#### Dearest friends,

When reading the Gospels, it is easy to wrongly think of Jesus doing everything he did in a time frame of a few weeks or months what we must not forget however, is that his earthly ministry spanned 3 years, so out-with all the 'news-worthy' events chronicled by the evangelists, there were long periods of travel, rest, reflection, teaching, preparation and prayer. If these things were important and necessary for our Lord, then they ought to be for us.



May I send my love and best wishes to you and yours, asking that you take time to rest, reflect and pray this early autumn.

Matthew 24, Amy 22 and Ellie 19. We also have a rather elderly, grumpy, West Highland Terrier called Berry.



Azaria shares with us an experience from her work with some of our youth in Guatemala City, in the first of her blogs.

There I was stood behind a glass wall in the entrance of a carpark, staring out as the rain poured down outside. The sky was dark grey and 'pouring' would be a generous word to describe the type of rain coming down. It was so

heavy and relentless that it had started to leak through the glass wall and was creating puddles by my feet.

I had made the rookie mistake of forgetting about rainy season in Guatemala. Anyone would think that I hadn't lived here for years, though thankfully I can be forgiven as I had just returned from 6 months in England. From the moment I got back I was keen to plan something with the youth I work with. I had missed them immensely and couldn't wait to see them and to catch up. I had invited them to eat tacos and get coffee in a nice part of the city on a lovely Saturday afternoon, completely forgetting the time of year and the high possibility of rain in the afternoon.

I wonder if I had also forgotten that for some reason people in general don't know what to do when it rains in Guatemala. It is like the rain starts and the world stops. Being form England, and Yorkshire at that, I am used to rain. Granted the rain in Guatemala is on a whole different and extreme level, but still, rain is just water and life goes on. Well in Guatemala it doesn't, people literally stop what they are doing, or stay where they are until it passes. Thankfully though, it usually only lasts an hour or so.

Anyway, my lack of thinking ahead left me stood watching the rain and waiting. The rain started just as the youth were on their way to meet me from their various locations, and of course none of us were prepared for rain. As I waited I received phone calls and messages expressing the need to wait until the rain stopped. One of them was stranded beneath a shop front, and another couldn't continue as he was coming on a motorbike.

Oddly, I didn't mind at all, there was a time when a situation like this would have stressed me out or caused me to panic or feel annoyed at the delay and impact on the rest of my day. Living in Guatemala has changed me, I view time differently now and often intentionally plan ahead for activities to happen later or last longer than scheduled. With the youth I carve out plenty of extra time to allow for delay and also to not rush the time together.

In that moment, come rain or shine, I would have waited all day just to see them all again. Therefore, the long and wet wait was worth it. I got a message from one of the youth telling me he was close to the meeting location, taking shelter under a restaurant veranda. He had run between shelters at different points when the rain was lighter. From my vantage point (I was effectively in a room made of glass), I peered out and there he was sat in a huddle on some stone steps under a poor excuse for shelter. It was easier to simply go out to him than to try and get his attention or explain where I was. So, I braved the rain and dashed across the street to him. His face lit up when he saw me and I quickly brought him into the shelter of the

carpark entrance. One by one they arrived and each time I went out to greet them. It was amazing to be with them all again.

Once everyone had arrived and the rain had let up enough, we headed to a cool little taco place I like. Tacos are very popular in Guatemala and in my experience, the best places are the cheap, less pretentious restaurants. I was pleased my choice got the approval of the youth- they are not a fussy bunch,



but I can tell when they really like things or are just being polite. We were a smaller group than before, just the core really, but that made it all the more special. We sat and took our time talking and catching up, jokes were flying and they asked all kinds of questions about England and my family, curious to know what it is like in the UK. I got to hear about what they have been doing while I was gone and find out how they are, and my Spanish was less rusty than I had feared, which was great.

### And breath, this is what I had been missing without even realising it. While with my wonderful family in the UK, I had been missing my family here.

We decided to enjoy the lovely evening and take a moment to walk around the area. There was hardly a trace of evidence that it had just been pouring with rain.

The evening air was cooler than normal but pleasant, a clear sky turning to indigo as we walked and enjoyed the live music from various street performers. Talent on every corner.

