#### **Christian Aid, charity for the month**



This year the Christian Aid campaign for Christian Aid week (14-20 May 2023) focuses on Malawi and Mozambique. They say 'Soaring costs are affecting people here and around the world. Families in Malawi are paying the price of this global crisis.

Food, fuel, fertiliser and school fees have doubled in price in the last 12 months. And hard -working families are seeing their harvests fail as the climate crisis brings increasingly erratic weather.

Cyclone Freddy, the longest-lasting tropical cyclone on record (lasting 34 days), has hit Malawi and Mozambique. This cyclone is the equivalent of a full North Atlantic hurricane season.

Malawi experienced a year's worth of rain during the 4-week cyclone.

The number of people affected by the Tropical Cyclone in Malawi continues to rise. Over 508,000 people are displaced and hundreds have lost their lives. There's also an increased risk of malaria and cholera in the immediate aftermath.'

#### Jen's story

'Jen dreams of her children being able to have the education they deserve. Her hard-working boys have earned places at top colleges-but Jen cannot afford to send them both. 'My heart longs to see our children finish school,' says Jen. 'These dreams are important to me, because by doing so, I'll be sure that I am creating a good future for the children.'

Jen and her husband have two acres of pigeon peas, but they are struggling with the effects of the climate crisis. The rainfall is unreliable, and there are more storms, flooding and stronger winds.

The pigeon pea is a tough plant, able to withstand a lot just like Jen. But to make the most of her crop, Jen needs to plant good quality seeds and sell for the best price possible, and not to unscrupulous middlemen.'

Christian Aid hopes to help farmers like Jen plant better seeds, secure a fairer price and build happier futures for their children.

# 2023 dates announced for the 7th Seer Green Beer and Music Festival.

After a spectacular, sell-out weekend in 2022, we are delighted to confirm that the Seer Green Beer and Music Festival will be returning this autumn for the seventh time.

The first Festival was held in 2014 to raise funds for a much needed new Scout Hut for the village. Initially the brainchild of Rachel Gibson and Simon Edwards, that first weekend was not only a great fundraiser but a much enjoyed event which brought the local community together around

fantastic music, food and drink. That first undertaking resulted in a beer and music festival committee chaired by Nikki Walker and before we know it has become an annual fixture! After a two-year break for Covid in 2020-21, the demand to bring it back had not faded and the 2022 event was so popular that we sold out.

Over the years, the Festival's stage has showcased a mix of local and national music talent. Performances from homegrown bands like Crows and Arrows, Josh Harper's band and Al Breeze's band, Blind Diviner, have been interspersed with a range of professional bands and this year promises to be no exception.

Paul Waters, Band Co-ordinator, adds "We are very lucky to have such a depth of great musical talent in the village, and are delighted that so many local bands have signed up again for the 7th Festival this September alongside some professional acts. We have a fantastic lineup planned this year, including the outrageous rockers from the PFJ come back on stage by popular demand. This year's dates have been announced as Friday 22 September (6.30pm to 11.00pm) and Saturday 23 September (3.30pm to 11.00pm). Tickets will only be available online and will be on sale through Eventbrite from 1 May.

We're excited to have been invited to help Seer Green children with various gardening projects this year. Ninety Key Stage 1 children at the school will be growing spuds in buckets during the summer term while Fuchsia planting was on the agenda at the churches' Explore Easter event on 3 April. We helped fifty children to transfer their own tiny 'Blue Angel' plug plant into a pot to take home and care for over the summer. A few were hesitant about plunging their hands into lovely crumbly compost but most relished it! Fingers crossed that lots of them will appear in blooming glory at the Jubilee Hall on 16 September!

25 more of the plants are earmarked for our Brownies to do the same and the rest are for residents signing up as below.

At the time of writing, we're still looking forward to our Spring Show and Plant sale, hoping for a Baptist Hall full of flowers and people signing up for our own 2023 spud and fuchsia growing competitions. #### **Gardening suggestions for May**

- · If you grow tulips in pots, they're more likely to flower in future years if you move them from pot to open ground. Either way, after flowers are over, cut the stalks off at the base so they don't waste energy on producing seed.
- · If slugs are enjoying the fruits of your labours, May is a good time to apply biological control nematodes which are easily obtained online.
- If you're ever unsure about how

many tomatoes to plant in a Growbag, "Which" offers a handy rule of thumb - check the bag volume and allow 10 litres for each tomato and 15 or more litres for cucumbers.

