

Virtually in the flesh! A thought for December

t's fascinating how we continually develop new vocabulary to navigate our way through a changing world. A year ago many of the words that we now use every day would have been unknown to us. Words like coronavirus or covid would have meant nothing, even the word pandemic would not have figured in our day to day conversation. But 9

months after the first covid-19 cases began to appear in the UK we have developed a whole vocabulary of what has been termed 'coronaspeak'! So phrases like 'social distance', 'self-isolate' and 'lockdown' (the latter previously mainly associated with the prison system or the TV quiz show 'Pointless'!) have become commonplace. For example, a 'covidiot' is a person behaving irresponsibly during the pandemic or 'coronabreak', a period of confinement having had a positive covid-19 test. There is even new covid rhymingslang like 'Miley Cyrus' for coronavirus (Miley Cyrus is an American singer-songwriter). People also seem to be creating their own new vocabulary. I was in Sainsburys recently when someone complained about another person 'nozzling'. I wasn't sure what they meant until she explained that she was referring to someone who wasn't wearing their face mask properly i.e. it wasn't covering their nose!

The language we use is both shaped by and shaped for the experiences that we have and the experiences that we share our culture (for good and ill). Over time the language becomes so embedded in our everyday lives that we stop noticing it. Christianity has left us such a legacy. Take



the word Christmas. It's a word with a strong presence in our language and culture. Of course its meaning has drifted from its origins in many ways. When we use the word 'Christmassy' all kinds of images spring to mind... from decorated pine trees to the smell of mulled wine. The word Christmas combines two words: the Greek word Christ (a translation of

the Hebrew word Messiah, meaning 'God's anointed one') and the Latin word mas(s) which refers to the Eucharist (from the dismissal prayer at the end of Communion).

Christmas is perhaps a bit obvious. But what about the word person? This too has Greek origins coming from the word persona which referred to the mask that actors wore on stage to portray a particular character. It became very important in the early church when looking for language to describe the indescribable: The one God who is Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Spirit. It's from this sense of the coequal persons of the Trinity that we derive our modern notion of all people being created equal. The American Constitution begins: We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal. Leaving aside the outdated language, it's not self-evident at all! The fact that in this pandemic we are seemingly caught in a dilemma between saving lives and preserving livelihoods, is because we understand that each human life is precious, each person uniquely reflecting the image of the triune God. In the Greco-Roman world of Jesus' time this was an alien thought.

John's gospel begins "In the beginning

was the Word, and the word was with God, and the Word was God". A few verses later we read "and the Word became flesh and lived among us". Christmas is the Feast of Incarnation of 'God becoming flesh', coming to us in the person of Jesus, love that's made visible. As I write we don't know what government rules will be guiding our activity but Christmas is bound to be different and more 'virtual' than usual.

It will need to be so in order that we can protect not only ourselves but perhaps more importantly other people, and those that have our care. Strange as it may seem this is how we will need to show our love this Christmas. There will be much that we will miss from our celebrations but we need to find different ways to demonstrate our love. It will be harder than usual but when I think about how people have responded to the Calne Foodbank and other community support in the town then I know that we can and we will do this. However we will be able to celebrate Christmas in 2020, the most important thing is to celebrate the birth of the Christchild, love come among us, love in person, and a love that we need to share.