It was time to have a hot drink, to sit and talk a little while longer as no one was ready for home yet. We found a nice little artisanal café close by and the conversation focused on deeper things as we sipped our hot chocolates, coffees, and chai tea. I asked them how they really felt, what life had really been like throughout the pandemic and while I was away. It was a time for honestly and vulnerability. I won't share the details; all I can say is that it was positive and healing and I am very proud of them all. These young people have incredibly challenging lives and trusting adults does not come easily. No one said it but I am sure they had wondered if I would even come back.

### A promise does not mean a lot to people who live under constant disappointment. Trust must be earned and respect gained through consistency and reliability.

In truth I do very little to 'help' these young people, but what I do is, show up and keep on showing up. All in God's strength and for the love He has placed on my heart for people here in Guatemala. Spending this time with the youth again helped ground me. The first few weeks back in Guatemala had been hard for me, a lot of transition, change and reverse culture shock (in reverse again). I was still adjusting, and they really helped. I wonder if they realise that I am more blessed by them than they by me as we attempt to share some of life together. It is a privilege to be welcomed in, even just a little bit.

### .....From the Belfry (Bell and Marmalade news)

#### Back to normality

After the lifting of Covid restrictions in July we are virtually back to normal ringing. At present we are only ringing for half an hour on a Sunday morning, but we are planning to revert back to 45 minutes in September. After a couple of short Tuesday practice nights of 45 minutes to get everyone comfortable with gathering in a larger group, and comfortable ringing the bells again, we are now having longer practice nights. We are holding longer sessions (with silencers) for our novice ringers earlier in the evening, followed by an hour's practice without silencers for experienced ringers and to allow the novices to hear their bells. It is so nice to be back to normal. We even managed to ring all eight bells together.

We have also fitted in three quarter peals. The first for the Patronal Festival for St John the Baptist, of Grandsire doubles on the front six. The second was also Grandsire but on the back six. This quarter peal was dedicated to the birth of "lockdown" grandchildren. Three grandchildren of members of the band have been born during the Covid restrictions. The third quarter was rung for Knaresborough Charter Day. Since charter day falls during FEVA, we rang a 'variation' called Pinks. Another sign of normality is that weddings with bells are being conducted again. We have rung for three so far, but it is early days yet and we have four more booked in.

The highlight of the summer so far was an open day for the tower. This was part of an initiative of the Yorkshire Association of Change Ringers to raise the profile of ringing after the Covid restrictions were lifted. It was held on the 1<sup>st</sup> August, Yorkshire Day. We had a continuous stream of visitors who all climbed up our 52 steps to the ringing room and most also climbed up into the belfry to see the bells and internal structure of the tower close up. We didn't



keep a close tally of the number of visitors, but there were between 45 to 50 people. Thanks to those of you who came, and I hope you enjoyed the experience.

If you are interested in a new hobby interacting with other humans after lockdown, try your hand at bell ringing. We will be happy to give you a taste of the exercise. Feel free to come to practices at 7:30 pm Tuesday evenings or contact Matt Curl,

I would also like to thank Brian Robinson and the FEVA committee for lighting up our spire in FEVA pink, this coincided beautifully with our birthday





#### Spotlight on.....

### Enid Leaver from Holy Trinity (possibly our oldest member)

#### Tell us a bit about yourself:

I was born in Old Welwyn and grew up in Hatfield , Hertfordshire. Won a scholarship aged 10 to Welwyn Garden City Grammar School. I consider it a minor miracle that we learnt anything



because, being close to London, we spent more time sheltering from air raids than in the classroom. After school I worked for ICI and moved "up North" when they opened in Harrogate. When my two daughters were very young there were no playgroups in Knaresborough so along with a group of friends we opened the first playgroup in St John's church hall. I subsequently opened a little pre-school in our house in Scriven Road and completed an open university course on child development, birth to 5 years. In the meantime we joined the congregation at Holy Trinity and I became involved in Sunday School. With over 70 children it was quite a task but the teachers got on and enjoyed our time together, organizing trips, social evenings, decorating beds for the bed race, once winning a lot of beer that was fortunately swapped by the pub for chocolates. As an outreach from church, I obtained permission to start a Mums and Toddlers group (Trinity Tiny Tots) which I ran for 17 years and was delighted when Dot Jelbert offered to carry it on under the present name of Trinity Teddies which is very popular. When ICI started to close down, Alan and I decided to close the pre-school and bought "The Old Sweetshop" (now a barbers) on Knaresborough High Street, however we sold up as Alan was offered a job at King James's School. I was fortunate to get employment at Harrogate Hospital as an Occupational Therapy Helper where I was given a fairly free rein and enjoyed splitting my time between outpatients, wards, day hospital, and child development centre, all requiring very different approaches. I worked there until well after my retirement age.

