Dearest Friends

The day has finally arrived... or has it??

At the current time of writing (mid-Feb) the United Kingdom is poised to leave the European Union on Friday 29th March.



Nobody has a clear idea of what a post-Brexit Britain will look like or what it will mean for us all. At the time of the referendum on our continuing membership of the EU, back in June 2016, I made it very clear what my own personal position was on the matter, that I thought we should stay in Europe for, what to me were and still are, self-evident benefits and principles. Almost 3 years further on, I personally believe that we are in a far more perilous position as a nation than we were before. I believe that the electorate were at the very least misled and deceived into voting to leave our cousins on the mainland. However, democracy has spoken, and I pray that those who have been elected to represent us in government and parliament can sort the whole thing out.


referendum, but I do support wholeheartedly the process that got us there, and that is why – although it pains me – that I cannot personally support those calling for a second referendum... the country voted, the country chose... if we all argued over the things we don't like then we wouldn't get very far.

Democracy is not the cure-all for the ills of the world but allowing the people to speak for and to the people has to be in the best interests of the people. To look at the alternatives shows a dark side to humanity – think of Isis, or unyielding communism, or dictatorship in all its foul forms. The sheer fact that I can write this editorial without the fear of being imprisoned and tortured for doing so, speaks volumes of the freedoms and liberties we enjoy... the fact that the reader can choose to agree or disagree with me privately or publicly, again speaks of the freedoms inherent in our culture. We must prepare ourselves for what the future may hold, and we should work together to do so in love.

For the Christian, Lent is again a time of preparation... it is our preparation time in hopeful expectation of Easter. We may choose to fast, we may choose to go without, or to deny ourselves, but is that really what Jesus wants from us? Instead we must prepare our hearts and make room in our spiritual souls for the coming of Christ, risen from the dead - doing without a glass of wine here or a bar of chocolate there is irrelevant.

If we truly want to make this March – this Lent – special, then I ask that you pray, that you encourage, and that you show the love of Jesus amongst all and everybody you meet.







Winter is nearly over but there are still cold evenings. Thick soups are nourishing in the middle of a day's gardening (clearing out the flower beds or re-establishing the vegetable plot) or in the evening. One of our standbys at any time of the year is a southern French peasant recipe PISTOU of which the main ingredient is any kind of bean. I make it at this time of year to clear any of last year's beans from the freezer, but it works just as well using a tin of baked beans, tinned cannelloni beans, dried haricot beans which have been soaked overnight, or fresh beans of any sort.

French Pistou soup.

This is the only soup I make where I do not start off with sweated onions and celery.

Put your beans in a large saucepan. Add diced potato, carrot, celery, onions and any other vegetables you have. I tend to prefer courgette, pepper, leeks, but others prefer to use root crops. Cover with boiling stock and leave to simmer for 30 minutes. Make your pistou



in a small bowl - 2 or 3 tablespoons of tomato puree, six crushed cloves of garlic and some fresh or dried chilli. Check you vegetable soup. When all the vegetables are cooked soft but still firm add the pistou mixture, stir thoroughly and serve immediately with grated cheese and crusty bread.

Now is the time of year taking stock of the freezer and store cupboard. Last year's rhubarb needs to be used as it won't be long before the new crop is being harvested. The space can be used for leeks. Potatoes and apples still in store are beginning to look a bit past it. Lots of jacket potato meals will use up the big ones. The smaller ones I peel, mash and put into margarine tubs and shove in the freezer for easy fish and shepherds' pies during the summer. Same with the apples – peel, core and stew and again freeze – easy pies and crumbles when the weather improves and you are out in the garden all day. And while the wet soil is inhibiting garden action, a useful use of time is to batch bake cakes and freeze them. Apple cakes freeze well and deal with the problem of the lurking apples in the shed. Denise Cullingworth's moist and succulent variety can be sampled at Trinity on the first Sunday of the month and perhaps she will let me publish her recipe.