#### **Seer Green Allotments association**



Even our beautiful new gate can't protect us from a late frost, keep checking the forecasts.

The month of May can bring us to more than one kind of succession so whilst the great and the good are busy in Westminster Abbey let us look at not just what we are sowing, but how much and how often. Succession planting, more often aspired to than achieved in my case, is the staggering of sowing the same type of seed by a few weeks so as not to crop all at once and be overwhelmed by a glut, forcing a cry of "Oh not this again" at the supper table and having acquaintances hide round corners when they see you approaching with another armful of courgettes/ lettuce etc...

By all means sow an extra cucumber/ tomato/brassica/courgette seed or two, handy in case of unexpected fatality, and spares can be happily swapped or gifted. But a two week gap between sowing bean seeds can prolong your cropping season while not exhausting your love of the vegetable. Unless you are running a soup kitchen there is a limit to the number of ways you can enjoy a courgette, 3 plants is more than suffcient for most households! An early row of beetroot seedlings can be thinned, young'uns destined for the salad bowl leaving space for the rest to grow. Don't forget to harden young plants off gradually if started indoors.

Tradition has us putting our spuds in on Good Friday, beans on May Day (old style 12 - 14 of May). Moon planting simply put, is root crops in when the moon is waning, plants that grow above the soil in when the moon is waxing. If you are dancing under the full moon this month call her Mother's Moon, Hare Moon or Bright Moon.

#### Our Living Village- Ah yes, I remember it well

Few things are more evocative than the first-hand memories of the older residents of our villages. As part of the Our Living Village project we're collecting such memories, ready to post them on the community website www.ourlivingvillage.org.

Several previous residents have contacted us from far and wide. Here are just a few examples.

Michael Rabiger lived at The Poplars, 42 Chalfont Road from 1943 to 1952 (aged 4 - 13). He's now a worldfamous documentary maker living in Chicago. He writes: I grew up around people called Boddy, Bowler, Cyster, Child, and Payne; my teacher in the village hall kindergarten was Miss Fanny Worley. I saw a V1 fly over the church during WW2 and participated in the VE day victory celebration. I learned to ride my bike in the Cherry Orchard near the 1940s post office, and have many memories of growing up in the village.

Dr Digby L James, publisher of old books and minister of the Quinta Independent Evangelical Church, Weston Rhyn, Shropshire has written:

I was born in the upstairs main bedroom at 14 Orchard Road in 1952 and lived there until 1966. The privet hedge was planted by my father and, I guess, other neighbours. The long rear garden went down to a barbed wire fence bordering a Manor Farm field/cherry orchard. Going under the barbed wire once I caught my cheek on a barb and still have the scarthough now covered by my beard!

And Peter Martin wrote: My family moved out from Acton, W3 in October 1950 when I was three and bought a bungalow, built in1924 (since demolished) and replaced at 38 Highlands Road. At that time Highlands Road was unmade as were Howard Road/Crescent and

Gurnells Road. The latter was particularly prone to large puddles and mud - great fun as a child playing with friends!

On Tuesday May 9 we shall hold our Annual General Meeting, followed by the very entertaining film "The Phantom of the Open" (12A).



#### On the Wild Side in May: The Dunnock

Its name is Middle English for 'small and brown.' It feeds quietly under the shrubbery, hence its old name, 'hedge sparrow'. Its song is brief and businesslike, pretty in an inconspicuous way: 'Heedle de deedle de deedle de dee'. So sober does the Dunnock (*Prunella modularis*) appear, that the Rev Frederick Morris cited it in his 1853 *History of British Birds* as an example for us all to emulate.

But, as ornithologists now know, that's not quite right. On April 1, in Hall Barn Lane, I saw two Dunnocks fly into a hedge and sing. Most male birds won't tolerate a rival so near, so what was up? Another Dunnock had just vanished into cover nearby. It might have been a female being courted by two

competitors, who were only briefly tolerating each other. They would woo her by flapping their wings overhead while, if interested, she would flutter hers hence another old species name: 'shufflewing'.

