



AN ORDINAND'S JOURNEY

In the last edition of our parish magazine I told you about Diocesan panel where the diocese sponsors their candidates to go forward for national selection if they pass successfully. I was blessed to be selected and so began the process of preparing to go forward to the Bishops Advisory Panel along with candidates not only from here in Carlisle Diocese but also many other diocese across the country. Normally the process consists of numerous interviews, presentations and scenarios spread over several days, but due to covid this was not possible. Our BAP was to be done online via Zoom which I am sure some of you are probably now familiar with. I have to admit that not being much of a techie myself I had never heard of Zoom prior to covid, however I found it incredibly valuable during the pandemic for keeping in touch with family, friends and colleagues and I still use it regularly to save costs travelling to meetings in the car.



A few weeks before the BAP the candidates are sent the schedule of times and meetings they are to attend along with a little bit about the panel members who will be assessing them throughout the process. I had four assessors all of whom had impressive credentials having served not only as parish clergy, but also as college deans, theology teachers and doctors. I cannot deny that the idea of meeting these people was very intimidating because they were all so qualified. I was emboldened slightly by the thought that at least I would be facing the panel in the comfort of my own home.

I did not sleep very well on the night before the BAP as doubts kept whirling round in my head about whether I was doing the right thing or if indeed I was a little bit mad to put myself through all this at my age. As ever I turned to prayer to give me courage and I knew I simply had to lean on God and the support of my wife to see me through. I knew that what ever happened would be according to his will and not mine. As I sat waiting to dial into the call I checked and double checked that I had everything I needed, that I had answers to potential questions that I might be asked and of course a strong cuppa just out of sight of the camera on my laptop. Suddenly the notification flashed up on my screen that I was being admitted into the meeting and I took a deep breath. Here goes nothing I thought, there is no going back now.

This was the moment I had been preparing for since I had begun discerning God's call nearly four years earlier. All the meetings, the prayers, the studying and learning had all led me to this crucial moment. My heart was in my mouth and then suddenly as sense of calm came over me and I settled down to await the questions to begin.

Like the diocesan panel the day began with my presentation and then I was questioned on what I had said. The panel asked very searching questions some of which seemed almost unrelated to what I had spoken about, but I knew they were trying to dig deeper into my beliefs and faith and I answered to the best of my ability. The questioning all related to the carefully set down criteria that the church uses to assess a candidates calling, they need to understand whether the person sat before them has a genuine calling to ministry or is it to something else. The morning session ended and I really felt that things had not gone well at all. I hoped that things might improve in the afternoon, which luckily they did.

In my opinion the afternoons interviews were much smoother and I felt that I answered the questions with greater ease. By the time the day came to a close I was utterly exhausted and emotionally drained. We closed in prayer and the panel told me that they would confer together and in around ten days time they would let my diocese know the outcome of the interviews. I have never known ten days seem like six months in all my life. As I awaited the results of the BAP I reflected on what I would do if I got turned down for training. I had spent so long preparing that I couldn't imagine my life without going forward for training. It was a nerve wracking time filled with days of confidence followed by days of self doubt. Exactly ten days later I was returning from picking little David up from school when my phone rang. It was Peter Clement our DDO. I answered the call and awaited the verdict. "Congratulations, you have been recommended for training for ordained ministry", came Peter's chirpy voice on the other end of the line. I think I said something like God be praised and burst into tears. My wife, Donna was with me and Peter spoke to her too as he knew only too well how this whole process had been part of both our lives for a long time. He advised us to celebrate that evening as it was well deserved. Over the following days the reality set in and knew that I had to begin preparing myself mentally and spiritually for beginning college in the September. I couldn't believe it, I was going to theological college to be trained as a Priest in the Church of England...And I will tell you more about that in the next edition. Have a very blessed Christmas.

Alterations to St. James' Whitehaven

Garden of Remembrance

The PCC of The Parish of Whitehaven has been in discussion for some while over how best to maintain the Garden of Remembrance. We came to certain conclusions at our meeting of 26 September 2022, and felt we should do our best to give warning of what will result in a few changes to this area. As it is nearly impossible to contact everyone with a historical connection to the Garden, the following action was agreed:

For at least the next 4 weeks (including 4 Sundays), this notification will appear here and on our public notice boards, in the next two editions of the Parish Magazine, on display in the Garden of Remembrance, and on our website homepage. Could we also urge you (if this is relevant to you) to pass on this information to any persons you feel need to know about our intentions.

The Changes

It is our intention, in the Spring of 2023, to clear the planted areas (NOT GRASSED AREAS) under the memorial plaques of both gardens and lay gravel down, onto which the Memorial Pots will be replaced.

We have sought professional advice for these alterations to the Garden, and will engage a respected professional to carry out the work.

None of the cremated remains will be disturbed during this work. However, those with concerns should talk to the minister Revd Robert Jackson (revrobjackson@live.co.uk; telephone: 01946 696932), or speak to one of the Wardens.

Our sole intention in undertaking this work is to respect the memory of the persons whose remains are interred in the Garden, and in so doing to honour our Saviour.




St James East End Repairs

In April this year work started on the repairs to the east end wall at St James' church. The project has taken longer than expected but the work is now nearing completion.

The wall was pressure washed to remove the old paint, the plasterwork has been stabilised and a new layer of lime wash applied.

Dear Friends,

Isn't it surprising how our values can alter with changing circumstances?

When the Titanic sank 100 years ago some surprising things happened. Survivors spoke of the calm heroism of the Captain, the officers and the crew. They also told of the courage of the bandsmen who played 'Nearer my God to thee' as the ship went down. And a story is told of a woman who when she had been allotted a place in one of the life-boats ran back to her cabin, where her money and other personal valuables littered the floor. She ignored them, snatched up some oranges, and dashed back to the life-boat. An hour before it would have seemed incredible to that lady that she would have preferred oranges to her 'valuables', but tragedy transformed values.

We cannot live without air, water and food. Things are of value, not when they are rare, but when they are indispensable. St. Paul said: 'Look not at the things that are seen, but at the things that are not seen; for the things that are seen are temporal, but the things that are not seen are eternal' (2 Corinthians 4:18). We should be aware of putting a low value on things of eternal value.

Jesus said: 'What good will is it for a man if he gains the whole world, yet forfeits his soul?' (Matthew 26:16). All people should pay attention to their 'souls' or 'inner being' or 'Spiritual life'. For that which is unseen, is in reality, of eternal value and should be attended to in the same way as we breathe, drink and eat. Even if you have paid little attention to some of my teaching over the past seven years of my incumbency in Whitehaven, remember this: tend to your spiritual life.

My closing words to you are about holding on too and investing in those things which are truly valuable. Follow Jesus commands to 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and love your neighbour as yourself' – And Good Things Will Happen!

So, Keep The Faith, Stay True, and may the Lord bless you!
