Thoughts on the reading from Pip Lawrence

Let's pray

Father thank you for your word, though we are separated, we pray that you will speak to us through it. Grant us open ears and hearts, for we ask in your precious name. Amen.

Well, as my Nana Havercroft used to say, "What a palaver". This saying, always said with feeling, was reserved for occasions when things went totally pear shaped. When there was much talk over events and happenings, when things did not go as expected.

I think she would be using the expression had she been alive today. Things are definitely pear shaped at the moment. Each daily government briefing brings news and no news. We are all in a sort of no mans land. There is no sign of reprieve or exit. Nothing is as we had expected 2020 to be. At New Year we probably all expected life to roll on as normal, this year bringing its highs and lows. Maybe there were changes on our horizon, a new career, a new house, a special holiday, a wedding or possibly an operation. All kinds of hum drum and special things lay ahead along with life's usual hiccups and hazards. 2020 is not what we expected. This morning the reading from Luke presents a similar situation. Cleopas and his companion have left Jerusalem to go to Emmaus. They leave with hearts full of disappointment, dismay and distress. Things had not turned out the way they had expected. They tell "the stranger" who draws alongside them as they talked " but we had hoped that he (Jesus) was the one who was going to redeem Israel". They explain that Jesus had been a prophet, powerful in word and deed, but had been crucified. Now things had got really strange, his tomb was empty, and their women had told tales of him being alive.

We all know the story. Jesus tells them that they are slow of heart to believe all the prophets had spoken. He explains the scriptures to them, which unhelpfully the gospel writer doesn't record. Then finally breaks bread with them and they see the stranger for who he really is, Jesus. They return to Jerusalem immediately in a very different frame of mind. They find the disciples to tell them about their journey only to discover that Jesus had been before them and the disciples were saying "it is true, the Lord has risen.

I don't know what you noticed in particular as you read this passage but I was rather struck by v17-19. "He asked them "what are you discussing together as you walk along? They stood still, their faces downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, asked him, "Are you only a visitor to Jerusalem and do not know these things that have happened there in these days?"

How often in these last days have we been still and downcast before the Lord, querying if he knows what's

happening. If we are honest I'm sure many of us will have experienced a whole range of emotions. We may have been anxious, fearful, even occasionally a bit tearful as we inhabit a new season. Things are not as we expected. The current circumstance may also be making other situations in our lives even harder than they already are. Perhaps we are perfectly fine but have concerns for our loved ones. It is important that we are really honest as we seek the Lord, we need to acknowledge where we are really at. Why, because, in to the arena of honesty and truth the Lord will step in and journey with us, just as he walked alongside two broken disciples all those years ago on the road to Emmaus.

What did they say to Jesus, v 29 "But they urged him strongly "stay with us."

We all need the Lord to stay with us right now, also as we walk into an unknown future. We must wait patiently and let the future unfold. We need to trust that Jesus will stay with us, we need to allow his peace, comfort and healing to steady and guide us as we navigate the path ahead, it's one we haven't travelled along before, few of us have ever experienced a pandemic. It won't be easy, no walk in the park. Unknowns make most of us uneasy, they rob us of all of our certainty. They take hostage our familiar and our security. But, in truth, life is pretty uncertain most of the time, none of us know what our future holds, none of can say for certain what will happen tomorrow.

The only concrete certainty we have is Jesus, he never changes, he is our solid rock, he is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble. Therefore we will not fear, though the earth give way. We can trust him for all our tomorrows whether we live in a time of peace or turmoil, plenty or want, health or pandemic.

So let's ask Jesus to stay with us now and always, to bring that peace that only he can bring. Let's ask for help to ease any anxiety or fear. Let's fix our eyes on him and as the writer to the Hebrews says "Let us hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful. Amen.
