Dearest friends

year sent One ago, we a confidential document to all members of the PCC entitled 'Opening Up for Church Services'. It was intended to explore what the church - and especially our team of churches - might look like postpandemic.



Arguably the most contentious part of the paper was the proposed changes to worship times at Holy Trinity and at Goldsborough. However, the changing of worship times is only one small part of the picture and must not be viewed in isolation!

As governors in church schools, we must prepare for SIAMS inspections as well as OFSTED ones. SIAMS stands for the: Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools and its key question throughout the inspection will be this: 'What makes your school's ethos distinctly Christian?'

It's this question of **distinction** that we must address as a team in our churches along with our **accessibility to others.**



The Church of England is changing at a speed and in a way that we could not have predicted.

The national pressure from decreased income due to the impact of Coronavirus is beginning to force changes now that in normal times we might have expected to take place over 10 years.

We believe **we should be positively challenged** by these changes in the Knaresborough Team Ministry for many reasons:

We have a thriving village community – Goldsborough - complete with church primary school - but a church that offers worship at a time on a Sunday that is no longer appropriate for families.

We have an ancient parish church – St John's – in a town the size of Knaresborough, that offers **no real or worthwhile children's work**, or (considering the good will that exists, and the energy expended) has a reciprocal relationship of support from the families of those attending St John's CofE Primary school.

We have a 'high church parish' – Holy Trinity – that is **not really distinctive**, *or distinctive enough*, from St John's, and yet meets at virtually the same time slot every Sunday.

We have a village church – Brearton – that **rarely meets** for worship and has limited interest and financial support from its community.

We have another village church – Nidd – whose ministry (apart from a few loyal regulars) is solely for the guests of the hotel.

The current style of **worship in all our churches needs to be revised and adapted.** There is a real tension in holding true to our past and those who are currently members of our churches, whilst also offering new ways of worship which appeal to the new Christian enquirer and families.

The other significant issue for all the churches (apart from Nidd, but

they are linked because of the team), is the fact that we do not come close to the Diocesan Share that was requested even before Coronavirus hit!

It is important to note that finances are not the driving force here — modernity, relevancy and the work of the Holy Spirit, is.



By the autumn of this year, I (Garry) will have been your Team Rector for 8 years and although many things have changed in that time, many things have not.

We have 'nibbled' around the edges of change but never done anything wholesale or significant. I quoted Albert Einstein in a PCC meeting, who said that the definition of insanity was: "doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results."



Similarly, I (Garry) also commented in a previous PCC that if we don't take the initiative and implement change now, it will eventually simply be done to us. **We will lose all say and all power.**

These proposed changes are not intended to frighten, cajole, bully or threaten, they are simply a reality check for **ALL OF US** – we have had congregational wide discussions and feedback in the past and the same basic comments come back time and time again - people want: **more children/families; more people in church; more money; more support.** If we continue to do nothing, then none of these aspirations will ever become reality and some of our churches will be forced to close.

Importantly, as you know we are seeking a House for Duty priest to support us, but there are absolutely no guarantees that anybody will apply or that those who do might be appropriate to appoint... therefore we must plan that there will be only 2 deployable priests in the KTM for the foreseeable future.

Our PCC as your elected body representing all the churches - has worked hard over the last few months to explore and wrestle with the changes and challenges highlighted.

The 'reimagined service rota' on pages 6 and 7 is for us all to think about and pray about - I ask that you approach it with an open mind and heart.

At the beginning of **August**, we will produce a new version of our small



occasional paper: **'Bridges'**. In it we will look deeper into what the proposed changes will actually look like and 'flesh-out' some of the new services that are proposed.

In early **September** we will write to every member on the church Electoral Roll,

explaining again what is proposed and inviting everyone to Consultation Services in each of our churches in early **October**. Following this process, the PCC will then meet to decide what direction we all take as a team ministry from 2022 and beyond.

