It is with great pleasure and excitement that we can announce that we have a new vicar, Jez (Jeremy) Carr, at Holy Trinity Seer Green and Jordans. We have to wait a bit longer for the paperwork to be completed, but Jez's Licensing Service will be held at 6pm on Wednesday 28 September in Holy Trinity, and then he can officially start. The service will be led by Alan Wilson, Bishop of Buckingham. Invited guests include Archdeacon Guy, the Amersham Area Dean, the lay chair of the Amersham Deanery, the Parish Council, the Head Teacher at Seer Green Church of England School, local church leaders, as well as the congregation of Holy Trinity.

Jez, his wife and young son moved into the Vicarage in August, and he will work for the Parish on Sundays and two days a week from the beginning of October. Please say hello if you see them. Jez will introduce himself in the October magazine.

On 4 September, Chalfont St Giles are holding a United service with the other village churches on their village green at 11am to celebrate St Giles. There will be no 10am service at Holy Trinity so that we can support our Benefice. All ages are welcome, and there will be live music.

Charity of the Month – David Nott Foundation

Our charity for September is the David Nott Foundation. Their mission is simple: they are dedicated to delivering the specialist training which surgeons need to save lives in countries affected by conflict and catastrophe. They have worked in Syria, Afghanistan, Ukraine, Iraq, Libya, Kenya, Yemen and Cameroon.

One of their courses is designed for medical professionals working in, or travelling to, conflict and catastrophe zones. It equips doctors with the skills to make decisions, perform a range of surgical procedures, and handle common abdominal emergencies affecting civilian populations in challenging environments.

The Hostile Environment Surgical Training (HEST) course is designed to improve the emergency trauma surgery skills of local surgeons and doctors, and better equip them for the incredibly challenging

circumstances which they face on a daily basis. The course is delivered locally in the centre of the conflict zone. Usual methods of teaching are impossible, so the David Nott Foundation has designed a bespoke full-body trauma dummy. Embracing the latest technologies, they also use Virtual Reality (VR) to simulate mass casualty scenarios, training surgeons in the decision-making skills needed to prioritise patients and save lives.

The charity recognises that it cannot stop conflict or catastrophe, but by training more doctors, it can change the prospects for the people that endure these disasters.

One Can collections - can you help?

It is with great sadness that I must report that One Can's referrals have more than doubled in a year: they are now supporting over 800 people a week.

This Autumn is going to be challenging for a great number of people with rising costs, a recession, energy hikes and a huge increase in food prices. The work One Can do to try to help those most desperately in need is astonishing. People are referred by many organisations: churches, schools, doctors, social services etc. They are then given food parcels for four weeks only, as there are so many people being referred that they simply can't keep up with the amount of food needed.

A small regular donation at one of the five collection points in the village would help enormously. I circulate the most needed items every week on the Community Chat What's App group but, honestly, literally any basic food/toiletry items would be so appreciated.

Here's a reminder of the collection points:

5 Coat Wicks (at the back of my house), Best One, The Baptist Church, 46 Orchard Road, Walton House, Manor Crescent. This is the latest list – but if in doubt UHT milk is always needed:

- Rice
- Biscuits
- Tinned potatoes
- Pasta
- · Tinned meat meals
- Toothpaste
- Toothbrushes
- Jams and Spreads
- Tinned Pulses
- Toilet roll
- Cooking Sauces
- Condiments & Sauces (ketchup etc)
- Nappies (sizes 6-7)
- Formula Baby milk

I am so grateful to those who help me by delivering the donations to me on a Wednesday, so I can go with a loaded car on a Thursday, and to those who have been donating since I started as a Street Hero back in May 2020.

Seer Green Eight O'Clock Club



Prior to the June meeting, villagers were asked to submit samples of their handwriting for Graphologist Elaine Quigley to analyse. For some of us, this was quite challenging, since emails and text now often replace the hand-written word!

The British Institute of Graphologists (Elaine is President) was founded in 1983, & since then its members have, amongst other tasks, assessed job applicants and detected fraud through handwriting analysis.

Elaine explained that each individual's handwriting displayed its own character based on a unique personality which could be grouped into one of nine character-types. Handwriting, said Elaine, is "brain writing!"

In July, John Tyler returned to reveal how plants and animals communicate by use of natural signals and encouraged us to tunein to those "conversations" in the countryside when out for walks. Colour, touch, and smell all play their part, along with hypnosis!

John's captivating photography showcased visual signals amongst animals, birds and insects. A safer form of communication in the wild is scent; perfectly demonstrated by the female Emperor Moths, which emit a pheromone scent to attract the male of the species.

