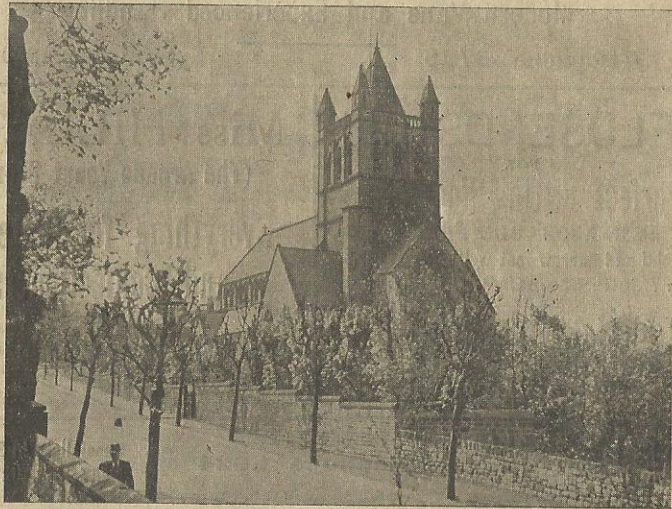

At our last Council Meeting most of the time was spent in discussing an Autumn Programme. The Council arranged to hold Gift Day on Saturday, 3rd December. Here are a few other dates for your diary—Friday, 23rd September, G.F.S. Jumble Sale; Friday, 30th September, Pie Supper; and on Friday, 21st October, there will be a Coffee Evening.

The main event will be the Patronal Festival which will commence at 6.15 a.m. on St. Edward's Day, 12th October, with a Parish Communion followed by a Parish Breakfast in the Church Hall. Other arrangements will be announced in due course.

Dear Folks,

I am sorry to disturb your serenity, but I must talk to you about money, or the shortage thereof. As your treasurer it is my duty to do so, much as I dislike it.

At the present time I have accounts amounting to about £170, and there is nothing in the current account with which to pay them. True, there is a small amount in the fabric fund, held there for emergency, but this is nothing. A major collapse of the organ, or a burst boiler—both are to be expected—and the fabric fund would not be large enough. I shall have to borrow from this fund to pay the accounts, but it will have to be returned before December 31st, 1955. If we let our fabric fund dwindle any lower, we shall be committing financial suicide, and we shall also be a disgrace to our forbears.

The Church Council is doing its best to cut down expenses, will you in turn please try to give a little more to your Church. For those who do not come to Church as often as they used to, may I say we are trying to keep the place clean and in good repair, against the time when they may need it.

If you cannot support our forthcoming events, will you please give a subscription direct to Church Funds.
