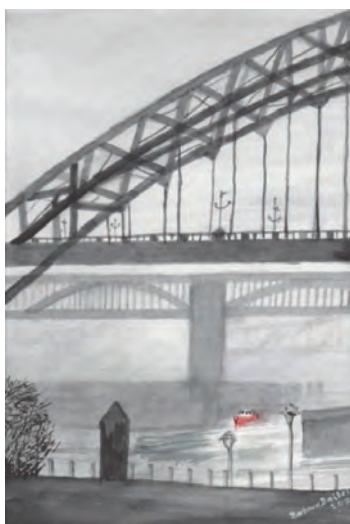

One of the many quotes from our WWP Kathleen Snow was **"Ordinary people doing extraordinary things"**

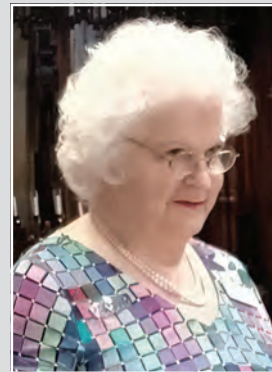
We met some wonderful people and said farewell to our CEO of nearly 11 years Bev Julien. We thank her for her guidance and wish her well for the future.

MU Provincial Service in Manchester Cathedral to mark 150 years of MU

SET amidst the medieval quarter of Manchester, on a cool and sunny day, the Cathedral welcomed members from across the York Province. The celebration service was lively and moving, with about 300 members meeting old friends and making new ones. A young local lady was so impressed she left determined to find a local MU branch.

The Bishop of Middleton, the Right Revd Mark Davies, and Provincial President Christine Sharp welcomed us. The diocesan banners were processed in – and a few eyes glistened. Derek carried the Newcastle banner alongside our Diocesan President Margy (in MU blue) and Anne Archer with the Indoor Members Book. The occasional trip hazards were navigated successfully.

St Francis' Canticle (All creatures of our God and King) opened the worship. We offered thanks and expressed our hopes in the words of the new Provincial prayer. The

Cathedral Voluntary Choir intoned psalm 127 beautifully. 1 Corinthians 13 was read by the Lord Lieutenant and we rejoined with 'Be thou my vision'.

Margy read Matthew 25:31-40. A soloist sang 'Beauty for brokenness' and the person next to me shed a tear. The Dean, the Very Revd Rogers Govender, spoke strongly about Mary Sumner's vision and the work of over 150 years, encouraging us in our current endeavours globally and locally. We sang 'Let all the world in every corner sing' – and made sure our corner of the world was loudly included.

Deb Lee was interviewed about the work of trustees and engaged us with stories from across the world, including some from

The Diocesan Chaplain led intercessions, concluding with the Mothers' Union Prayer.

Before the blessing the bishop had a 'last word' to encourage us and challenge us with a heap of humour and hope as we embark upon the next 150 years. Did we enjoy the day? Of course we did.

Journey of the Prayer Capsule

WHETHER or not you saw it on its journey through the Diocese, this small cylinder has brought unexpected blessings.

It brought Carlisle and Newcastle together at Hexham Abbey for prayer and cross-county conversation. It brought Newcastle and Durham together for prayer and more cross-county conversation at St Cuthbert's in Chester-le-Street. It made its first diocesan visit to the tranquil Lady's

Well in Upper Coquetdale, where the oldest church in the Diocese can be found. It is the least well-known Christian site in Northumbrian history: Paulinus may have baptised travellers here when he converted King Edwin to Christianity. The capsule also traversed the causeway to Lindisfarne to acknowledge Aidan's part in our history. It paid homage at Sycamore Gap to the sprouting shoots that bear witness to new life, and it called at Howick to encourage our Chestnut tree and share midday prayers in St Michael and All Angels.

It called into a number of local MU branches for tea and cake and left the diocese with a prayer inside written by one of our members. In 150 years' time, may whoever opens it be blessed by the prayers and stories of Mothers' Union.

