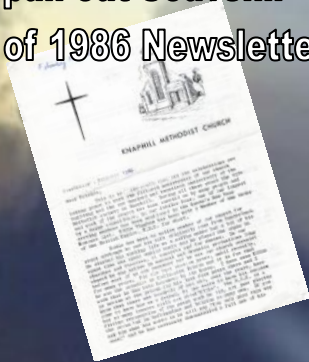

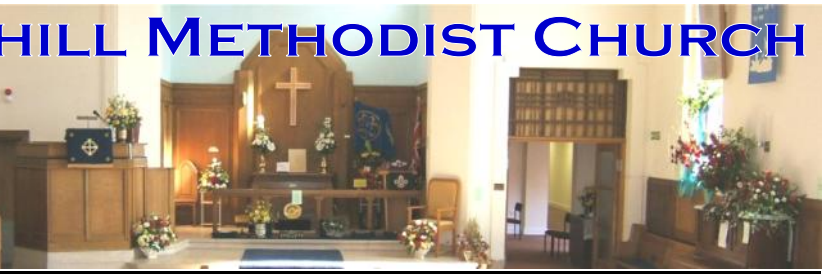

SUNDAY SERVICES

10am - Morning Worship (includes Junior and Youth Church)

Our services are warm and cordial. We include traditional and contemporary hymns and songs, led by our Worship Group. The first 15 minutes of the service includes children and young people before going to their own groups.

The sermons are Bible based and are often themed over several weeks.

Holy Communion is generally on the second Sunday of every month.

After the service everyone is welcome to join us for refreshments, a time for a chat and to get to know any visitors.

6.30pm - Monthly Evening Holy Communion

This is usually the fourth Sunday of the month. This is a small intimate service of Communion with about 15 or so people, many from other churches in the village. You will be made most welcome.

2nd Sunday of the month - Holy Trinity church at 6.30pm.

3rd Sunday of the month - St Saviour's church, Brookwood at 6.00pm.

Message from Dave:



Dear Friends,

When life was grim in my last appointment, this was my lifeline Bible verse:

Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain. (*1 Corinthians 15: 58*)

‘Your labour in the Lord is not in vain.’ I needed to hear that. So much of what I did seemed pointless. I wonder whether you’ve had seasons in your life like that?

The interesting thing for me is where that verse comes in the Bible. It’s the final verse in 1 Corinthians 15, which is Paul’s great chapter on the Resurrection. Paul says, it is the Resurrection of Jesus that makes everything we do worthwhile. It’s worth pondering why.

The Resurrection shows us that God cares about the material creation. Jesus was raised *bodily*, and the promise we have is that we too shall be raised to a new resurrection *body*. A ‘spiritual body’, as Paul calls it earlier in the chapter – that is, one animated by the Holy Spirit – but a body nevertheless. Our future is not as disembodied souls floating on clouds. I cringe when I hear Christians say at a funeral that the body meant nothing, because it was just a shell for the real person. That isn’t New Testament Christianity.

The Resurrection of Jesus promises our resurrection at the end of time. It is of a piece with the vision in Revelation 21, cribbed and expanded from Isaiah, that God will bring a new creation – new heavens and a new earth. God is making all things new, even the physical things.

The Resurrection doesn’t mean we merely dream of going to heaven when we die. It gives meaning and purpose to our actions now. When we act according to the will of God, we are building for God’s kingdom.

So justice matters. Work matters. Food and drink matter. Clothing and shelter matter. Loving God and loving our neighbour go together, because Easter points us to the God who will renew his creation. He has begun with Jesus.

‘Your labour in the Lord is not in vain’ indeed. God is taking all those quiet or simple acts of righteous love, and building them into his great future.

Let’s make a difference on earth this Easter, for the sake of the Kingdom.

