

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

Thought for June

s Teresa said in her 'thought for May' article in the last newsletter 'At the end of this Easter period, we wait for Pentecost and a renewed life and possible change again.' Pentecost is a time when we recall the empowering of the disciples by the Holy Spirit after they had waited in Jerusalem. Why did the Holy Spirit come upon the disciples? It tells us in Acts 1:8 "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." [NRSV]

The day of Pentecost brought changes for the disciples as they received the power of the Holy Spirit. They became witnesses to Jesus and all that he had done, and continues to do, in our world. How can we, in our everchanging world, bear witness to the constant love of God for all of His creation?

At Marden Vale Academy they made doves with messages of support to the people of Ukraine. They tied the doves on to the fence along the front of the



school. A visible witness to the school's Christian concern for the people of Ukraine. Choosing to write their prayers on dove shapes is particularly appropriate as the dove, as well as being a sign of peace, is also a sign of the Holy Spirit. The picture shows you some of them. Our local schools are places where we can be witnesses to God's love. We don't always need to use words - but actions. Many local schools would appreciate people going in to listen to children read; or to volunteer to be school governors. What a great witness that would be to the staff at the school if you go into the reception in the school and ask if there is any way you can help at the school. Tell them you are doing it because you see it as part of your calling as a Christian. In your daily prayers listen to the prompting of the Holy Spirit as you ask how you are to be a witness to God in your community. Even though I have no children of my own I have spent many years working with children in the church and more recently in schools. I would have missed out on a lot of fun and fulfilment if I had not followed the prompting to do this all those years ago. Trust Jesus to lead you to some exciting ways of witnessing, and the Holy Spirit to empower you in God's work. I am sure it won't be too difficult, remember Jesus tells us in Matthew 11:30:

"For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light". [NRSV]

Spring Harvest

enny and I recently went to an event called Spring Harvest at Butlin's in Minehead in the week after Easter.

This is a big Christian event that happens at Easter time every year, though the last two years it was on-line! It takes place over 5 days, with three full days in the middle. In the morning there is the 'Big Start' all-age worship, then Bible teaching on the week's theme with different teaching sessions to suit different tastes. In the afternoons there are various seminars on too many topics to list here! Then in the evening there is worship, adult and all-age. There are even 'after-hours' events (at 9pm) if you have the energy!

Throughout the day there are activities for children and young people in their own age-appropriate sessions. Plus of course the Butlin's activities, such as the swimming pool, fun-fair and the high ropes activity.

This year we studied the first few chapters of Nehemiah. When he returns to Jerusalem and organises the people there to rebuild the city walls and set up the gates again. Much to the annoyance of the surrounding tribes! There was an

artist in residence and during the week there was a call for people to bring their recycling rubbish for use in a sculpture.



The photo shows the result, a sculpture made from rubbish showing people rebuilding a wall.




Calne Mothers' Union Report

Cathedral cycle route challenge


eoff Elkins has been undertaking this challenge which was Launched during bike week 2021, 2000 miles across England between 42 cathedrals.

It is a unique partnership between cycling UK, the British pilgrimage trust, Sustrans and the association of English cathedrals to promote greener travel and mental and physical well-being.

Although Geoff says that he is not particularly religious he enjoys visiting churches and cathedrals and is interested in the history and the magnificent architecture. Geoff says "I must admit to experiencing some spiritual comfort in my visits as well as meeting some wonderful people. My goal is to complete the challenge of cycling to all of the 42 cathedrals in England, so far I've cycled to 21 and collected a stamp in my pilgrim's passport."

A favourite cathedral, now that's a hard one to answer as they are all amazing; maybe Exeter and Lichfield (see below) if I had to pick and Durham is the one I'm looking forward to.






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A holy island...

In the late sixth century, just as St Augustine was arriving in Canterbury to convert England to Christianity, St Columba was dying on the island of Iona. He was one of the great Celtic Christian saints, who arrived in the Inner Hebrides off the west coast of Scotland to begin his Christian mission. His grave became a place of such importance that the monastic complex around it was soon one of the most significant in Western Europe, despite its remote island setting.

Around AD750 there was an explosion of scholarship, literacy and development of doctrine in European Christianity and the trigger on Iona was the raising of Columba's bones from his grave into a shrine. This was a brave move, when a saint's bones were thought to emanate the force of the Holy Spirit.

The shrine became a pilgrimage destination and Iona's Gaelic golden age lasted more than 100 years, producing wonderful manuscripts and artefacts and carved stone high crosses. A charismatic abbot, Adomnan, wrote a "spiritual guidebook" detailing the layout of the sites of the Holy Land. Academics now believe this is repli-



cated on Iona. A "Via Dolorosa", cobbled like a Roman road, led to three high crosses representing Calvary.

The abbey echoed the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, which housed the tomb of Christ, in this case Columba's shrine in its chapel. The monks wanted to contemplate the Passion of Christ in their worship - 'a ritual surrogate landscape'.

Iona went into decline from the 1600s until restoration began in the early 20th century. This work was continued by volunteers from the ecumenical Iona Community founded near Glasgow during the Depression. Today you can stay on the island or visit to see the abbey, monastery, a ruined nunnery the 12th century chapel of St Oran, the museum and the island layout reflecting the Jerusalem of 2,000 years ago.


