

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All in the month of October

It was:

250 years ago, on 21st October 1772 that Samuel Taylor Coleridge was born. He co-founded (with William Wordsworth) the Romantic Movement of poetry. Best known for *The Rime of the Ancient Mariner* and *Kubla Khan*.

200 years ago, on 20th October 1822 that the Sunday Times newspaper was first published in the UK.

175 years ago, on 6th October 1847 that Charlotte Bronte's novel *Jane Eyre* was first published, under the penname of Currer Bell.

150 years ago, on 11th October 1872 that Emily Davison, British suffragette, was born. A militant fighter for her cause, she died after being hit by the King's horse at the 1913 Derby.

Also 150 years ago, on 12th October 1872 that Ralph Vaughan Williams, British composer, was born.

125 years ago, on 18th October 1897 that Isabel Briggs Myers, an American personality analyst and writer was born. She created the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator with her mother, Katherine Cook Briggs.

100 years ago, on 18th October 1922 that the BBC was officially founded as the British Broadcasting Company (now the British Broadcasting Corporation.)

Also 100 years ago, on 24th October 1922 that George Cadbury died. He had transformed his father's chocolate and cocoa business into one of the world's most successful companies. He also provided low-cost housing and improved working conditions for his

employees.

90 years ago, on 1st October 1932, that the British Union of Fascists was founded by Oswald Mosley. It was banned by the British Government in 1940 and dissolved.

80 years ago, from 23rd October to 5th November 1942 that the Second Battle of El-Alamein in Egypt took place. This important Allied victory marked the beginning of the end for the Axis in North Africa.

Also 80 years ago, on 30th October 1942 that crew members from the British destroyer HMS Petard retrieved codebooks from the German submarine *U-559*, enabling cryptographers at Bletchley Park to decipher the version of the Enigma code used by U-boats.


70 years ago, on 6th October 1952 that the world premiere of Agatha Christie's play, *The Mousetrap* opened in Nottingham. It then opened in London on 25th November, and is still running, making it the world's longest-running play. It has been performed more than 28,000 times.

65 years ago, on 9th October 1957 that the Lovell Telescope began operating at the Jodrell Bank Observatory in Cheshire. At the time it was the world's largest steerable dish radio telescope. Now it is the third largest. It played an important role in the early days of space launches, as it was the only radio telescope that could detect the weak signals from rockets, satellites and space probes.



Mid Wharfedale Parish Council

An Ordinary meeting of MWPC was held at Askwith Village Hall on 18th August 2022. All parishes were represented, along with NYCC Cllr Hull the Clerk

Under previous Matters Arising, the Clerk vacancy was discussed. An advert that was compiled by Cllr Shepherd was agreed and it is to be posted on various media sights with some small costs involved. This was proposed Cllr Marston seconded Cllr Powell and unanimously resolved Cllr Marston confirmed the cutting of the Parish verges was now underway

Speed activated sign. Correspondence with NYCC in relation to a VAS (Vehicle Activated Sign) gave a cost in the region of £4000.00 plus VAT, this would be a battery operated sign so would need recharging every 2/3 weeks. The sign location would need moving every 180 days, a community group would need to be formed and they would be responsible for the maintenance, insurance, and legal requirements. After some further discussion it was proposed Cllr Bush, seconded Cllr Whitley and unanimously resolved not to pursue a VAS any further.

Under items for discussion, the "20s Plenty" campaign for getting a 20MPH speed limit through all North Yorkshire villages was discussed this was followed by a proposal from Cllr Marston seconded Cllr Whitley and unanimously resolved for MWPC to support this campaign and write to NYCC to have a 20mph speed limit throughout the streets and villages of MWPC and the county of North Yorkshire.

Under highway matters, various items were discussed including the speed and size of some tractors on the roads, over grown grass to the area within the Chapel boundary at Askwith causing poor visibility. Over hanging trees at Askwith bridge on Moor Lane Askwith. The clerk was asked to report the following to Highways. Potholes Moorside Lane Askwith, Blocked drain Common Holme Lane Nesfield, Poor road condition on Hardings Lane outside Upper Austby Farm Langbar, potholes and road

breaking up on Smithy Lane Denton, potholes on Moor lane and Chapel Lane Weston, potholes adjacent to the post box in Langbar and lack of reflectors over the moor on Hardings Lane Langbar. Raised manhole at four lane ends Askwith. Some of the items have been reported before.

Cllr Whitley, Cllr Shepherd and Cllr Marston reported back on a meeting held at Queens Hall Burley regarding the stepping stones and public access to the River Wharfe at Leatherbank. The general feeling was that little has been achieved; however, the object of the exercise was to get people to raise issues to all affected parties before moving along with a follow up course of action.

SBA Little John had confirmed receipt of the 2021/22 MWPC Audited accounts and as MWPC had claimed exception no further action or report was required. This was proposed Cllr Powell, Seconded Cllr Chivers and unanimously resolved that this closed off the audit for 2021/22

Cllr Hull reported that the new road at Kex Gill, Blubberhouses would get the go ahead in the next two months at a cost of £60m with a 18/24 month build time. Cllr Hull then gave an update on the current situation with forming the new unitary authority for North Yorkshire.

Under Members Points of Interest, Cllr Bush asked if Denton could have a modern parish notice board as the current "hole in the wall" board is no longer suitable. Clerk to investigate the costing. Cllr Caton asked if the village of Weston could have a second notice board actually located in Weston as the current notice board is located at Throstle Nest Close which is some distance from Weston. I'm sure I don't need to set the scene: we are all only too aware of the record temperatures and the recently broken drought brought about by climate change. But what longer term effect is this likely to have on the birds which live around us?