Memories of Ivy Ross

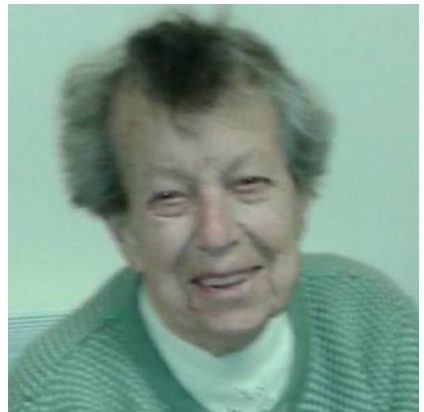
Ivy sent her three children to Sunday School and two of them are still actively involved in other churches. She then began coming to church more regularly and started helping Ella with the Youth Club.

Director's Comments

Never underestimate the power of a meal

Did you know that one of the world's largest trees, the sequoia tree, which grows to be around 250 feet tall, starts with a seed that is smaller than the size of a fingernail? God's creativity in nature reminds me that he often works in our lives in the same way — using something small, to help grow a big change within us.

We see this miracle, first hand, every day at the Mission.

Hurting men and women come through our doors searching for a meal, a way to curb the nagging hunger pains in their stomachs. But once physical hunger is satisfied, we see how God's love begins to work within hearts to reveal a hunger that runs much deeper. These men and women are starving for a fresh start, for someone to believe in them, and for the resources needed to get back on their feet.

What starts as just a meal, becomes an invitation to lasting hope, to transform their futures through our advice and counselling services, career counselling, and mentoring.

We have seen a 37% increase in new people looking for help this year and this winter we are expecting many more hurting neighbours to come through our doors. Each person will bring their unique circumstances and needs, but we trust that God's love meets them just where they are. He will work miracles inside hearts... often beginning with something as simple and small as a hot meal.

The "summer slump," when donations decline dramatically, is a particularly difficult time for the Mission. Thankfully, we know we can count on good friends like you to help make The Whitechapel Mission a place people can turn to when they have nowhere else to go.

Your generosity provides meals, but as you can see, it doesn't end there. Your compassion also provides hope, a reminder of God's love and an opportunity for lasting life change at a time when people need it most.

Thank you for your heart for our hungry and hurting neighbours.

Refurbishment Never Stops

This time last year we were looking forward to the refurbishment of the men's showers and that has been completed at a cost of £30,000. It had been 20 years since the previous refurbishment and the shower rooms were looking old and tired, with water damage to the ceilings, tiles off the walls and patched-up plumbing making for a poor environment in which to take a shower. The number of men able to take a shower before all the hot water had been used up was limited to around 75. If you were number 76 you had to make do with a cold shower! Or go without.

Thanks to some generous funding by City supporters, the whole area was gutted and rebuilt, with new tiles on the walls and ceilings, new non-slip flooring, all the plumbing replaced and modern shower equipment installed and new boilers put in capable of producing more hot water to increase the number of showers that can be taken each day. Now instead of 75 hot showers each day we can provide up to 150.

Shower's for the men are available Monday to Friday from 7.30am until 9.30am, with an opportunity to choose replacement clothing after they have taken a shower. Giving them this opportunity is important; without thinking, 2015 Annual Review 4 19,932 showers have been taken we open the wardrobe door each morning and select what we want to wear that day. Being homeless denies this choice because with no bedroom comes no wardrobe and with no wardrobe comes no clothes. And no clothes = no choice. There is no charge for the clothing and individuals are not restricted in the number of visits they may make to the showers or clothing area in any week; after all, how many of us take a daily shower and we aren't living on the street!!



With that task completed, we are now starting a refurbishment of the kitchen. Our kitchen is used 365 days a year to offer a full cooked breakfast to an average of 300 homeless and vulnerable men and women each day, as well as lunches and other meals. It is 10 years since they were last refurbished and they are desperately in need of a face lift and some new equipment.

- The cookers no-longer auto-ignite, the doors have a habit of closing whilst items are being removed and the legs are now being propped up with a brick and a couple of tiles.
- The hot cupboard doesn't always get hot enough and the doors have lost their runners.

We are trying to raise £9,750 to replace the 2 cookers and Bain-Marie, and a further £1,250 to replace and upgrade some kitchen units, add a new workbench for making tea and coffee and replace the hot water boilers needed for making the hot drinks.