Please remember that the clergy, the Churchwardens and the 'ordinary' elected members of the PCC are always available to discuss these issues with you and can further enlighten you as to the process and why it's taking place. Likewise, it is our intention to put all the relevant information on our current website as soon as practical.

In the meantime, we send you every best wish and blessing for a peaceful and refreshing summer.



- **3. Seeks to find out what God wants** discerning the Spirit's leaning rather than trying to please everyone.
- **4.** Faces the cost of change and growth rather than resisting change and avoiding failure.
- **5. Operates as a community** rather than functioning as a club or religious organisation.
- **6. Makes room for all** being inclusive rather than exclusive.
- 7. Does a few things and does them well.

After 15 months of the HUB @ St John's closing its doors because of Covid restrictions, we were delighted to welcome some groups back in May. Many still do not feel ready to return because of an understandable hesitancy and the continuing restrictions on numbers and activities which the government are allowing. We are pleased to welcome a new group meeting every Tuesday throughout the year and occupying the building until 4pm. They are "Over the Rainbow Care" who offer respite care for people with dementia. This is such a worthwhile use of our wonderful facilities for the local community.

Unfortunately, during lockdown, the building suffered some major problems. A new boiler was installed and part of the wooden floor in the main hall had to be replaced (the latter fortunately was an insurance claim). The kitchen's fridge/freezer has also been replaced with a larger fridge, which we feel will be a good addition to our well-equipped kitchen. To ensure that the HUB is compliant with Covid guidelines, we have had to become knowledgeable about, and implement risk assessments, QR codes and of course sanitising hands and cleaning regimes; together with checking those groups and individuals using the HUB are implementing these too. It has brought it home what a difficult task the retail and leisure businesses have had to cope with, plus the uncertainty of their future.

Looking ahead to Feva week, there will be an Art exhibition by local artists in the main hall and also in the church, plus refreshments available at the Terrace café.



Dear lovely friends,

I hope you are all well.

It seems rather surreal to be writing this letter from a very familiar spot overlooking Guatemala City, the volcanoes acting as the backdrop of my view as they have done so many times before. I feel extremely blessed to be back here safely and to have seen God's loving hand in all the details of the preparations and journey. You may recall from my last link



letter that I shared about God caring about the details – this year he has continued to show me this abundantly and in very tangible ways.

"The Lord directs the steps of the godly. He delights in every detail of their lives. Though they stumble, they will never fall, for the Lord holds them by the hand." Psalm 37:23–24 (NLT)

Join me in giving thanks to our Good Father for his mercies and presence in all the details of our lives and for my safe arrival back in Guatemala.

Time in England

I have 10 days of self-isolation to ease me back into life here and, although at first I was feeling rather unhappy about it, I can now see all its value as a brief moment to pause, reflect, process and regroup before diving back in. My time in England was refreshing and fruitful in so many ways. I was able to connect well with link churches and supporters, stretching my limited technology skills, each Zoom or online service a joyful time of sharing and feeling uplifted and held. It was an absolute pleasure to be welcomed in and loved and hopefully I was able to express myself well about life in Guatemala and the work God has called me to.

With my parents and younger brother I enjoyed a slightly slower pace of life, giving me time and space to process and lean into God more. When discussing life with a friend, we realised how I have been seeing God act in "real time". Often, we can look back and see God's hand over our lives at specific moments, hindsight being a gift. However,



recently I have been living tangibly under the hand of God, seeing him act daily as it is happening, drawing from his peace and strength. I may not be describing it in the most eloquent way, but it has been amazing.

Towards the end of my time in the UK, I was blessed with time with my sister and her family and socially-distanced visits with close friends. It was incredible to be able to spend quality time with my nephews and nieces after more than two years apart – they have grown up so much. I love being an auntie, and not seeing them regularly is one of the biggest challenges. We made up for lost time and made sure to have lots of fun and make plenty of memories.

As you may imagine, the goodbyes are hard, especially when most of them were said too soon after saying hello. Through God's strength I managed to live in my present

each day, not letting any goodbyes loom over being with family and friends. I have written about "Bittersweet Mission" before and it resonates for me now in this time of transition. As one close friend reflected, I go from one joy to another, which encompasses these moments well.