Plants also send signals via scent that acts as a warning, and subtly drift on the breeze. As a result, other plants build-up their defense chemicals.

In August, villager Nigel Rothwell informed us of the extensive research into the history of the village - much of what we have previously been told is not true (see www.ourlivingvillage)!

Nigel then led us on an historical walk through an area of the village including Green Wood – evidence has come to light of an ancient settlement there.



Save Water to Save our Chilterns Chalk Streams!

Fact: The Chilterns has the highest per capita domestic water use in the UK.

Chilterns chalk streams - 'England's Rainforests' - are amongst the UK's most threatened habitats:

- For over fifty years, they have suffered from chronic low flows due to abstraction for public water supply and the impacts of climate change.
- Low water flows are one of the biggest threats to rivers and the creatures in them, and can be caused by natural droughts and by pumping too much water from aquifers.
- Since the 1970s, we have had more droughts and demand for water has increased.
- By September 2019, 67% of the chalk stream habitat in the Chilterns AONB was dry.
- Since 2017, Affinity Water and Thames Water have reduced abstraction at sites in the Ver, Gade, Chess, Misbourne, Wye and Hughenden valleys to promote sustainability, and monitor the result together with the Environment Agency.

Climate change is changing the patterns and predictability of rainfall

 both more intense rainfall and longer periods without rainfall – so there is more risk of severe flooding and droughts.

What can you do?

Collect rainwater in a water butt - rainwater is free! - Affinity Water offers subsidised butts at https://tinyurl.com/mr2tryfs. And use a watering can, not a hose – it uses less water.

Your Water Footprint

- Many household items have a water footprint - the amount of water it took to produce them.
- We each influence the distribution of water resource and water pollution – those who use water more sustainably contribute to society.
- It is not just the water we drink, use to wash, swim in etc, it is also the water needed to produce goods and services.
- Clothing production particularly fast fashion - is one of the most wasteful water intensive production processes. Consider buying second-hand clothes or those using recycled fibres.
- Beef needs loads of water to produce - consider going meat-free at least one day each week.

 The least sustainable milk alternative is almond milk, so try oat milk (a study has found that global production of dairy milk uses twice as much water as almond milk, and 22 times as much water as soya milk). Your choices could help save water and so help save our streams.

Courgette Fritters

Perfect for using up a glut from the veggie patch

This recipe is easy to multiply; even so I suggest using a box grater instead of a food processor otherwise the mixture will become too watery. Also, make and fry immediately, as the mixture will become too wet to fry if left. Keep the fritters warm in the oven whilst cooking each batch.

Ingredients

- 600g courgettes, topped and tailed
- · 1 garlic clove crushed
- · 3 eggs, beaten
- 30ml (2 Tbsp) freshly grated parmesan cheese
- · Salt & pepper
- · Pinch of freshly grated nutmeg
- · 60ml (4 Tbsp) plain flour
- 30ml (2 Tbsp) fresh mint, chopped
- · Olive oil for frying
- · Wedges of lemon to serve

Method

- · Coarsely grate the courgettes and place in a large bowl.
- Add all the remaining ingredients.
- Heat the oil (approx 1 cm deep) in a frying pan.
- Shallow fry heaped tablespoons of the mixture until golden on both sides and firm, only turn once a good crust has formed.
- · Serve immediately with lemon wedges.



Wigginton and The Ridgeway



A nice walk through woods and along ridges with lots of historic context

Length: 6 miles

Start point: Greyhound Inn, Wigginton

Difficulty: Easy

This is a fairly flat walk above the Chiltern escarpment and across fields, woods and a country park. Start from the Greyhound at Wigginton (park on the road or pub car park if visiting afterwards) and take the footpath opposite the pub between houses and then downhill across a field. At the path junction turn right up the hill and follow the path past some allotments to a small road.

Turn left for 100 metres then take the path on the right in front of a house and follow this back up to the Chesham Road. Do a small zig zag right along the road and then left onto another path across fields. You can miss out this first section by walking back from the pub along the road if you like but it's a bit busy.

Follow the path straight on across fields and through copses. The ditch in the copses is a Grims Ditch or Dyke – Iron Age constructions that are thought to have been used to demarcate land. Where muddy it may be best to walk either side of the copses along the field edge. Cross two small roads and keep following the line of the ditch until the third road where you turn right and walk along the road for 500 metres until you reach a wood just where the road descends sharply. Turn right onto The Ridgeway which is the higher of the two paths and follow that near the edge of the wood for just under a mile until you come out on a road. Carry straight on along the road (bear slightly right in Hastoe) for 34 mile to Hastoe Cross then turn briefly left at the road junction and then, as you enter the woods, right on to another path.

