also 60 years ago, on 28th May 1961 that Amnesty International was founded in London.

40 years ago, on 13th May 1981 that Pope John Paul II was shot and seriously wounded by a Turkish gunman in an assassination attempt in St Peter's Square, Vatican City.

30 years ago, on 16th May 1991 that Queen Elizabeth II became the first British monarch to address the US Congress.

25 years ago, on 30th May 1996 that Prince Andrew, Duke of York, and his wife Sarah, Duchess of York, were divorced.

20 years ago, on 7th May 2001 that Great Train Robber Ronnie Biggs returned to the UK from Brazil where he had lived as a fugitive for 36 years. He was immediately arrested and sent to prison to complete his sentence. Released on compassionate grounds in 2009, he died in 2013.

10 years ago, on 2nd May 2011 that Osama bin Laden, Saudi Arabian-born terrorist, died. Founder of al-Qaeda, he was thought to have masterminded the 9/11 attacks on the USA. Shot dead by US forces in Pakistan.




A cautionary note to May gardeners!

LOWER WASHBURN PARISH COUNCIL

Last year North Yorkshire County Council carried out remedial works in Castley to curb the bank erosion. This has unfortunately continued but in a different part of the bank. Parish representatives have met with staff from North Yorkshire to determine what further remedial measures need to be taken. The situation is being monitored regularly and

remedial measures need to be taken. The situation is being monitored regularly and updates will be published when more information is available. The Parish Council in conjunction with Otley Town Council are to jointly fund the installation of a Speed Indication Device on Farnley lane in an attempt to reduce speeding traffic. Members of the public have expressed concern over the parking of vehicle at Leathley in the vicinity of the Green. Some vehicles are parked on the triangle and on occasions have blocked access. Suggestions have been put forward for example to place double lines on the roadside to prevent parking and to call the police if vehicles are obstructing access.
