

Journey to the Cross

If you have been into St Mary's since Ash Wednesday you will have noticed the large wooden cross standing at the front of Church. You may recognise it as the cross we used at the War Memorial on Remembrance Sunday. On Remembrance Sunday we think of the sacrifice made by many to ensure our freedom and this reflects the sacrifice made for us by Jesus that first Good Friday.

During Lent we have been adding symbols each week to remind us of the season of Lent and the journey which Jesus made to the cross.

We have rocks and bread sitting at the foot of the cross to remind us of Jesus being tempted by the Devil. On the second Sunday of Lent we wrapped the cross in hessian to remember Christians in previous generations who wore sackcloth and covered themselves in ash to show their penitence.

We then added nails to remind us of Jesus suffering on the cross. On Mothering Sunday we draped purple cloth on the cross to help us remember that this is the colour we use in church during Lent: a time of repentance and reflection.

During April we will be adding further symbols as the journey towards the crucifixion unfolds. On Palm Sunday we remember the triumphal entry to Jerusalem, when Jesus arrived on a donkey and the crowd cheered and waved palm branches. We also hear again the events leading to Jesus' crucifixion.

On Maundy Thursday we remember the Last Supper and foot washing. This service often feels out of place in Holy Week, a time we often think of as sombre and reflective, as we sing the Gloria at the start of the service but it ends with the dramatic act of stripping the altar and we leave in silence. On Good Friday we follow the tradition of eating hot cross buns at the end of our 10.30am all age service and have a more traditional, reflective service at 2.00pm.

We are in the fortunate position that we know there is a happy ending to the story and we celebrate Jesus' resurrection on Easter morning. We use white in church as a colour of celebration and we renew our Baptism Vows, see the transformation of the cross and end our communion service with an Easter egg hunt.



Easter – 16 April

Easter is probably named after 'Eostre' the Goddess of Spring who, it was thought, caused the sun, which had died in winter, to be born again and get stronger.

Christians celebrate Easter as the time of Jesus' resurrection after he had been crucified. It is the event which gives Christianity its purpose and meaning.

Three days before Easter is Maundy Thursday remembering the Last Supper when Jesus celebrated Passover. Still today the Jewish feast of Passover usually falls in the week before Easter and this year it is 11-17 April.

Easter always falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after the spring equinox, as per the Jewish calendar.

These days there are many traditions associated with Easter. The custom of giving eggs is very, very old and celebrates new life. The egg can be compared with Jesus' tomb: it is plain and looks dead, but it cracks and opens revealing new life inside especially in spring when chicks emerge. Easter Eggs – only comparatively recently made of chocolate – may be hidden by the Easter Bunny (whose origins are lost in history) resulting in Easter egg hunts.

Egg rolling (either painted hard-boiled eggs or more recently chocolate ones) down hills is a tradition in many places in the UK. The Easter Egg Roll on the White House South lawn in Washington was established in 1814 for children under 14 and is always attended by the President. Easter bonnets and the Battersea Park Easter Parade are now things of the past!

At St Mary's there are many services leading up to and on Easter Sunday, including an Easter egg hunt at the 10.30am Family Service.

South Hill Wood Fountain Clean Up

Friends of South Hill Wood and Kingswood Glen (FSHWKG) have applied for a Tesco/ Groundwork UK Bags of Help Scheme Grant: their application is one of three that have been successful in being put forward to a customer vote in local Tesco stores between 1 March and 29 April. The project with the highest number of votes across this region will receive up to £5,000, the 2nd placed project will receive up to £2,000 and the 3rd placed project £1,000.

With any money received, FSHWKG aim to hold a 'Fountain Clean Up' to clear the area around the fountain and survey the fountain for a future grant application. The South Hill Wood fountain is severely dilapidated and some of the displaced stones have been removed for safe keeping in Bromley Council stores. It is believed that the fountain dates from 1902.

It is intended to involve a range of local organisations and residents in the Clean Up event. Volunteers would be led and guided by the London Borough of Bromley Park Management Officers, a heritage landscape consultant, and surveyors to help clear debris from the fountain and remove fountain stones to temporary safekeeping.

FSHWKG should know the results of the voting in May, and when a date is confirmed for the Clean Up, it will be publicised on local and park information boards.

For this event to take place, your votes are needed: when making a purchase in a local Tesco store (of any value) you will receive a token in order to vote. If you are not sure what to do, ask a member of staff in store or let the Parish Office know your contact details and FSHWKG will contact you. There is also information on the FSHWKG Facebook page.

Mission of the month

Mothers' Union - Away From It All

Mothers' Union (MU) is a Christian charity of some four million members (single, married, male and female) in 83 countries. The charity supports families in the UK and around the world.

Away From It All (AFIA) is a MU holiday scheme, for people experiencing stress in their family life – helping them with all or part of the cost of a holiday and/or travel expenses. It is not necessary to be a member of a church or related organisation – most referrals are made by clergy, social workers or support groups.

AFIA helps some 2,500 people holiday each year – families spending time together away from their stressful situations at home, engaging in activities together and having fun. They often experience healing in their relationships by spending this quality time with each other.

AFIA organises family weeks where a number of families and a team of volunteers go away together with activities and outings arranged. AFIA also has mobile homes for families, usually near a beach, and arranges day trips for others.

Rochester Diocese MU funds AFIA self-catering accommodation – and donations from St Mary's will help to support this.

What is prayer visiting?

For the last nine years, during the summer months, a small team of people from St Mary's has been visiting homes in the parish. Introductory letters are delivered in advance to a number of roads asking people if they have anything they would like the church to pray for. This is then followed up a few days later with a brief visit where the team collects any prayer requests and bring them back to the church for inclusion in Sunday services and daily prayers. The team has visited nearly every home in the parish; they are only unable to gain access to gated communities.

There is no praying on doorsteps. The team goes out for an hour at a time, usually between 7 and 8pm. Most visits last just a few minutes – some a little longer. The team hopes that their visits will remind people that St Mary's is there for everyone. Many conversations that start out 'oh, I'm not a church goer' or 'I don't believe any of that' end up with people asking for prayer for loved ones or difficult situations in their lives. Confidentiality is respected, and for most prayer requests only first names are used.

As Christians we believe in the power of prayer. It is our experience that prayer releases God's love into the world and into our lives. Perhaps one of our teams has visited you in the past, or will be knocking on your door this summer. If you don't share our belief in prayer, or don't want to share personal matters with us, then we won't bother you any longer than it takes to say 'No thank you'. No one has knocked on your door, but you have a prayer request? Don't worry - we have a prayer 'tree' in the church porch where requests can be left.

The Diocese of Rochester has recently started consulting on its overall approach to its work to build God's kingdom in this part of the world.

The Right Reverend James Langstaff, Bishop of Rochester, suggests that society is undergoing cultural, economic and spiritual changes, and it's a time when many Christian people feel more isolated and less sure of how to express their faith. The church exists to give shape, meaning and voice to being a Christian, and the Diocese supports churches in West Kent, Bromley and Bexley to do this.

The Diocese is seeking to develop a shared vision for what it aims to achieve, and is consulting widely on this.

Here in St Mary's, we are thinking about our own mission – 'to bring the love of God into the everyday lives of the people of Shortlands'. How do we actually achieve this? What is our vision as to how we go about this? What is God calling us to do, here in Shortlands?

St Mary's Parochial Church Council has already done some initial thinking to inform our response to the Diocese, and there will be more opportunities to consider what we will do here in Shortlands in the coming months.