Or this may have been a 'beta male' helping an 'alpha male' see off an interloper from their shared territory. What does the beta gain from this? The female in such a ménage will sometimes evade the boss's attention and mate with his lieutenant. This increases her reproductive chances, as all males who pair with her will help feed her chicks. Other Dunnock family structures include monogamous couples; two females with a male; and complex patterns of four or more.

Unfortunately, the story doesn't end there: the Dunnock is a favourite target of the Cuckoo, whose monstrous chick pushes the infant Dunnocks out of their nest, with the parents blind to the substitution. Dunnocks may raise up to three broods in a summer, however, so there's a good chance some of their young will have a happy ending.

Lily - Rose Tremain

Lily is a murderer!


Abandoned as a baby at the gates of a London park, she is rescued by a police constable and taken to the foundling hospital from where she is fostered by a loving family in rural Suffolk.

On her return to the hospital, she is faced with the suffering and harsh realities of being a poor orphan for the first time.

Lily is a wonderful character, and it is impossible to not emphasise with her circumstance and journey in life – the reader really roots for her

I love Rose Tremain's writing – no two of her books are the same. She engages the reader, sharing just enough information to keep us captivated, but not enough to guess what happens next, keeping our interest until the very last page.

This is a a heartrending story of the injustice and cruelty inflicted upon children in Victorian England, and of the tantalising possibilities of love and redemption.



On the long list for the Women's Fiction prize this is a devastating novel set in Belfast during The Troubles.

In the daytime, Cushla Lavery teaches seven-yearolds in a small town near Belfast, in the evening, she helps her brother in his pub. In between, she makes sure that her alcohol addicted mother is still alive.

There is not much happening in her life until, one evening, Michael Agnew shows up in the pub.

He is a lot older than Cushla, but nevertheless, something sparks between them.

Times are hard in Belfast when the war is raging in the streets and the news reports deaths daily.

Michael's job as a barrister puts him at risk, yet, with Cushla, political tensions are far away. Until they aren't anymore.

She finds herself unable to help one isolated child Davy McGeown and his family.

The two threads become expertly and painfully interwoven. Cushla finds herself living two lives, one secret, interior and with dangerous consequences.

Not a cheerful read – but definitely one that will stay with me.

#### The Echo Chamber - John Boyne

This latest book from this versatile author, The Echo Chamber, is an hugely entertaining light read.


It features the Cleverley family, how they live their privileged lives while at the same time, documenting and sharing their escapades on social media.

#### Aldbury, Ashridge and The Ridgeway



A beautiful ridge walk with extensive views

Length: 5½ miles

Start point: Greyhound Inn, Aldbury

**Difficulty:** Easy, but one fairly steep bit early on

This walk starts from a pub in the middle of Aldbury, proceeding through the Ashridge Forest and on to views from The Ridgeway. Walk east from the village pond for 100 metres along the road, then take an unsignposted track diagonally to the left. Follow the track through the woods as the path gets steeper and eventually merges with a path from the right. The path flattens, and you arrive at the open space by the Bridgewater Monument, dedicated to the third Duke of Bridgewater, who lived in Ashridge House and was famous for building canals during the industrial revolution.

Take the obvious path north past the Monument, and continue on this well-maintained, level track for  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles. Pass a house and ignore tracks to left and right until a view opens up at the corner of a field, then go through a gate

and head down beside the field until you reach The Ridgeway. Turn left, and stay on The Ridgeway for 1½ miles, crossing a road and car park and climbing gently up a ridge, with views to your right, to the top of Pitstone Hill.



After the high point, the path bears left, entering woods and Aldbury Nowers nature reserve. Follow

the path until you turn to the left down wooden steps, and at the multiple path junction at the bottom leave The Ridgeway by turning left and then rapidly right through a copse. There is a golf course on your left and you eventually come out onto the course and walk down a clearly defined path through various gates back to the road near Aldbury. The golf course is part of Stocks House Hotel (seen to the left), previously owned by Hugh Hefner - with an 'interesting' and lurid recent history! It was also the venue for the cover of the Oasis album 'Be Here Now'. Turn left at the road and the village centre is ahead of you.


