Ministerial Musings

The last four months have been difficult. So much has been bad; so much has been lost: seeing friends and family when we want and being physically close to them; shopping; going out socially to pubs, cinema, theatre and concerts; going to school or work. It has been a shared experience, something we have all endured. Further afield we have witnessed some appalling behaviour such as the killing of George Floyd in America; the selfishness of an American president buying up the world's stock of an anti-covid drug; the neglect of those in Yemen, suffering from prolonged war combined with starvation, cholera and now covid-19; and much more.

Personally, one of the things I have missed most is singing—singing in the choirs of which I am a member; leading the junior choir at school; singing in church; a concert trip to France with other singers; singing with toddlers and residents at Saxon House. The joy and emotional uplift that come from being a group singing together is a great thing, whatever the music.

But there has also been much good which has come about in the last four months. Our sense of community has grown as people have supported and encouraged one another; people have discovered skills in making masks, scrubs and bags for the NHS; we have discovered the true value of many of the poorer-paid workers whose jobs we once overlooked; and we have looked at our natural environment with new attention and wonder.

As we emerge from this time, slowly and surely, I have been wondering what opportunities the pandemic has presented to us. Perhaps it has given us a chance to think again about what we want our local community to be like; what we want our wider society to be like; what we want our world to be like in the days to come.

The prophet Micah lived nearly 3000 years ago. He spoke about the social ills of his day: the rich getting richer at the expense of the poor; wealthy landowners grabbing what they could; the cruelty with which leaders treated other people. He announced God's truth into the situation:

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; And what does the Lord require of you? To do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God.

How do we keep the good that we have re-discovered, in our communities and our country and root out and remove that which is bad? How do we build a just society where everyone can flourish irrespective of their wealth, their race, their beliefs? How can we be kind to our environment so that it is valued and protected against further damage? How can we learn humility and put the needs of others before our own?

We must each find a voice and use it, confident that if enough speak out we will be heard and acted on. Then maybe our hearts will sing with the joy that can be found when people are treated justly and with kindness and with true humility.

As the Covid-19 crisis decreases, we are turning out attention to forming a permanent group - ChetChat – which will tackle loneliness and isolation amongst our older friends and neighbours. Play Areas: *The Pits* is now open. Parents are reminded to ensure children observe social distancing. Frequent use of hand sanitiser is recommended. *Grebe Drive* will remain closed on safety grounds and while awaiting refurbishment.

Grebe Drive Refurbishment: The original decision to implement a play scheme by Kompan was revoked on cost grounds. A new quote from Action Play and Leisure was adopted. Approximately £32k has been raised so far and a further £18k is still required. Fundraising is on-going.

Brian Clarke Rooms: Currently closed but plans are being made for re-opening.

Licensing Applications:

20/00321 - New Premises Licensing Application - HSS Supplies Ltd T/A Cannell's Farm Produce, 1 Langley Rd, Units GA, GG and GH, Chedgrave NR14 6HD - various views were expressed and the Clerk is to seek further clarification on some details. The PC response will include: general concern at the increased availability of liquor in the village, disabled access to the premises and a query on the precise area for alcohol sales within the shop.

Wherryman's Way: The Working Group held a meeting and it was agreed that a letter will be sent to NCC requesting a meeting and further clarification on their plans.

Grass Cutting: Matters relating to grass cutting were discussed. NCC and the Environment Agency are responsible for Langley Rd and Wherryman's Way paths respectively and they have been made aware of parish concerns re mowing. Some changes to the Pits mowing schedule were agreed on a 1-year trial basis with a view to encouraging more pollinating insects.



Observations on shielding.

To say this is a year to remember is definitely an understatement. Overnight in March we were virtually placed under lock and key, a certainly life changing experience. Thankfully there was still a garden, but for a while the rest of the world disappeared and we relied on other family members to fetch food and prescriptions and shop for all the things we realised we had not got.

Anxious to be 'doing something' we ventured into the garden but bitterly cold winds prevented much activity. These were followed by extraordinarily high temperatures which were equally unacceptable. However there were plenty of jobs for indoors so cupboards were spring cleaned and there was much sweeping and dusting, and a good number of filled dustbin bags.

Probably the biggest difference we noted was silence. No constant traffic noise, fewer aircraft and a sky brighter and more blue than it had been for many years. Those who rose early were treated to a dawn chorus which was quite amazing. In May the swifts returned and showed us an extraordinary display of aerobatics. Somehow with their return the world seemed a better place.