Maintaining The Whitechapel Mission is an on-going task that never comes to an end!

Our year of special events to mark our 150th Anniversary as a Methodist Society in Knaphill is now in full swing. We've had the privilege of hearing the Chair of the South East Methodist District preach in February as well as thrilling to the sounds of the Almac Bisley Brass Band and learning more about Knaphill through the highly informative presentation of local historian Iain Wakeford.



The next event in the calendar is the exhibition "From Pub to Pulpit" over the Easter Weekend. A committee has been working hard over the last few months to gather together documents, photos, and other memorabilia to tell the story not just of the church but also of the village. The exhibition will be a look-back in time (don't be surprised to find a photo of a younger version of yourself somewhere in the display!) but will also celebrate the ways in which the church and its people serve each other and the community today. The exhibition will include displays provided by some of the organisations which use our premises.

We do hope that as many of you as possible will be able to drop in. The exhibition will be open as follows:

Easter Saturday March 26th: 10:00am – 4pm

Easter Sunday March 27th: 11:30am – 4pm

On Sunday 17th April we have a special guest preacher, Rev Stephen Robinson. Stephen qualified as a Local Preacher when he and his wife were members of our church in the 1960s. He later candidated for the Methodist Ministry and served in Kenya, East Anglia, Devon and Guernsey. Now retired and living in Northern Ireland, Stephen is very much looking to renewing acquaintance with KMCC.

The next big event of our Anniversary year is the weekend of 11th – 12th June. Details are still being finalised but we are looking forward to hosting a Community Flower Festival at

church over that weekend. The Flower Festival will be between 9am and 6pm on Saturday 11th June and between 11:30am and 3:30pm on Sunday 12th June. A number of local groups and businesses will be providing floral displays and the church should look really beautiful. Refreshments will be served throughout.

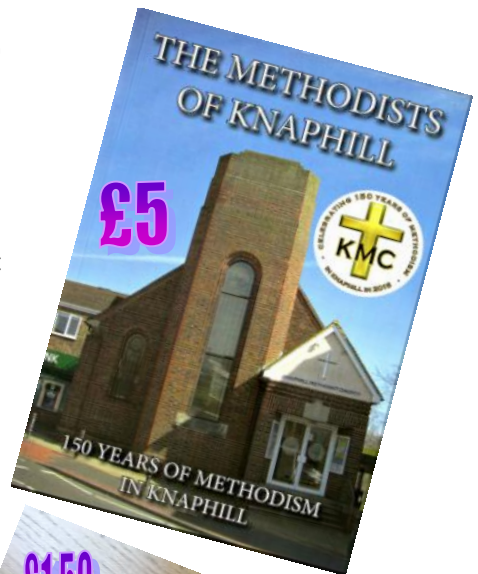
On 25th June there will be a children's anniversary celebration. If you have children (or grandchildren) who would like to attend, please let Debbie Faulkner know.

Dear Friends,

This is it! The month when all the celebrations are taking place to mark the fiftieth anniversary of our church building and the one hundred and twentieth anniversary of the Methodist society in Knaphill. During all these years the life and work of the church has been carried on by many people and by a happy coincidence, in our Jubilee Year, one of our longest serving members has been mentioned in the Queen's New Year Honours List. Eddie Wiggham has been made a Member of the Order of the British Empire, M.B.E. for short.

Eddie has been an active member of our church for years although he and his wife originally came from Sunderland. He started his working life as a coffin maker but a lot of his spare time was spent making music and he played the organ in churches and theatres, at concerts and for dances. In our church he was active in musical and dramatic productions long before most of us can remember and he was our church organist for many years. For the last sixteen years, until recently, he was the organist at Collingley Prison and it is for that work that he has been honoured by the Queen. I have seen Eddie in action at the prison for his last five years there and I know that there are hundreds of men who, over the years, have come to know him as a friend. No one seems to know his surname but so many inmates still ask about "Eddie". The M.B.E. is a fitting recognition of the great work he did, not just playing the organ but in befriending and helping so many men. If you ask him what his motto is he will say "You only pass this way once!" and he has certainly demonstrated a full use of his

time in his passage through life.

