A Reflection, **from Pip Lawrence**

Last time I had to look at this Epiphany reading, I confess that my heart really was not in it. I have preached on many an Epiphany Sunday. It is the Sunday most vicars take off after the exertions of Christmas. I thought I had probably exhausted any train of thought, or any new revelations. This Epiphany, as I came to look at these very familiar verses I feel very differently. The familiarity of the words, the constancy of the story, the whole extraordinary episode made me rejoice again.

Why? Well I guess because the last year has been so very different and very unsettling. So painful for some, and completely life-limiting for us all. So, it was deeply comforting to plant myself in the nourishing soil of the familiar. The tried and true, the unchanging story of the Magi. The

eternal, century-spanning, search for Jesus. It has thrilled me, reminding me of hearing the story for the first time as a child. It has made me think anew of that special journey millennia ago. A time when no-one had to wear a mask, or do the pavement dance (dodge' em fashion), or socially distance, or drench their hands in antibacterial gel. I gave thanks that no matter what happens, even a pandemic, we can all still search for Jesus. We can all go on our own journey to meet the divine, despite being only human, and as the word says: "fallen short of the glory of God".

I am certain that the events of the Magi - the setting out to follow a star, which signified the advent of the king of the Jews, its twists and turns, the arrival in Bethlehem - is as familiar to you as it is to me. I am sure that you have heard countless times about the gold, frankincense, and myrrh. The significance of them, how the Magi worshipped before presenting them. The dream that warned them to return by a different route. I have preached on all these things and, as I have said, thought I had exhausted my thoughts. Until I looked afresh and these words really struck me: "we saw His star in the east and have come to worship Him".

I thought about that star, 'His star', and I realised, for me it had only really been a peripheral part of the event. As with most things it held a lot more significance than I had previously realised. Why should anyone be surprised that God used a light to bring the Magi to the author of light, the Light of the World? I recalled how it says in Job, when the foundations of the world were laid, that: "the morning stars sang together and all the angels shouted for joy". Also in the Psalms we are told: "He determines the number of stars and calls them each by name." And Peter speaks of "the morning star rising in our hearts". God created stars, they bring us such joy as we gaze upon them on a clear and starry night. They led the Magi to Jesus. How exciting is that?!

Stars are used by the Lord to bless us, not in a horoscope-type of way, but as a reminder of the light that shines in the darkness. As a village we have been putting-up stars and been reminded of the Light of the World.

The Magi followed the star and it led them to them to Jesus. What about us today? Have we followed our metaphorical star and found the Lord for ourselves? Is the author of light the king of our hearts? Is he enthroned there? Above anything else? If He is, then we are truly blessed and we

will be able to recognise that if He is for us nothing can stand against us. He has promised that those who follow Him have the right to be with Him where He is. Now I do not know if there will be stars in heaven, but I know that the "bright morning star" abides there because Revelation tells us so.

Today as we mark the Sunday of Epiphany, and also the first Sunday of a new calendar year, we can all look back and see how the Lord has been with us in a difficult year. We can look forward, with hope, even knowing that everything changes, except for the Lord. He is, and was, and will be, our constancy, our anchor, our foundation, our help, and our guide. He called the Magi to follow His star; and this year He calls us all in different ways to do different things. Whether we are called to starlight paths or otherwise we can be assured that He will light our paths.

Thank you Jesus. Amen.

Church building closed

I am sorry to tell you that we have decided that we need to keep the church building closed for the next few weeks, apart from funerals. The PCC will review this at a meeting on Monday 18th January - when we hope to have a plan for re-opening, having had a re-think and re-done all the risk assessments.

It has been a tough decision to make; as it goes against the grain to remain closed when we are legally allowed to open for both private

prayer and public acts of worship. Tier 4 rules state: "we must stay at home and not mingle with anyone not in our household or bubble". We need to stick to both the rules, and the spirit of the rules. Alongside this the rising rate of infections locally is very concerning, and the pressure on the QEH is immense, with a huge increase in Covid-19 patients. The new strain of Covid-19 seems to be passed on much more easily too, so reducing our contact with other people is vital.

We have, as a church, been acting cautiously and carefully since March, following the rules and ensuring that we care for our neighbours and each other. We will still continue to be, and do, church with daily prayer on Zoom, online worship, paper service copies, and community care and outreach.

(Non-internet folk please note below – new development re participation)

Also for the next three Sundays (3rd, 10th, and 17th January) we will, instead of an 'in church' service, have three 'ZOOM church services' at 10am - **Heacham Parish Church on Zoom!** These will be what we would have done in church but via Zoom. You can access the service by computer, smartphone, or by (ordinary) telephone as a verbal only participant. This week it will be an Epiphany service followed by the opportunity to chat with each other afterwards; for those who wish to do so. The online and paper services will continue and, of course, we know that we can worship and pray anywhere at anytime.
