<u>A Reflection</u> from Pip Lawrence

If we cast our minds back to the Sunday before Advent last year, the landscape looked very different to what it does today. Back then the coronavirus was a world away. Only avid news-watchers were really aware of a new virus causing issues in far flung places. Back then we were planning for an angel festival, a village Carol service, a Christingle, and all the usual paraphernalia of Christmas. Today, as we end our church year with the Sunday referred to as "Christ the King" or 'stir up Sunday', things look very different. All our plans are going to be in keeping with the new rules.

One thing, however, is <u>not</u> different. Whether we are living in the new normal, or in the times of the more familiar and comfortable, it is how we respond to the reading today. For me, these verses in Matthew are among the most powerful in his gospel. Why - because they are very direct, very clear, and (unlike other verses) there is no 'wriggle room'. They speak clearly of how we, as Christians, are called to live as we wait for the time when we will all stand before the judgement seat of Christ. As Penny reminded us all last week, Christ <u>will</u> come again.

So, what are we called to do? Is the call only for those who reside in important places? For the great and the good? Is it beyond our comprehension and ability? No, far from it. We are told that living this way is the right way for all. The most incredible result is that it will conclude with an invitation to take our inheritance in the kingdom prepared for us since the creation of the world. We are told that care for our fellow man is the key to pleasing our Heavenly Father. Our Father, who cared for us by sending his son Jesus, asks us to care for others.

We are called to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty. To invite the stranger in and clothe the needy. Very relevant in these coronavirus times we are called to look after the sick. Also to take care of those in prison. Basically summed up in the command to "love our neighbour as ourselves".

Easy isn't it? Well not if we are honest. To be honest we are all rather good at looking after ourselves, but loving others as ourselves is not so easy. There are people, it has to be said, who are easy to love and care for. They are the people who present us with no challenges. They are joy bringers. Others are more difficult, and cross, and different to us. So loving them is far from easy.

So, how do we personally respond to these verses today? We are all called to love as Jesus did. In our own strength we will only set ourselves up to fail, but with the help of the in-dwelling Holy Spirit we are given the grace to see people as Jesus sees them; and that makes a world of difference. It enables us to serve others. As the reading says: "whatever you did for the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me".

So, on the last Sunday of our church year, when we are all struggling to make sense of these unfamiliar times, let's remind ourselves of a verse of the prophet Micah which sums up the direction and guidance we have received from our gospel reading in Matthew this morning - "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly, love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God". Amen.