March in the veg Patch

As I write in mid-February my garden is dry and there are everywhere the obvious cheerful signs of spring. The rhubarb clumps are shoving up their thumbs, buds

are beginning to swell on the loganberries, blossom is on the Mirabelle plum tree and the flower garden is coming to life again. The tits, robins, wrens, dunnocks, blackbirds, thrushes and goldfinches are singing their hearts out. However there are still jobs to do. Apple and pear trees should be pruned by now, the greenhouse should be cleaned and all tools sharpened - any of these jobs that have been left unfinished thanks to grotty weather can be completed. Last years' leeks can be harvested (try to stand on planks or duck boards if the soil is still wet) and those not needed immediately can be washed and chopped and bagged in the freezer while the new baby leeks can be started from seed in the greenhouse. Sweet peas, broad beans, peas, nasturtiums, sunflowers and other large seeds can be set in the greenhouse or indoors, I find greatest success by starting the seeds individually in the tubes that form the insides of toilet rolls. Fill the tube with potting compost, put in one seed, cover with a little more compost and place upright in deep seed trays. Water gently and leave to germinate. This method can be used later for French and runner beans and parsnips. You end up planting the whole tube containing the fully rooted juvenile plant which gives it an early start.



Most of us have a grotty dank shady corner in the garden where nothing grows apart from the ubiquitous ground elder, and other pests. Ground elder was introduced to England by the Romans and grown as it was deemed to have powers to cure gout. (One other good reason for loathing the Romans.) The advice I have always seen is to plant with hellebores or Lily of the Valley. Both these suggestions are sound, but how about ramsons, the wild garlic that grows so prolifically along the Nidd. Not for those who loath the smell of

garlic, but I can think of nothing better than a mini grove of ramsons spreading their aroma through my spring garden and reminding me to grub some up for soup.

The weather may yet turn nasty – remember last year with the Beast from the East in early March -but the days are getting longer and the end of winter is within sight. It will soon be warm enough to live in the garden and, despite all the problems of living in 2019, wonder at the diversity of life that shares my small garden space.



Satan Tempts Jesus





As the Knaresborough team continues to support our mission partner, Azaria Spencer, in Guatemala, here is an update from her recent blog.........

My own extraordinary kind of ordinary

This morning I sat in my usual comfy spot by my bedroom window. The sun was still breaking through the clouds, grey and blue divided with rays of beaming yellow and white light. The mountains beginning to reveal their lush green beauty.

Starting my day with prayer, a devotional, and journaling, I ask God to help me find joy in both the ordinary and the extraordinary, having come to realise that it is somewhere in-between where I find myself and the life I lead.

It was only last week that I found myself sat playing a perfectly ordinary game of 'uno,' yet in rather extraordinary circumstances.



I was sitting on a pavement of a street in Guatemala City playing uno with a group of young people who call the streets their home. Playing a game of uno I will not quickly forget.

It was last Tuesday morning, the sky was a piercing clear blue, the air still had a slight chill to it, but the sun was bright and strong. When I arrived with Ben, the coordinator of the street team, Emma

and Hector (members of the street team) were already sitting talking with the small group. As we approached, I noticed one young man, Panda, lying on a mattress. He seemed to be half asleep however, in actuality he was under the influence of the dulling effects of solvents. We greeted the group members and sat with them. Ben got out a game of 'uno' and the excitement of the game brought even Panda, partly, out of his drug induced state of sluggish slumber.

It was in that moment, as we played laughing and enjoying each other's realised company, that Τ how 1 sometimes I will be caught off quard in a seemingly ordinary moment and suddenly realise how my life is more extraordinary than I ever could have hoped or wished it to become. In these moments I am reminded of what a privilege it is to live where I live and do what I



When people ask me, 'what do you do?' it can be difficult to fully explain because of the nature of my job and the flexibility my role allows. This somewhat 'ordinary' game of uno last week is only one example of an ordinary moment reminding me of the extraordinariness that exists in my life.

I'm not sure that if you had asked me ten years ago, 'where do you see yourself in ten years?' that I would have said. "In ten years, I see myself sat in the street in Guatemala City playing uno with a group of young adults who live on the streets and suffer from solvent addictions."

I am not sure what answer I would have given, but I highly doubt that this would have been it.

Yet here I am, living my own extraordinary kind of ordinary, that involves joining our street team on some of their visits and serving people the rest of society chooses to ignore.



And I truly would not have it any other way. The lessons learned through а life like this invaluable. I get to spend time with a street team who dedicate themselves to working alongside people living on the streets of Guatemala City, with a desire to see their lives transformed and free from addiction and the streets.

And I get to visit and spend time

with people who yes, live on the streets and suffer with addictions, but who have taught me about grace, mercy, compassion, love, joy and so much more.