This path quickly opens out to become a pretty boulevard as it passes through Tring Park with lovely views to the left. The land is owned by the Woodland Trust and the house was built by the Rothschilds. Follow the paths (and the map!) through the woods for about a mile turning right as the path starts to descend more steeply, and then right again back into Wigginton where you can walk through the houses back to the pub.

The Whalebone Theatre – Joanna Quinn

This brilliant debut is the story of Christabel, a young girl from a gloriously dysfunctional family who yearns and fights to carve her own life in the world.

A sprawling family saga that runs between the wars and follows the fortunes of the members of the Seagrave family, heirs to a country pile in the Devon countryside. When the resourceful and fierce Christabel finds a whale washed up on shore, she is to use its skeleton to construct a theatre in which she directs the other children and adults in theatrical productions.

This is a wonderfully atmospheric story about all sorts of things - the magic of theatre, family, love, finding yourself, the British class system, also espionage work during WWII. Charming, funny, heart-breaking and devastating in equal measure, I thoroughly enjoyed and highly recommend it.

The Lincoln Highway – Amor Towles

18-year-old, Emmett, and his younger brother, Billy, live on a farm in 1954 Nebraska. Life has not been kind to them. Their mother left when Billy was small, their father dies leaving them in debt and Emmett has just been released from a youth detention facility serving a sentence for involuntary manslaughter. Their plan going forward? To hop in Emmett's Studebaker car and drive to California in search of their mother along the Lincoln Highway.

Their plans are thrown in the air when Duchess and Woolly, Emmett's compatriots from the youth facility turn up unexpectedly.



Part road novel, the narrative is suffused by myth and legend, and moral choice, held together by Billy, and his guidebook, Professor Abernathe's Compendium, a key element in the unfolding tale. This book will keep you awake well past your bedtime and you will want to tell every book lover to read it!

The Island of Missing Trees – Elif Shafak


In a small Cypriot village in 1974, two teenagers become lovers. This sets the central theme of this distinctive novel. Both teenagers, Kostas who is Greek and Defne who is Turkish can meet only in secret, until two partners, Yiorgus and Yusef - one a Greek Cypriot, one a Turkish Cypriot - offer them the sanctuary of their tavern, The Happy Pig. In the middle of this tavern a fig tree is growing and becomes one of the narrators of the story.

The story then alternates between Cyprus in 1974 and North London 2010.

In London, we find recently bereaved Kostas a botanist and his daughter Ada, establishing their new lives, and nurturing a precious cutting from the Happy Pig fig tree in their garden. Ada, as she struggles to adapt to her new school, is suffering from grief and loneliness which manifests itself in a shocking classroom incident.

The arrival from Cyprus of her mother's sister, Meryem, is unwelcome, but gradually Ada learns about her mother's life and the effect of the devastating civil war in Cyprus.

An apposite tale about refugees and displaced people all over the world wanting reminders of their home and identity. It seemed an unusual device at first, to give the tree a voice on the page, but by the time I reached the final chapters, it seemed the most natural thing in the world, reminding us that humans are only ever part of the story. This is a beautiful book which will teach you and stay with you.

On the Wild Side: European Roe Deer

You cannot live long in Seer Green or Jordans without encountering a little Muntjac deer, barking in the woods or scooting across a road at dusk. If it's bigger than a Muntjac, it's likely to be a Roe: Buckinghamshire lacks wild Red deer, the nearest wild Fallow are at Marlow, and Chinese Water deer are limited to the area around Aylesbury and Tring.

The European Roe deer, Capreolus capreolus, is one of Britain's two indigenous deer species. The Roe and the Red deer both crossed into Britain from the continent around 9,600 BCE, at the end of the last ice age, before melting glaciers submerged the land bridge. They remain common in Europe: Bambi was an Austrian roe, until transformed into an American White-tailed deer for film audiences.

Roe adults stand 63-67 cm at the shoulder, smaller than Fallow: they are ruddy brown in summer, duller in winter, tail-less, with a white rump that flashes as they bound away. Males, known as roebucks, have short, pronged antlers. The alarm bark, given by both sexes, is less repetitive than the Muntjac's: https:// tinyurl.com/2ur68ajw. Roe mate in late summer and the spotted kids, usually twins, are born in May or

I was excited to see a Roe in the woods by One Tree Field this spring; and in July a Seer Green allotment holder was surprised by one that had taken advantage of a gap in the fence. Their usual diet is grass, tree shoots, ivy, berries, brambles, and ferns -- but they apparently have a taste for sweet corn.

There are an estimated 500,000 wild Roe in the UK today. Due to the absence of predators, the British deer population is at a thousand-year high. with resulting damage to woodland understory species, and culling is sometimes necessary.