I have been on the Holy trinity friendship and leisure team for over 50 years and hope to continue for as long as I am a useful member.

Oh and somewhere in-between all the above jobs I enrolled at the Harrogate college of Art to complete a course in cake icing, mainly wedding cakes and afternoon classes for German and Spanish—most of which I have forgotten like the sign language I also learnt at the hospital.

For years I was a member of Trinity's Gardening Grannies, and under the guidance of Arnold Rowe, we won quite a few Knaresborough in Bloom prizes for Holy Trinity.

#### What do you consider to be your greatest achievement?

I'm a Jack of all trades and master of none but I was lucky enough to spend time with a great many children during their formative years and would like to think I helped to make learning fun.

#### How would you describe yourself in one sentence?

Hopefully reliable, helpful, and a little bit resilient

I like most food but really enjoy a salmon fillet

#### And food hell?

Tripe and sweet macaroni pudding

#### Who is your greatest inspiration?

My mum who spent her life helping others before they realized they actually needed help. On another level, the words of St Ignatius and St Francis which I constantly fall short of getting anywhere near.

#### If you had to go and live on a desert island, what would be your luxury item?

I am greedy—I would like puzzles, all kinds, crosswords, sudokus, jigsaws. I enjoy doing them all and some pencils and sharpeners please. Oh and my spectacles!

#### What is your favourite hymn?

Oh dear, I love lots of the older hymns but also many of the newer ones, especially those by Estelle White and Susan Sayers.

I can't choose between "To God be the Glory" and "Make me a channel of your peace"



Nidd Church has a lovely, typically English country church yard with space for another 70 burials. In high season the grass needs cutting every two weeks and it takes two men 12 hours to do. A narrow gate precludes the use of a wide mower so the whole process —

including strimming – is fiddly.

Nidd Hall (hotel) generously cuts the grass but during lockdown there's only been a skeleton body (!) available.
Fortunately Revd Garry told us that the CofE wanted church yards like ours treated in a more eco or



conservationist way. So, we've cut paths to all burial areas and especially around the most recent graves. The rest of the land will spend the season growing naturally and providing a habitat for wild life. In September it will all be cut down and the cycle will repeat itself.



So if you visit and are heard singing "The corn is as high as an elephant's eye" we'll understand!

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has launched a free national phone line as a simple new way to bring worship and prayer into people's homes while church buildings are closed because of the coronavirus. Daily Hope, offers music, prayers and reflections as well as full worship services from the Church of England at the end of a telephone line. The line – which is available 24 hours a day on **0800 804 8044** – has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind.



## A free phone line of hymns, reflections and prayers

The service is supported by the Church of England nationally as well as through the Connections group based at Holy Trinity Claygate in Surrey and the Christian charity Faith in Later Life.

Although thousands of churches across the country are now running services and prayer groups online while public worship remains suspended, many people – especially older people – do not have access to the internet. The line also recognises the impact of social distancing restrictions and self -isolation measures on those suffering from loneliness.

Callers will hear a special greeting from the Archbishop before being able to choose from a range of options, including hymns, prayers, reflections and advice on COVID-19.

A section called Hymn Line offers callers a small selection of hymns, updated daily. An option entitled 'Hymns We Love', provides a hymn and reflection and is based on an initiative by the Connections group

The proposals will be published in Accord. An up-to-date Bridges bulletin is now ready for distribution, which will highlight our 'New Dawn' initiatives.

Rhythm of Life House groups/Alpha updates – Stroma informed us that the next Alpha course will start in September on-line. All welcome. Following the success of the Rhythm of Life course, two house-groups have formed – one in Knaresborough and one in Goldsborough.

Website – See separate sheets - Stroma informed the PCC that we are now struggling with our current website, which is becoming difficult to update, and the current provider license expires in October. It is important to have an on-line presence, and Stroma and a working party from the Communications committee has researched what is available and suitable for a new, re-designed website. Four options were considered, and the working party recommend to the PCC Option 4, a new designed website using WIX.com. This site looks attractive, easy to use, and is used by other churches.

