A Reflection from Pip Lawrence

Let's pray,

Loving Heavenly Father help us, as we look at your word, to draw closer to you. For we ask in Jesus name. Amen

We are living in shifting times aren't we? Not only do we have to accustom ourselves to the changing restrictions of living with COVID 19, we also live in the age of post-truth. In our post-modern world everything

is subject to question. Nothing is accepted, or it is maybe considered as "alternative facts".

Actually it is nothing new. Today's reading shows us that it is human nature to question the authority of anything that we personally take exception to. In the reading we have the chief priests and the elders questioning Jesus. They have seen how he has entered Jerusalem, crowds cheering, waving palm branches, a rapturous reception. Then he has entered the temple and upset more than a few apple carts. Jesus was on their turf, they were feeling threatened. They needed to protect their patch, so they question his authority. " By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority? " They claimed that they wanted to know why Jesus was doing these things and also who gave him permission to do them. In reality they were not actually interested. All they wanted was for him to go away and stop rocking the proverbial boat. The answer Jesus gives them reveals their motive. They are duplicitous, there is no honesty in their approach. All they want to do is keep things the same as they are. They claim to be God's people, but they were not able or willing to see that the Lord had turned up, they liked things the way they were.

The parable emphasises, in part, the feelings expressed by the questioners. The first son says "no" to the initial request to work in the vineyard, but later changes his mind and goes to work. The second son makes a show of responding but then does nothing. Let's face it, we have all no doubt been like that at one time or another.

So what can we learn from all these human traits this morning, or whenever we are engaging with this service? There is much that we can consider, that relates to how we respond to Jesus in our own lives. So we will briefly look at three things, belief, honesty and authority.

Belief is a cornerstone of our faith. We have to believe in Jesus in order to begin a relationship with Him. Unlike the chief priests and elders we really need to believe and know that Jesus is the son of God, saviour, redeemer, alpha and omega. Belief gives rise to love, enabling us to recognise that He loved us first. As John says " this is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His son as an atoning sacrifice."

If our belief and love is languishing in the doldrums, we will be unproductive and seriously lack joy. So periodically we are well served if we take time to check the current state of our love and belief.

We can do this in the certainty of the lord's care, because love gives rise to honesty. The first son very honestly says "no", exercising his free will, but also exercises that free will to change his mind. Jesus commends the first son.

We know that security in being loved for who we are, at a human level, allows for honesty in relationships. This is also true of our relationship with Jesus. It can only really grow, mature and blossom if we are honest with Jesus and allow him to work in our lives, knowing that He loves us, even though, as the word says, He knows what is in a man.

How honest are we with Jesus, with ourselves, and with others? I pray that all of us are all rooted in an honest, loving relationship with Jesus, and with one another.

If we are, we will have no problem in accepting Jesus authority in our lives. Unlike the chief priests, elders and the second son, we will be able to surrender, knowing He is God and also knows best. We can then be completely secure in the knowledge that, as it says in John " if you hold to my teachings, you really are my disciples, then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free". Which is all part of the wonderful paradox of surrender to Jesus Christ.

So as we walk with The Lord this week, with His gracious, helpful, guiding Holy Spirit enabling us to seek Him in belief, honesty and accepting His authority we will be able to face the current times with peace, strength and even joy. Let's close by taking space to ask The Lord to strengthen our faith and our actions born of faith. Amen.
