A Reflection from Simon Wilson

At this time of uncertainty and suffering, we are very much living both in the "now and also the "not yet". We are living our lives in ways unimaginable just a few weeks ago. Whilst in the present, we are discovering Zoom and Joe Wicks and his workouts, Captain Tom's walking, banging saucepans on Thursday nights to applaud the NHS and discovering the "joys" of home education. Our community is finding ways to serve one another. At the same time we are yearning for that time when we can be together or even just to be able to venture outside our houses and gardens. We are Easter people living in a Good Friday world. Like the disciples who encountered the Risen Jesus, we do not know what the new normal will be.

This Sunday is designated Good Shepherd Sunday. When we think of the good shepherd who lays down his life for his sheep,

we are encountering the key workers of their day -hard workers in tough working conditions, poorly paid but doing vital work. The Bible is not clear about whether they had adequate PPE to fight off the wolf threatening the lives of those in their care!

One good thing from this Covid life is that some of the more unheralded workers are finally getting the respect they deserve: the delivery driver, the care home worker, the bus driver, the supermarket shelf filler, the nurse or the cleaner etc. The Church of England also sees today as Vocation Sunday, well this year the vocations we value have changed. Long may that continue!

As one of those suffering from a chronic condition, I am on 12 week lockdown so am living with being shielded and gatedseparated from the rest of the flock. For us, the gate we read about in John 10 becomes both a means of exclusion on one level but on another, a path to liberation. Jesus the gatekeeper is our way to safety, leading us to a restful place where we know we are loved and protected: shielded. When the time is right he will not only let us out into a changed world with the stumbling blocks and anxieties that we will encounter but promises to be at our side as we do so.

Jesus is the gate-the entry point to that place of change, depth, struggle and love, simultaneously terrifying and exhilarating. Sometimes we wish there was no gate: firm boundaries, bullet proof and siege resistant but before long God reminds us of that aching hole in our hearts where insight and endless possibilities lie: the glorious green pastures beside still waters- awaiting us all when this time passes. That world is out there. The now and the not yet.