On my last full day in England I even got to enjoy one of my favourite things, a walk through a bluebell wood, which brought me a lot of joy. I have always loved bluebells and if not for God's perfect timing I would have gone another year without seeing them in all their beauty.



Please pray for all of my amazing link churches and supporters, family and friends, may they be blessed as they have blessed me.

Pray also for me as I adjust back to life in Guatemala.

Looking ahead

I am so excited about this next chapter. I have returned refreshed and with renewed energy and passion for ministry and life. I am thrilled to be walking into a role that incorporates all the best parts of my previous one while adding in new and exciting aspects. It feels tailor-made for me and it's humbling to feel like I am heading into my "dream job". I will be working with SKD Guatemala to develop a discipleship and mission training programme for young adults, which will take a holistic look at equipping and empowering the young people we work with for adult life. I hope to work alongside others as we develop the programme, and I cannot wait to start implementing it. Working with the young adults, listening to what they want and supporting them as they learn, grow and live it is an important part of the process for me too.

I am also going to be continuing to coordinate and grow our sponsorship programmes and volunteer with the prevention team in their activities with children on the streets, leading by example as we get our young adults involved with serving too. Another new area I'm hoping to explore and serve in is the prayer and worship life at our arts-based mentoring centre, Centro Opp, alongside helping coordinate and facilitate elements of the art and music programmes. How exciting – just writing about it all fills me with joy and energy!

Please keep me in your prayers as I settle back in and start this new role. Please also pray for the team I work with and all the children, young people and families we serve.



Abridged minutes of the virtual PCC meeting held on Monday 7th June 2021.

Revd Stroma opened the meeting with prayer.

Minutes of meeting held on 8th March were agreed, with no matters arising.

Vision /Mission update

Rhythm of life Diocesan initiative - the lent groups had proved popular, two house groups have arisen out of it, one in Knaresborough and one in Goldsborough, retreat days are planned.

Thy Kingdom Come - global prayer initiative had involved prayer journals and children's prayer maps, 2 zoom sessions had been held and a mini mission in Knaresborough market place giving out over 150 knitted/crocheted, pompom sheep had been very good publicity, raising the church's profile. Garry thanked Stroma for her work on this.

Alpha - the first on line course had been good and will be repeated in September, on an ecumenical basis with the other local churches.

Website

Current website is not fit for purpose, the communications subcommittee is looking into possible new providers and will report back to next PCC. This will need a financial commitment but we currently pay between £300 and £400 so it is likely to have only a small impact.

New Dawn/Deep Dive Update

Minor changes to the proposed new service schedule had been made taking on board the Garry expressed some concern re the inability to offer more communion services across the parish and will discuss the subject of communion by extension with the readers; however with only two priests the options are somewhat restricted. The changes are scheduled for 2022 and Garry hopes that by then a House for Duty priest may have been appointed which will ease the situation with communions, however he stressed this would not have an impact on changing our vision and mission going forward. All present agreed that the roadmap should be explored further across the churches and with their congregations. Much discussion took place with regard to timing and concern was expressed that all churches should be informed at the same time to avoid possible misunderstandings. It was decided that initial information would be printed in July/August Accord, a "Bridges" pamphlet would be issued in early August for everyone, a letter and detailed information will be distributed to tell church members on the electoral rolls early in September and to invite them to a consultation meeting after morning services on 3rd October in Goldsborough, 10th October at Holy Trinity, and 17th October at St John's. Garry and Stroma will attend all meetings. warned that although there may be some opposition to the proposed changes, we all know why we are doing this and we know why it has to be done. There is a danger that if we do not take control of our destinies then the situation could be taken out of our hands and decisions imposed upon us in a non consultative way. It as also emphasised that the changes would be implemented by majority edict(the unspoken assumption voiced at previous meetings being: that the option to do nothing was not an option).

