We welcome you to this worship material and pray that through it you will come to meet with the Lord Jesus and interact, through faith, with His Spirit. As a Christian community we are called to come together and bring our collective worship to Him. However, we know that worshiping at home can sometimes seem lonely, but the truth is that at any time of the day or night, there are Christians around the world giving praise to God: somewhere. As you watch the flame dance in the air let it remind you that Jesus is alive and active in and through us all. Then as we move into our worship let's allow the words of Singing the Faith (StF) 313 to draw us even deeper into worship as we raise our voices in joyous praise:

Reflection

May the words of this reflection and the meditation of our hearts be pleasing in your sight, O Lord, our Rock and Redeemer.

One of the key themes that runs through Mark's gospel is that of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus. In our passage from Mark, we hear about how a rich man (Matthew tells us that he was young, whereas Luke says that he was a ruler – hence the usual translation 'the rich young ruler) comes to Jesus and asks what appears to be a good question to pose to this *good* and gifted teach.

It appears from the question, that the man has previously spent some time listening to Jesus, and had a general idea of his message, but as we will see, he had missed the whole point. The problem that the man had was that he could only see the world through the lens of his own life. Hence his question, 'What must I do to inherit eternal life?' – what must I do, what must I do...? My guess is that whenever he wanted anything his wealth had previously allowed him just to get it – and he had grown to expect it.

It is clear that Jesus has immediately decerned the problem, and Mark begins to lay it out for us, in the form of the challenge to the young man – 'you know the commandments (Exodus 20 – before you read on look at this passage a pray over those commandments missing and those included by Jesus).

Spoiler alert – Jesus misses out the first four commandments (the ones that the young man no doubt thought should be the most important – and they are, but only when founded on the last six) and goes straight to the last six (placing number five to the end – I will leave you to think why?). That is, Jesus concentrates on those commandments that have to do with human relationships – community.

This passage used to remind me of those little 'I Spy' books, where the intention was to collect all the objects identified in the book and place a tick in the box next to them. There were always some that were easy, so in the I Spy at the Beach, there was such things as sandcastles, but then there were always those that you never managed to get. The result of this was generally to make you give up part way through the holiday. Now this 'rich young ruler' had gone beyond the normal and appears to have almost completed the set. So, the man asks, 'What must I do?' knowing that as so many do, that there is still something missing in his life.

Jesus response is, 'everything'. Jesus challenges him with selling all that he owned and following him. The problem was that the man's obedience was based on calculations of self-interest rather than on a single-hearted love of God (commands 1 to 4) that was prepared to fling everything away.

Isaiah pointed to the kind of kingdom that God would inaugurate. One where the marginalised and poor would be comforted and enabled to live full and meaningful lives, free from all the bondages of life that restrict so much potential. And finally in their address to the UN the world's Christian leaders are again laying

down the challenge, in particular to those of us living in relative comfort – make a meaningful sacrifice. It is not just up to world leaders at COP26 to save the earth, but each and everyone of us can make a difference. This is a part of the call to be a disciple in 2021.

Genesis 2: God placed mankind in the world till it and keep it. Amen.

Prayers of intercession

People complain that they do not always see the answers to their prayers, as promised by Jesus. As we come to prayer let us focus on the possibility, that we might actually be, the answer to the prayers of others.

We thank you for the selfless love shown by so many in the health and caring communities. We remember all those known directly by us, but also for those suffering alone and seemingly uncared for. Through Christ we reach out to the least of these and pray that we might be given the opportunity to show real practical love over the next week.

Lord hear our prayers and show us how to respond to the prayers of others. Amen.

Maybe in response to our prayers, you could take time call on a neighbour, preferably someone that you do not already know, and introduce yourself. I will not tell you what do next, but trust the Spirit to guide you – God Bless you as you channel His Love into the world.

In the opening reading from Philippians we are reminded that it is by acting in a selfless way, centred on the needs of others, that we will bring our true worship and glory to God.
