Reading: Matthew 21: 1-11

Peter Murrays Thoughts

In the ancient world conquering kings rode horses; a king riding a donkey would have been a strange sight. But the arrival of this king and his mission would be like no other. It was widely believed that the Messiah would come to set up an earthly kingdom and deliver the people from Roman rule. People had seen a few pseudo-Messiahs come and go, leading revolts that came to nothing. Now at last their hopes would be realised. Or would they? It soon became clear that most of those spreading their cloaks underfoot, waving their palm branches and shouting their acclamations would a few days later be behaving differently. (Matthew 27: 22,23). The tone would change and the king would be rejected.

Jesus chose to ride on the donkey to demonstrate that the kingdom he was inaugurating was one of peace and love. The donkey is a symbol of peace, and in doing so he was fulfilling the Old Testament prophecy, particularly Zechariah 9:9. In those times to show their respect for a king, it was customary for people to put down their clothes for the king to walk on (2 Kings 9:12,13). But this king would not fulfil popular expectations. Palm Sunday reminds us that Jesus' kingdom is one of service and servanthood, offering peace with God, salvation and promise of eternal life. He desires to make a triumphal entry into our lives, transforming them and bringing in his reign of justice and as Jesus journeyed into Jerusalem, so we as his disciples are called to an ever- deepening commitment to journey with him and demonstrate his love and peace to others. One commentator says: " It's dynamic, always engaging, ever moving, unpredictable, and it constantly compels us outside of ourselves." And it's always an exciting adventure!

Final prayer

O Lord God, from whom we come, in whom we are infolded, to whom we shall return: bless us in our pilgrimage through life; with the power of the Father protecting, with the love of Jesus in dwelling, and the light of the spirit guiding, until we come to our ending, in life and love eternal. Amen