Prayer Capsule Handover at Hexham Abbey

TO celebrate 150 years of Mothers' Union, a Prayer Capsule travelled around the Dioceses of York Province, it contained a Prayer for the Province written by Bishop John Thomson, MU Chaplain for York Province and in each Diocese visited, a Diocesan Prayer was added.

On Sunday 10th May, at a Service in Hexham Abbey the capsule was handed over to Newcastle Diocese by Carlisle Diocese.

After a welcome by the Revd Canon David Glover, Rector of Hexham Abbey, prayers were led by the Carlisle MU Diocesan Chaplain, the Revd Canon Angela Whittaker. Mrs Carole Gardner, Vice president of Carlisle Diocese read Carlisle's Diocesan Prayer and placed it in the capsule. The Newcastle Diocesan prayer was written and read by the Revd Sheila Auld before it was placed in the Capsule by our Diocesan President, Mrs Margy Tasker-Brown. Further prayers were led by the Revd Anne Marr, Newcastle MU Diocesan Chaplain.

The short but very meaningful service was well attended by

members from Carlisle Diocese, and members both local to Hexham and further afield in the Diocese.

This was followed by light refreshments supplied by Hexham Abbey Branch. which were much appreciated.

The Prayer Capsule stayed in the Diocese for a week before being handed over to Durham Diocese. It was then delivered to Mary Sumner House by Mrs Deb Lee, MU Zonal trustee riding a bike from York to London.

This was not the first time that a Prayer capsule was handed over at Hexham Abbey. In 2001 as part of 125th Celebrations of MU, a Prayer capsule arrived in Hexham by motor bike ridden by Mrs Elizabeth Revett and was handed over to Mrs Helen Brunton who was Diocesan President at that time. It also travelled by lifeboat from North Northumberland on its way South to County Durham.

The Annual Gathering

ON Thursday 11th June about 800 members and others came to Westminster from all over Britain and Ireland as well as some from our Worldwide family. We met at the wonderful Emmanuel Centre, a Grade 2 listed Christian Centre very close to Mary Sumner House. Throughout the day there was a feeling of excitement and fellowship, and it was good to meet again with friends from other Dioceses, and to make new friendships.

After opening prayers with our Bishop Ambassador the Rt Revd Kelly Betteridge, Bishop of Basingstoke, we were greeted by our Worldwide President Kathleen Snow and our CEO Bev Jullien, who led a 'shout out' from every province present. Kathleen is from Canada and is only the second WWP from outside Britain and Ireland, as Mothers' Union gradually becomes an organisation led by a truly international team under a Trustee Board which represents every continent.



Six former Worldwide Presidents then each shared their memories of terms of office which had spanned about 40 years altogether. They gave a fascinating insight into the way in which Mothers' Union has developed, and the challenges faced in each era, as we seek to reach out to families all over the world.

During the lunch break we were able to go in groups to Mary Sumner House, where we saw a special 150th Anniversary exhibition exploring the whole history of Mothers' Union as it grew from a small parish group to a global power.

In the afternoon we turned our focus to work taking place today. Rightly, Domestic Abuse has become a major focus recently, and this was tackled in a role play based around a football game: domestic abuse can rise by 40% after a World Cup match, whether we win or lose. Mothers' Union is helping through many initiatives such as the Rise Up campaign.

Homelessness is also a major problem and is being tackled in Coventry Diocese by a large-scale

project. Leeds Diocese is working in New Hall women's prison to give women skills and self-belief through a cooking project. Impressive AFIA holiday projects are widespread and are having an impact on traumatised families.

Our consideration of Safeguarding brought us a very uplifting presentation, when four young ambassadors of the Girls' Brigade came and spoke passionately about the need to involve young women in Christian organisations, and to boost their self-awareness.

As we drew to a close, WWP Kathleen Snow praised the contribution of our CEO Bev Jullien over eleven years, with a warm retirement presentation.

The Annual Gathering captured the spirit of Mothers' Union and celebrated its development over 150 years, giving us confidence for the future, and commitment to continue reaching out to families and communities all over the world.