We congratulate Eddie and also Agnes, his wife, who has supported and encouraged him through so many years.

JUBILEE GIFT DAY.

With the proceeds of this Gift Day, and other money raised during the Jubilee celebrations, we should like both to undertake some moderately expensive but necessary projects in our church building, and also to make substantial contributions to two charitable funds of the Methodist Church as a sign of thankfulness for what God has done for us in Knaphill.

The funds we have in mind are Mission Alongside the Poor, about which we wrote in the last Newsletter, and the Methodist Relief Fund which makes grants wherever there is starvation or disaster, be it Britain, Bangladesh, Ethiopia or Mexico.

The projects in our own building are (1) reconstruction of the leaded window in the vestibule (where the hymn books are given out); it has leaked badly for some years as may be seen from the state of the plaster, and estimates suggest repair is likely to cost about £950 (2) Replacement of the pew runners, rapidly disintegrating, will cost between £400 and £600.

We also have plans to resurface the floors in a number of areas using our own labour.

Our target for the Gift Day is £1500, considerably more than has been raised by gift days in recent years. An anonymous donor has offered to add 50% to what is given, and with money raised in other ways, it should be possible to do the work outlined above as well as make thanksgiving donations of several hundred pounds from the church to the funds mentioned.

An envelope for your gift is attached. Please be generous on the Church's birthday.

TAPE BONANZA.

The Morning Service will start at 10.30 but it would be advisable to come earlier, and in the evening there will be musical items from 6.00pm.

It is with rather mixed feelings that I write this update for the Magazine after our thirty-two years worshipping at Knaphill Methodist Church.

Most of you are aware that we have had another home in France since 2002, and we have decided that the moment has come to live in one place not two, and to follow our love for the country and the language which brought us together in the first place.

Somewhat appropriately Rob and I met at a Methodist Circuit youth fellowship (a long time ago.....he was 18 and I was 16!) We rapidly discovered that we both studied modern languages and there then followed several years where we seemed to spend our time with one of us living on the opposite side of the Channel!

Eventually we were married and after seven years in Lancashire, Rob's work brought him to London. In June 1983 we moved to live in Lane End Drive (next door to Win and Malcolm Swan) and spent ten happy years there. I remember that on our first Sunday in our new home, we set out to walk to church and were greeted after only a few yards by Mary Holloway, who lived very close to us and whom many of you will remember.

At the end of September, in other words just a few weeks later, the congregation was a little surprised to learn that we were to disappear to Germany for six months because Rob had been offered the chance to participate in an Anglo-German exchange of civil servants. Nevertheless they kept in touch with us by sending the monthly magazine and welcomed us back warmly in April 1984, when we were expecting our first baby, Jennifer.

This is a cue to say that Jennifer is the sole member of the family to be remaining in the UK. As many of you know, she lives and works in Edinburgh. She has recently begun a new job for a global consultancy and is loving the new opportunities which this post offers. At this

point Rob and I would like to express our thanks to you all for the care and concern you have shown when her health makes life such a challenge for her. Your thoughts and prayers are appreciated very much.

Our second daughter, Siobhan and her husband, Tom departed in mid February this year for Tennessee where Tom has accepted a two year contract to do research at Oak Ridge National Laboratory. Siobhan was rather disappointed when she learnt that her visa would not allow her to take up any paid employment in the US but she too is a modern linguist and is considering doing a Masters in translation by distance learning from the University of Bristol where she did her first degree.

Returning to the story of our travels, we decided, on moving to Camberley in 1993, that we would continue to worship at KMC and have never regretted that decision. Being part of such a friendly and caring congregation has always meant such a lot. Rob and I fully intend to carry on supporting you in various ways and we shall be returning from time to time.

In France we already feel very much part of the French Protestant church which we attend and Rob has on several occasions been asked to take services both there and in other churches in the region. We also have a large network of friends, some of whom we first met in the 1970's when Rob taught English for a year in a lycee in the town near to our house.

