



Charity of the month-Christian Aid



'Climate chaos is one of the greatest injustices we face. Together we STOP this climate crisis.'

This month our charity for the month is Christian Aid, this year their campaign for Christian aid Week (10-16 May) is focusing on the great difficulties climate change is causing many people around the world. 'Droughts are now more frequent and more intense due to the climate crisis.... millions of people in Kenya, are struggling to get enough food and water.'

Here is Florence's story. 'She is full of life, love and laughter. The women in her farming group look up to her.

She's courageous, kind and a survivor. A few years ago, her husband died, leaving her a widow. At that time, she had no water to grow crops. Her children were hungry. She had to walk for hours on a dangerous journey to collect water. 'Life was miserable,' she told us. Florence could easily have been defeated. But Florence is a fighter, and she shows the women in her farming group that they can be fighters too. Next to her farm, Florence is proud to show us something remarkable a dam, full of fresh water.

With this dam, Florence can grow tomatoes, onions, papayas and chillies on her farm. Her children can eat healthy, nutritious vegetables. It's her source of life and joy.

Florence also uses the water from the dam to keep honey bees. She sells the rich, golden honey for cash at the market. Now, Florence is reaping a good life for herself and her family.

The dam gives Florence strength to withstand even the most unpredictable weather. It's a reliable water source, whether she faces long drought or relentless rainstorms.

Florence is generous, and she knows other people are struggling to cope without a reliable water source. 'There is a village nearby – they don't have an earth dam. They travel for a long way to come to this water point. They are suffering.'

Village Events | News

Seer Green Gardeners

A highlight of last summer's lockdown was the Bring and Take A Plant event, when many plants changed hands for free with generous donations going to Thames Air Ambulance.

We will be organising a similar event this year, as well as a conventional plant sale.



Look out for dates and details on our website and village noticeboards.

Frosts can come as late as May, so do protect tender plants at night with fleece or a cloche and harden off home-grown tender plants before planting outside.

You can still sow annual flowers such as sunflowers, California poppies, calendula, and zinnias in May, but please avoid cutting hedges where birds may be nesting; and provide water for the birds as the days get warmer.

May in the garden

- Tie in new shoots of climbing plants.
- Plant up hanging baskets and patio pots and feed them well.
- Check lilies for scarlet lily beetles and their larvae.
- Pinch out tips of bedding plants and young annuals, to encourage bushier growth.
- · Open doors and vents on greenhouses on warm days.
- Regularly hoe off weeds, as they'll grow rapidly in May.

Our Living Village – Ask and It Will be Given ...

In previous Parish Magazines, I asked if anyone had a copy of the second part of the article: "On the Street Where You Live", and also for information about the treasure trove of local information collected by Brian Simms - and we now have both! Many thanks to Dru Turney and Geoffrey Sawyer for the article, and to Gary Simms for his father's research library.

The article tells us Jacob Howard lived in Ponds Farm during the late 19th century, with the field where Howard Road and Howard Crescent are now located becoming known as "Jacob Howard's Field". When this land was sold, it became allotments and a recreation ground with access via cart tracks from Chalfont Road and Orchard Road. Although some building took place in Howard Road in the late twenties and early thirties, it was not until the 1950s that real development of the land began. The allotments gradually fell vacant and became building plots. The adjoining fields also began "growing" houses and bungalows, forming Howard Crescent.

Seer Mead owes its name to two of its first residents, who counter-proposed a proposition by the Parish Council that the road be known as "Bayne Hill Road".

Lakes Yard (the area near Hall Place) perhaps took its name from another well-known local personality: in the mid-1800s, Mrs. Lake is said to have run a small school in one of the cottages, charging 1½d (less than 1p) per week per pupil!

But where was Greys Cottage, where another educational establishment is said to have been run around 1844? Can anyone help locate Prospect Place, The Laurels, Ivy Cottage, or Park View which appear in the 1911 Seer Green census, or Dainshaw House from the 1851 census?

Tweet of the month: Rook – politician or parson?

Walkers around Seer Green and Jordans are sure to encounter the corvid family – crows and jackdaws in gardens and fields; jays in the woods; magpies everywhere. Their cousins the rooks, *Corvus frugilegus*, can be harder to spot.

According to a friend's West Oxfordshire grandfather: 'if you see a rook on its own, it be a crow; if you see a lot of crows, they be rooks.' Rooks are intensely sociable, roosting together at night, and building their twig nests in crowded colonies – hence the Victorian term for a slum: a rookery.

Its call is a harsh croak, sometimes like its name, 'rooooghk', not as powerful as the crow's 'Caw! Caw! Caw!' It also produces squawks, clicks and growls, and the cacophony at rookeries may explain the term 'a parliament of rooks'.


Black and crow-sized, the rook has a steep forehead and long belly feathers like baggy trousers. With an upright posture, it struts along, probing for invertebrates with its long narrow bill, surrounded in the adult by chalky bare skin. Its sober appearance, like an old-fashioned clergyman, gave it the nickname 'church parson'; Dickens refers to it as 'that sedate and clerical bird, the rook', and it officiates at Cock Robin's funeral in the nursery rhyme.

Rooks mate for life, returning to the same nest each spring; though in the last century, Dutch elm disease forced thousands to relocate from their beloved elm trees into poplar, ash, oak or Scots pine.

Sometimes they occupy less conventional properties: near Grove End Farm, beyond Jordans, two trees hold 13 rooks' nests, and in the adjoining field, a pylon appears to hold six more – one at the end of each arm. A pylon near Widmer Farm on Bottom Lane appears to have three nests. I've watched birds entering the twiggy bits but can't yet tell if there are any young.

A slightly longer walk through lovely woods and along a beautiful valley but with a great pub en route!

Length:8 1/4 milesStart point:Hambleden ChurchDifficulty:Moderate

The starting point for this walk is Hambleden between Marlow and Henley at the lovely church made famous by the opening credits to The Vicar of Dibley! Head south on the road over the little bridge and just after meeting the main road turn right on a footpath that skirts upwards round the hill. Where the woods become fields, turn right until you meet a track and then turn right again and follow the track until it reaches another wood. Continue on the path and follow it all the way through the woods, joining another major path which comes from the right, and thereafter through fields to Upper Woodend Farm. The woodland section can be muddy – especially after forestry work.

At the Farm turn right along the road and then shortly, at a T junction, go straight ahead following the Shakespeare's Way path to Southend. Turn briefly right onto a road then right again on a path (Chiltern Way) and follow that down the hill until another road is reached. Turn right and where a path crosses the road turn right again then fork left slightly uphill and skirt round the hill inside the woods. That path will eventually take you downhill to Poynatts Farm and on to the road through Skirmett with the welcoming Frog at Skirmett pub about 100 yards on your right.

After leaving the pub, continue south along the road for a couple of hundred yards then, when the main road turns sharp right, turn left on a smaller road and almost immediately right onto a path. Follow this down the valley, with a couple of instances where you temporarily join local roads for a few yards, and keep going in the same direction all the way back to Hambleden. There are often herds of deer on the hillsides, kites flying above you, and a vineyard on your left nearer to Hambleden and it really is a delightful (and flat!) finale to the walk!