THE staff at the Cedarwood centre are working very hard to improve learning opportunities and meaningful enjoyment activities for youngsters on the Meadowell estate in North Shields. To encourage these, the CEO, Dr Solomon Lomax, and his staff have put out an appeal for books and a variety of toys including a wooden climbing frame, a spinning chair and a story sack. In response to this request a small group from Mothers' Union went to meet Shelley Henderson, the Early Years Practitioner, and to look around the centre. We were very impressed by all the things provided free in the playgroup. This is open from 9am to 2.30pm each weekday for pre-school children and is free for all. During holidays older children are also welcome.

They have small extra touches too: clothes and wellington boots can be donated to be taken by children who need them. The photograph shows the free "wellies" and clothes which can be taken by needy recipients.

Outside there is a wonderful interactive play area with equipment which can be easily accessed by wheelchair users. There is enormous potential for this hub and Mothers' Union has generously provided funding for the equipment "wish list"

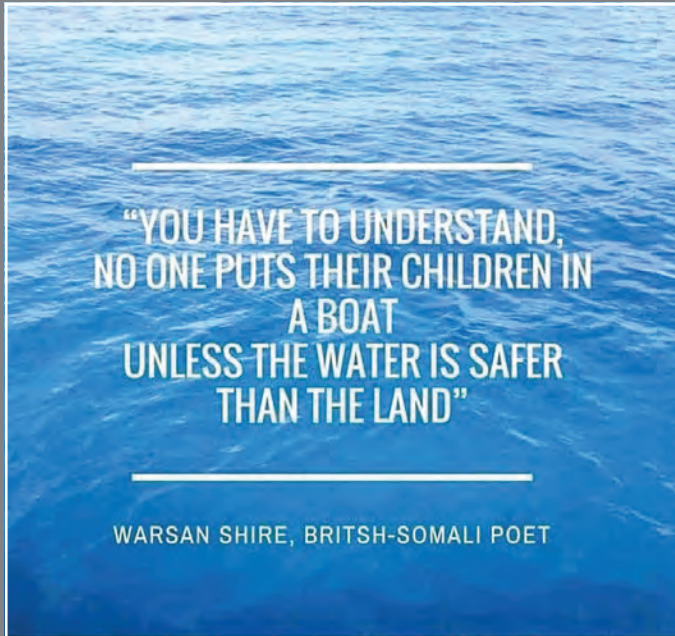

AROUND THE DIOCESE

Supporting refugees at the Calais crossing

On 13th April St Peter's Monkseaton MU welcomed Bishop Mark Bryant to our meeting. He told us that he has made about 6 visits to Calais over recent years, to support work with families trying to cross the channel in small boats.



He stays at Maria Scotsova House, a Christian house which can accommodate about 14 people at a time, in addition to the volunteers. Most are women accompanied by children, who may have been travelling for many years, and are often at a moment of crisis, illness or abuse. Some of the volunteers can help by looking after the children, to give Mum a break, and provide a little stimulus to the children. Mothers can cook and often do so continuously. The toll on them is huge.

Mark told of one Sudanese woman with 5 children, who had been travelling for 5 years, and had faced extortion many times as she tried to cross, but her care of the children was exemplary. When people leave the house to try to get a passage, their bed is kept for 3 nights so that they can return if it seems unsafe.

There are about 700-1,000 people camping around Calais at any time in grim conditions. The police disrupt the camps about every 3 days and it is getting harder to cross as the boats are not allowed to come in close, so people wade out and get very wet before boarding. In Calais there are also hundreds of young people (often highly qualified) from all over Europe who come to help – some for a few weeks and some for up to a year, particularly working with the children – but never helping them to cross the channel.

'The boat people' only make up a very small proportion of total immigrants. It is likely that if a preliminary vetting could be undertaken in Calais, nearly all of those coming from certain countries (e.g. Sudan) would be accepted and could come by a safer route.