Late in June my granddaughter took me for a ride in the car. This was strange. The last time I had been out the trees and hedgerows were almost bare. Now they were in full leaf and flowering. Eventually in July I had my first real trip out, and oddly enough it was to a graveyard. Walking in the sunshine and looking at the flowers was sheer delight, and it was so enjoyable to hear again the calls of the doves and the jackdaws.

However, this first outing was not all pleasure and in fact it was quite worrying. Should I be here? Should I speak to anyone? Ought I still to be safe at home? Will I take the virus home? How strange the whole world is threatened by an organism much too small to see.

Perhaps we needed a lesson on what in life is really important. What we want and what we need are two very different things. We have learnt just how much the family means. As free gifts we have sun, blue skies, clear air, flowers and birds. It is time to look at what we have and be very grateful.



Loddon and District Local History Group

Sadly there is no news yet of meetings resuming. The speakers who were booked have agreed dates for next year. Activity has not stopped completely.

We have had several communications from **Robin Sampson & Laura McCourt the Archive Project staff** who are now in post and are as frustrated as we are that they cannot yet get out to visit the various groups. They are busy ordering equipment for us all to use to digitise items in the archive and also lap tops for each of the participating group.

The mini biographies in Loddon Churchyard have been renewed and some updated.

Work is underway to produce tithe map information for the surrounding parishes similar that for Loddon and Chedgrave on display in the church.

This month's item from the **Churchwardens Accounts** is again related to the defence of the nation. In February 1626 Charles I was crowned and later, in July, he dissolved Parliament. England unsuccessfully invaded La Rochelle in support of the Heugonots.

In the 1626 Churchwardens Accounts of William Belson & Robert Davey we find the following:

laid out to Kempe the Cunstable upon	
a warrant that Cam from the Leftenant for	£1=4=0
the making of mounts at yarmouth	

We find from Norfolk Heritage Explorer <u>http://www.heritage.norfolk.gov.uk/</u> that the walls of Yarmouth were not strong enough for canons to be mounted upon them, so that mounds or Mounts were built as canon emplacements, the first in 1569 which became the **New Mount** in 1588, the second, **South Mount** was built in in 1570. These defences seem not to have been very effective. It was not until 1626 that the **Main Guard** was built in response to raids by pirates. The good people of Loddon were required to contribute to its construction. The **Main Guard** was levelled in the 1970's.

We find in **Norfolk Archaeology, Or, Miscellaneous Tracts Relating to the Antiquities of the County of Norfolk, Volume 2 1847 a**n article by James Copeman Esq Solicitor of Loddon tells us that: (please see Table on p45)

A copy of the complete article is held in the Parish Deposit at the NRO, and, when we are able to have access to our archive again, can be seen in the Local Studies Room in Loddon Library.

You will know to what this refers. A Copy of the Warrant of the Deputy Lieutenant, dated from the Maid's Head, Norwich, 6th April, 1626, is given in Swinden's *History*, p. 119, addressed to the Chief Constables of every Hundred in Norfolk, for a "Contribution towards the repairs of the Town of Yarmouth, and the walls, bulwarks, and forts there, in this time of danger, against attempts of the enemy; and it is to be presumed that there is no man that carrieth a true heart to his sovereign and to his country, but for the honor of the one, and the security of the other, he will willingly contribute."

Sunshine on Open Gardens

Read Any Good Books Lately?

"I went away in my head, into a book. That was where I went whenever real life was too hard or too inflexible." Neil Gaiman (The Ocean at the End of the Lane)

"Once Upon a River," by Diane Setterfield

Diane Setterfield has written a most unusual book, with the Thames at the heart of it. One night a man stumbles into a village pub carrying a baby girl who is, to all intents and purposes, dead, having drowned in the river. From then on the story includes kidnapping, miraculous recoveries, floods, families, pig farming, community, early photography, evil doers and good neighbours! All in the early nineteenth century. It is beautifully written and compulsive reading.

"The Wardrobe Mistress," by Patrick McGrath

This is written in an odd, but intriguing way, in that the story appears to be written by a group of unseen/invisible beings. The wardrobe mistress of the title, Joan, was married to one of the lead actors of a theatre company. When the story opens he has just died and his funeral is taking place. The couple have a daughter, Vera, who is an actress - also a significant character in the story.