Finance update

Brian referred to the treasurer's report which had been circulated in advance to PCC members. He drew attention to the negative balance, comparing it with the positive balance at 5th March; however the situation will be redressed with the 2nd quarter recharges to churches at the end of June. The finance subcommittee had agreed and adopted budgets for all the churches and these are now operational. The Diocesan share payments by individual churches will be discussed at the next subcommittee meeting. Stroma informed the meeting that 3 churches were fully registered with the Parish Giving Scheme, individual church treasurers had all the information and resources to proceed and they need to meet to discuss roll out and stewardship campaign.

House for Duty post

Garry said that as yet he had received no enquiries or indications of interest in the post.

Safeguarding

Stroma said that all PCC members have applied for DBS but some still needed identity verification. Documents can be taken to Faye at the hub or shown to Garry and Stroma. DBS needs to be renewed every 5 years as per Diocesan policy. Denise Cullingworth said that you can sign up to the automatic update service which may incur a fee of £13. The new Stay and Play leader at St John's is in place so this can restart.

Disability

Garry has received templates for Goldsborough and St John's. Holy Trinity is still in progress (post meeting note—this is now complete). Nicky Wynn has had a zoom meeting with a disability rep from this area of the diocese which she found helpful; from this she felt we are well ahead of many other local parishes.

Fabric update

Garry said that 3 of the 4 architects approached had replied, 2 of them in detail, 1 had asked for further information but has not replied to this. Sebastian would be happy to be appointed on an ad hoc basis. Garry suggested he ask the 2 to chat with us/ look round, and then we can decide which to engage. PCC agreed to this.

Goldsborough - masonry work on the window has started, glaziers to follow; work should be complete late July/ early August.

Holy Trinity - the hall ceiling has been replaced and just needs painting, there is a tree causing a problem with the kitchen roof.

AOB

Covid update - Garry and Stroma feel we will be living with the restrictions going forward, which will have a significant effect on weddings and baptisms, but we won't hear any more until the next government update. May be a move from 30 max to max number on covid risk assessments. Garry said changes in the marriage law had been implemented and were working well.

Vestry meetings - Monday 28th June, St John's 6-7pm, Goldsborough 7-8pm, holy Trinity 8-9pm. All invited to let Garry know if there is anything we want included on the agendas.

Hub/ hall - Brian asked about enquiries for bookings—one ongoing for FEVA event

Next PCC meeting 26th July unanimous agreement to meet in person at Holy Trinity at the back of church

The meeting closed with the Grace.

Culinary and cropping curiosities

Now is the time to be thinking about currants and berries, harvesting them and preserving some of the crop for winter, but eating them in quantities at present.


I always think that the simplest recipes are the best – crumbles, summer puddings, fruit salads, bowls of fresh

fruit with cream or ice cream. Spectacular though roulades and savarins and pavlovas are my family and guests (not that there are any of these at present) get short changed for puds as I feel that quality fruit needs no help. However

there is one pud that retains a degree of simplicity and that is Eton Mess. Traditionally made with strawberries I think it is even better with raspberries or currants. Easy to make, but keep the ingredients — chopped strawberries, drained, crushed meringue, and whipped



cream - separate until the last moment. It takes only seconds to combine them and serve.



And in the veg patch

I have not yet sown any brassicas as I am fed up with fighting the butterflies for the summer harvest. I intend to try sowing brassica seeds

now in seed trays to plant out in August on the section of the veg plot where I will have harvested my onions. I usually seed it with green manure but will fertilise it with commercial blood, bone and fishmeal and plant out the brassicas for a late autumn and winter harvest. I will still have to protect the young



plants from the butterflies but from September onwards the worst of the onslaught should be over and I will have nice fresh cabbages and calabrese in November and December AND Christmas sprouts!!!!!

It is not yet time to put your feet up and relax in the garden. The soft fruit needs protecting from birds, the new growth from slugs and snails and weeding is constant. Keep the hoe well sharpened and scratch away. Constant deadheading in the flower garden will prolong the blooming of many plants.