### **Culinary and cropping curiosities**

What a very strange year it has been with the cold April and very wet May. I have now harvested my onions but while clean and powerful they are rather small due to late planting. The chard and leaf beet have been a disaster with many replantings. Much of the crop went to seed very early and some of the later sowings are stunted and also beginning to go to seed. My raspberries have been behaving very oddly while giving me an enormous crop. I am sure some of the new canes have decided that they had a


second winter in April just as they were sprouting and have turned themselves into autumn croppers. I am beginning to wonder whether I will have any canes next year. The apple crop will also be poor as the cookers were hit by the late May frosts and are yielding nothing. However, the rhubarb, the currants and berries and the beetroot have been excellent and the French beans and courgettes are cropping well. So there will be plenty of crumbles through the winter!!!!!

#### Herby Summer Soup (serves 4)

In a large heavy bottomed saucepan simmer gently in olive oil:-

I onion (chopped finely)


- 1 Stick of celery also chopped finely
- 1 clove garlic



Simmer for half an hour, liquidise and serve with bread as a starter or add pate, cheese, sandwiches for a family meal.

If you prefer a cream soup just add coconut milk or crème fraiche at the last moment. Alternatively this soup is refreshing when served cold.





#### And in the veg plot.....

Get out the garden chairs and loungers whenever the weather permits and enjoy the beauty and productivity of your garden. There are jobs to do,

but leave those for a cloudy day. While pondering the wildlife, flowers and produce you can plan for even better years in future.

Make note of where you have planted what in the veg plot, so that you ensure a rotation of crops. This is especially important for onions and carrots. Onions, leeks

and garlic attract onion fly, while carrot flies can smell out carrots from 7 miles away!!!!!!

smell out carrots from 7 miles away!!!!!!

(According to GQT). So note where you have put your onions/leeks and your root crops so they go somewhere else next year. (I always omit to do this and then drive the family mad by demanding that they remember – in March – which crops were where last year.) Ideally you



should manage a three of four year rotation with beans/peas and potatoes taking their place, but this is not always possible in a small garden.

Look at your flower beds also and note what flourishes best and what has been problematic among the perennials. Look for the gaps that you have filled with annuals. You can always replace problem plants with a different variety of a successful species or put a new variety of perennial in a gap.

Also note which of your thriving plants attract the most insects. Plant more of these — we all need our pollinators.

Meanwhile, summer is only too short. Enjoy it

## Michaelmas

Michaelmas, or the Feast of Michael and All Angels, is celebrated on the 29th of September every year. As it falls near the equinox, the day is associated with the beginning of autumn and the shortening of days; in England, it is one of the "quarter days".

There are traditionally four "quarter days" in a year (Lady Day (25th March), Midsummer (24th June), Michaelmas (29th September) and Christmas (25th December)). They are spaced three months apart, on religious festivals, usually close to the solstices or equinoxes. They were the four dates on which servants were hired, rents due or leases begun. It used to be said that harvest had to be completed by Michaelmas, almost like the marking of the end of the productive season and the beginning of the new cycle of farming. It was the time at which new servants were hired or land was exchanged and debts were paid. This is how it came to be for Michaelmas to be the time for electing magistrates and also the beginning of legal and university terms. St Michael is one of the principal angelic warriors, protector against the dark of the night and the Archangel who fought against Satan and his evil angels. As Michaelmas is the time that the darker nights and colder days begin - the edge into winter - the celebration of Michaelmas is associated with encouraging protection during these dark months. It was believed that negative forces were stronger in darkness and so families would require stronger defences during the later months of the year.

Traditionally, in the <u>British Isles</u>, a well fattened goose, fed on the stubble from the fields after the harvest, is eaten to protect against financial need in the family for the next year; and as the saying goes:

"Eat a goose on Michaelmas Day, Want not for money all the year".

Sometimes the day was also known as "Goose Day" and goose fairs were held. Even now, the famous Nottingham Goose Fair is still held on or around the 3rd of October. Part of the reason goose is eaten is that it was said that when Queen Elizabeth I heard of the defeat of the Armada, she was dining on goose and resolved to eat it on Michaelmas Day. Others followed suit. It could also have developed through the role of Michaelmas Day as the debts were due; tenants requiring a delay in payment may have tried to persuade their landlords with gifts of geese!


When Nathanael heard what Jesus said, he asked him, "How do you know me?"

Dear Father, we are thankful that you know us by name and that you thought we were so special that you gave us your Son so we could have everlasting life. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.