The novel is set in the period of Moseley and the Blackshirt Fascists of the 1940s. The author captures the post-war atmosphere with real authenticity, including the poverty of a great many people and the scarcity of food, etc., as well as the rivalry amongst many thespians. He also shows the reader an understanding of how Joan's behaviour after the funeral is a result of grief mixed with anger that her husband had died.

"Change of Heart," by Jodi Picoult

Titles of books are often one of the interesting things which make us pick up a book from a shelf - the others usually being the cover and the name of the author. This particular title is a very clever one. The story is based on the transplanting of a heart for a young girl. It's not a straightforward situation; the thirty three year old man wanting to donate his heart to the girl is a convicted murderer, convicted for killing her father and half-sister seven years earlier.

Jodi Picoult has written many books with complex and moving situations at the centre of them. This one is particularly complex and very moving - more so than most. She has created some really vivid characters, all very different from any of the others. There are questions of religion and the law to be considered, as well as the seeming resemblance (in many ways) of the believed murderer to Jesus Christ. There are also questions regarding the rights and wrongs of capital punishment, and the different methods used. Many issues of all kinds are debated, but they are never boring and you may well find yourself caught up intellectually and compassionately by them, possibly even caring very much for some of the characters - and especially being most concerned as to how things would end.



Read Any Good Books Lately?

"Without Reservations," by Alice Steinbach

A non-fiction book written by a middle-aged American lady, who is a journalist by trade. Having come into sufficient funds, she decides to take a year off from work in order to travel to places she's always wanted to see. Wherever she goes (Italy, France, the UK) she easily makes friends and, to help preserve some of the memories later on, she writes postcards to herself, sending them to her home so that she can re-read them later. It's an unusual sort of book, but it is interesting.



This year, we are not so excited about the summer holidays as we are normally - but more looking forward to going back to school in September!!



Gardening Notes

From the Garden...

Looking back over the year so far, some things weren't very successful, the Tragopogon seeds I sowed germinated but haven't grown big enough to plant out in the garden, so I will overwinter them and plant out next spring, and only one Lochroma seedling appeared so I will try again next spring. The peanuts are looking good but I will only find out at harvest time if there will be enough to go with my Friday night G&T. The three varieties of tomatoes were very successful; I may be looking for 101 ways to cook with tomatoes!

Like many I have revitalised an area of the garden whilst in lockdown, planting a shady corner with Hydrangea Pink Diamond (the white cone shaped flowers will fade to pink) and Choiysa Ternata Brica (otherwise known as Sundance - not sure why it has several names). I have used it in other parts of the garden as it adds a lovely yellow splash in the border with white scented flowers. I have also added Hakonechioa Macra Aureola, a golden grass which will grow to 30cm and a hardy Geranium Midnight Ghost with dark purple leaves and white flowers. In order to introduce some height I have planted a climbing fuchsia, Lady Boothby.

Many of our local gardens are now opening for visitors; some will need to be pre booked and although they won't be serving teas they will still have plants for sale. Raveningham Hall and Bressingham Gardens are both on my list for a visit. Raveningham have a new stumpery which I am keen to see.


From the allotment...

Hopefully, you are all enjoying your fruit and veg harvest, busily picking and eating, freezing and preserving. Keep feeding those crops still growing. I use liquid seaweed, widely on sale, but prefer to make my own comfrey or nettle feed. This is simple; all you need is a bucket stuffed with either and then filled with water. Leave it two weeks until it rots down. You'll know when it is ready from the smell. Dilute and use.

Also continue to plant those vegetables that will grow quickly enough to be harvested before winter or will stand over it. The usual things to consider are those quick growing crops like lettuce, rocket, radish and winter salads. There is still time to grow more chard and beetroot. I have had success planting autumn carrots in late July/August and harvesting into December. To avoid carrot fly don't plant into the same space as the early carrots. In my rotation these will go into the space left in my seedbed after planting out my leeks. The leeks will go where the new potatoes grew.

It is also time to collect and dry seed from peas, beans, and squashes. These are all simple to do, but if you feeling adventurous try some others. You should also start putting some things to bed e.g. cutting down the finished summer fruiting raspberry canes and tying in the new canes. Cut back the tops so they don't extend too far above the top wire to avoid wind damage.