It had been a weird year in every respect but some things are becoming clearer. We all are aware of climate change and the threat to wildlife. Our gardens are a place where we can give some help. Making a small gap in the base of hedges or fences will allow hedgehogs to range freely between gardens and so find enough food to feed themselves and their young. After no mow May we can still leave corners of our gardens where the daisies, buttercups and dandelions can flourish along with other wild flowers and we can supplement this by growing plants that the insects love. It is clear that there has been a catastrophic decline in the number of insects and hence much less food for the migrant insectivorous birds. We can help by leaving a log pile where insects can rest and breed or by making a garden pond. However small it will attract wild creatures. We can also try to avoid chemical compounds in the garden. A really effective organic fertilizer can be made in a bucket from comfrey and broken egg shells will deter slugs from eating through your brassicas. They do not like crawling on sharp pointy surfaces!

Meanwhile, enjoy every moment in your garden.

"The Lion of Judah fought the fight"

But not the Church (of England). I wanted a tiger, pacing its cage, rattling the bars, challenging and questioning. Instead we have a pussy cat, curled up and dozing in the corner.

Personal rant approaching so do please turn over if you're squeamish.

Why can't we sing in church? I've been asking for 15 months now. Diocesan staff say "waiting on government guidance". Archbishop of Canterbury, through his assistant, said the same. Only the Bishop of London who is responsible for leading the CofE out of lockdown replied personally and fully to my two emails. Incidentally, the Archbishop was quoted recently as saying that the CofE had been "too risk-averse" during the first lockdown.

Research from the University of Bristol showed that moderate-volume singing produced no greater aerosols or sprays than moderate speaking. In church we are distanced, masked and humming to the back of the nearest person, yet still! One televised experiment showed scientists checking for aerosols from a flute – from the foot of the flute, not the mouthpiece where the spray appears! Could it be that at under 2% of the population, church goers have no political or financial clout? Pubs, clubs, football crowds, outside festivals can all sing – even crammed shoppers in Primark – but nobody it seems is pressing for our release from bondage. A recent thread in letters to The Times has included two from me. No one wrote against except a Catholic who said he enjoyed the silence. He was invited by a Quaker to her meeting which

I proposed that in (legal) groups of six we sang verses of hymns and psalms in rotation. I haven't been ex-communicated, chastised or rebuked in any way – the pussy cat is still asleep. So that's what we're doing at Nidd, to the great relief of many there.

Having played piano for dementia singing groups for ten years, I know the value to health and wellbeing of singing familiar songs. Memories revived, words married to melodies, friendships remembered. There's more to singing than meets the ear!

We've almost tamed the immediate physical effects of Covid-19. We're becoming aware now of the mental costs. When do we start to consider the spiritual costs of closed churches, curtailed services and restrictive practices?

When Joseph Haydn was criticised by the catholic church for writing "happy" church music, he replied "At the thought of God my heart so leaps with joy that I can do no other".

May our hearts leap long enough to see the CD players returned to their cupboards Grrrrr.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, has launched a free national phone line as a simple new way to bring worship and prayer into people's homes while church buildings are closed because of the coronavirus. Daily Hope, offers music, prayers and reflections as well as full worship services from the Church of England at the end of a telephone line. The line – which is available 24 hours a day on **0800 804 8044** – has been set up particularly with those unable to join online church services during the period of restrictions in mind.

The service is supported by the Church of England nationally as well as through the Connections group based at Holy Trinity Claygate in Surrey and the Christian charity Faith in Later Life.

Although thousands of churches across the country are now running services and prayer groups online while public worship remains suspended, many people – especially older people – do not have access to the internet. The line also recognises the impact of social distancing restrictions and self -isolation measures on those suffering from loneliness.


Callers will hear a special greeting from the Archbishop before being able to choose from a range of options, including hymns, prayers, reflections and advice on COVID-19.

A section called Hymn Line offers callers a small selection of hymns, updated daily. An option entitled 'Hymns We Love', provides a hymn and reflection and is based on an initiative by the Connections group
