## A Reflection from Pip Lawrence

We are all going to remember 2020's Remembrance Sunday. It will be remembered as the Sunday when the village was not able to gather in its church to remember our dead. It makes the words 'lest we forget' even more poignant. These words are chiselled in memorials, we can read them there; and said in services up and down our nation. Possibly the original source of these words is found in Kipling's poem 'Recessional' where we also read these words: "Lord God of Hosts, be with us yet, lest we forget, lest we forget."

Remembrance Sunday is important because it reminds us that we are, by nature, inclined to be forgetful. Time can erase events and happenings as new events and happenings crowd old ones out. Believe it or not one day coronavirus will be as waters that have gone by. As we make space today to remember those who have gone before us, either in the difficult theatre of war, or more recently in different circumstances, we consciously make space 'lest we forget'.

So how is the parable reading in Matthew's gospel today relevant to remembrance. To find out we have to look beyond the story of the wise and foolish bridesmaids. Jesus tells this parable just after he has been speaking about the signs of the end of the age. A time when all will be laid bare. He also speaks of a master who leaves his household in the charge of a servant. The servant falls into bad habits as he awaits his master's return. In a sense the parable of the bridesmaids is a similar story. The wise are prepared, and if you will, the foolish have forgotten to be ready and prepared, a little like the servant. When the bridegroom arrives for them the boat has set sail without them.

We learn from this parable, for a start, that we are all free to choose our own path, to be ready or not. On a day when we remember those who fought for freedom we can also recognise that we are free to choose our own way when it comes to our relationship with Jesus. We also learn that the wise bridesmaids are a picture of a life of belief and faith that sees its reward in welcome from the bridegroom. The foolish bridesmaids are denied welcome, and we all know that no one really wants to be left out.

So where are we on our faith journey today. Are we wise - our lamps with flames fed by prayer, worship, knowledge of the word and expectancy of the Lord's return? Or are we foolish - carrying lamps that have run dry either through negligence, unbelief, or plain forgetfulness? If our lamps are dry, now is the time to remember that, like those who have gone before us, our lives will conclude. None of us want to be found wanting at heaven's gate. So, we need to act now, remembering that we serve a God whose desire is to welcome us all. There is always a welcome for all who turn to Christ, no matter who we are, what we have done, said, or been. In II Peter there is a passage that starts with the words "But do not forget this one thing..." and ends with the words "He is patient with you, not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance".

So, let's make sure, on this strange Remembrance Sunday, that our lamps are filled to the brim with the measure of knowing Jesus as Saviour and Lord and the custodian of all those who have died in the faith. **Amen.**

We pray for doctors and hospital staff and all those looking after the sick. Give them wisdom, strength, skill, and resilience. We thank them for all they are doing.

Lord - your world seems strange at the moment with a pandemic, hunger, terrorist attacks and uncertainty. You made the world and care for all Lord. Help us to trust you; to look to help others and bring your love and peace into the hurt we see around us. We thank you for all the kindness and care we see.

Remind us Lord each time we wash our hands that in our baptism you call us to let go of our fears and live in joy, peace, and hope. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.