It is probable that our removal will be shortly after Easter but as I write, the date has not yet been fixed. We shall miss you all and will remember you with love and affection as we continue along life's journey. However it will not be long before we reappear for the weekend of 11-12 June, hopefully accompanied by both Jennifer and Siobhan, to celebrate 150 years of Methodism in Knaphill, in which we have been privileged to share a small part.

Reza Naraghi

From 2009 to 2015, KMC was the home of a group of Iranian Christians who have worshipped in our church on Sunday afternoons. Their leader, Reza Naraghi, spoke to us during our morning service on 31st January 2016.

Good Morning, it is lovely to be here. I asked David to give me a few minutes to share something in my heart.

When I became a Christian in 1983, I always hid myself behind other people whenever I received a call from the Lord to lead someone or a group. I said "Lord, here I am, but please send somebody else to do the job." Until in 2009, my wife and myself ended up leading a group of Iranian Christians in the Guildford area. We were looking for a place for worship on a Sunday, and you kindly opened the doors of the building for us, to come and worship the Lord on Sunday afternoons. In actual fact, you became our spiritual family. Every Sunday we always remembered you, and we prayed for you. I am sure you prayed for us too.



You provided two wonderful, talented, amazing people for us, to help us in our worship songs - Ruth [Pugh] and Ian [Kelly]. Sunday after Sunday they dedicated their lives here for us to play the music, and we enjoyed every minute of it. I've never had a chance to come and say "thank you", from the bottom of my heart, how wonderful people you are. We are brothers and sisters in Christ and you kindly opened your arms and prayed for us.

Unfortunately, things happen, that our fellowship had to end gathering here on Sundays, last Summer (2015). Because people started moving to different places; some were coming from Kingston, some from Guildford and eventually they moved away, and it became very difficult for them to come to Knaphill on a Sunday. So eventually, after long discussions and prayer, we decided to end fellowship here. We found another Iranian church in Chiswick to get these people to go to for fellowship.

It was very hard for me and for my wife to let them go. We had a wonderful time here and we will always remember your kindness and wonderful fellowship here. I don't know what the Lord has for us. I used to say "Lord, give me this, give me that", but now when I wake up in the morning, I say to the Lord, "Lord, here I am, use me in your Kingdom."

A friend of mine used to say, "If you want to grow in your faith, get involved in God's work, get involved in the church and friends." In 2009, I actually started getting involved in God's

work and I enjoyed every minute of it! Sometimes it was hard trying to change it all, but the Lord took our hand and said "follow me".

Every minute of our worship here was joyful, wonderful. There were highs and lows and you provided everything for us. I just wanted to say thank you on behalf of those Iranians that you will see in a minute their faces, in the pictures taken from our gatherings. I want us, as a family, a family of God, to remember those who are coming from different places as Christians, who need your help and prayer. So remember those faces and pray for them. Thank you very much.

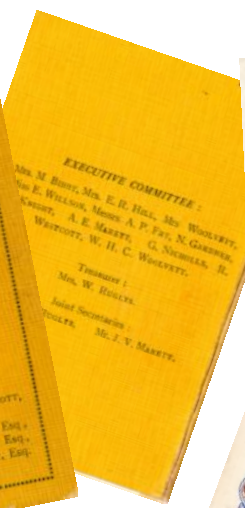

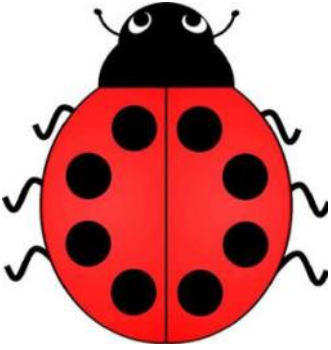

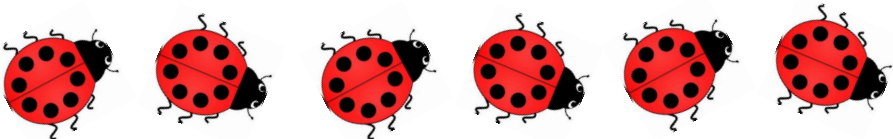