The combination of drought and heat-waves can push birds to their physiological limits, leading to lethal dehydration. Thirsty birds will also congregate at the remaining dwindling water spots which become ripe for the spread of disease as well as hot-spots for predators. The British Trust for Ornithology (BTO) warned that some of our best-loved birds were struggling to raise their second broods. They need regular summer rainfall, to create the damp conditions that bring earthworms and other soil-dwelling invertebrates to the surface. Droughts mean that worms stay down in the damper earth, so birds cannot catch enough to feed themselves or their chicks.

Hot and sunny days may be better than wet and rainy ones for butterflies, as they fly from plant to plant to lay their eggs, but they are bad news for caterpillars, a prime food source for birds feeding their young, which need plenty of moist foliage on their host plants if they are to survive.

The lack of moisture and hot temperatures also significantly decrease insect availability as they seek shelter and fly less. Invertebrates provide essential nourishment for the majority of terrestrial birds, especially for feeding to their young, and their absence will have slowed the growth of nestlings and even proved fatal for some.

Trees and shrubs too save energy just to survive through the drought. They don't produce as much or maybe any fruit, so seeds, nuts, and berries will also be scarcer, storing up problems



for the winter to come. It's not just our resident birds. How will winter migrants, which usually find food and shelter here, survive? Looking around, it is a mixed picture. Some berry-producing species such as rowan and cotoneaster look to be loaded with fruit, others such as pyracantha are not, whilst elderberries and other soft fruit seem to have variable crops depending on their situation. Some plants have gone to seed early too, often with lower yields, which may well be consumed rapidly.



A lack of water in the farmed countryside has also been implicated in the sharp decline of once common birds like the Song Thrush, Tree Sparrow and Yellow Wagtail. These species need moist soils and rich insect life to feed their chicks. Many of the small, wet areas which used to abound on and around farms have disappeared in recent years. Without conservation action there will be further population declines and range contractions in years to come.

What can we do to help? In all honesty, not a lot, but on the basis that every little does help, I have started putting out supplementary food early this year. I've kept my bird baths topped up all along and have seen many more visitors than ever before. A large mixed flock of tits

passing through made a colourful and memorable sight!

I've no idea what the situation will be this winter, but I suggest we need to be prepared for many more visitors to our feeders as a potentially serious shortfall of seeds and berries is likely. Unless we get a wetter than usual winter, the prospects for next year look grim too. Only time will tell what problems are in store for "our" birds.

60 years ago, on 15th October 1962 that British weather forecasts switched from the Fahrenheit scale to Celsius.

Also 60 years ago, from 16th to 28th October 1962 that the Cuban missile crisis began when the USA discovered that the Soviet Union had deployed ballistic missiles in Cuba. After days of tense negotiations the Soviet Union agreed to dismantle and remove the weapons. In exchange, the USA agreed not to invade Cuba, and to remove its own ballistic missiles from Turkey and Italy that were targeting the Soviet Union. Historians believe that the crisis was the closest the two countries has come to full-scale nuclear war.

40 years ago, on 11th October 1982 that Henry VIII's flagship the *Mary Rose* was raised from the bottom of the Solent, off the coast of southern England, 437 years after it sank.

30 years ago, on 13th October 1992 that the British Government announced that 31 of the country's 50 remaining deep coal mines would close by March 1993, putting 31,000 miners out of work. Six mines were closed immediately.

25 years ago, from 29th October to 24th November, that the Iraq disarmament crisis took place. Iraq had ordered all US members of UNSCOM, the United Nations Security Council's weapons inspection team, to leave. After tense negotiations with President Saddam Hussein, who briefly let them return, they left again in 1998, and did not return until November 2002. The crisis ended in March 2003 when the US invaded Iraq.

20 years ago – on 4th October 2002 that American terrorist, Richard Reid, 'the shoe bomber', pleaded guilty to trying to blow up a transatlantic flight using explosives hidden in his shoes. In January 2003 he was sentenced to life imprisonment.

10 years ago, on 22nd October 2012 that the American cyclist Lance Armstrong was banned from competitive cycling for life and stripped of all his titles including his seven Tour de France titles, for using illicit performance-enhancing drugs. After first denying the charges, he admitted he had used drugs throughout most of his career.

Gardeners Corner



September was pretty frantic, wasn't it, with all that fruit to pick, preserve or store. It certainly has been a bumper crop of apples, pears and stone fruit this year. Any windfall apples can be cut up and left to encourage birds into the garden. Not only are the birds a joy to watch, but they can also help with pest control – in my garden they have been feasting on baby caterpillars all summer and saving the brassicas from turning into lace!

Now October is upon us and we should be enjoying the cooler weather, with hopefully some rain to replenish supplies. Once the soil has had a soaking, it is a good time to move/plant trees and shrubs, so that their roots can become established while the soil is still warm.

With the dry weather trees have been losing their leaves early and the rest will fall soon; rake them off lawns where they will block out the light and provide harbour for pests. Store fallen leaves to make

leaf mould, which once rotted is an excellent soil conditioner. Try and collect them when wet and then store in a separate heap or in bin bags with holes pierced in them. After a year or so you should be rewarded with lovely leaf mould!

Bulbs and corms, such as Gladiolus, which are not fully hardy should be lifted and stored in a frost free place. Dahlias may still be putting on a show, but their tubers should also be lifted and stored this month, ready for replanting next year.

Spring flowering bulbs can now be planted for colour next year. There are so many varieties of daffodils available now with different flowering times so that your display can be extended over a long period. Don't be tempted to plant tulips yet though – better to wait until next month as they need to go into cooler soil.

Finally, enjoy the autumn colours!

1 Quart Brown Vinegar

Method

- Mince and simmer slowly till soft
- Place in Jars
- Keep for at least 6 weeks before use

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
