

LAY PASTORAL ASSISTANTS or LPAs -What are we? What do we do?

n the Diocese of Salisbury, at the discernment of parish clergy and with approval from the local PCC, those who feel a calling to engage in pastoral ministry are trained and then authorised to fulfil that ministry, working as part of a team of clergy and laity.

LPAs may carry out a wide variety of work, including taking Communion to those unable to come to church. In all cases the ministry calls for a loving and compassionate heart, a willingness to listen and support those in need.

We are lucky enough to have 7 LPAs in the Marden Vale Benefice, 6 of whom are based at St. Mary's, Calne. Our LPAs work under the direction of Revd Bob Kenway and in conjunction with our Clergy and Licensed Lay Ministry team. Some of the areas in which LPAs in this Benefice are involved are:

Baptism preparation

 Supporting the bereaved Taking Home Communion to the sick or housebound

- Participating in worship
- Hospital and Care Home visiting

 Open the Book - playing out stories for children in local schools

Work with children and families

 Regular prayers for our local community and an Emergency Prayer Chain for urgent needs

CAMEO - Come And Meet Each Other for normally housebound parishioners offering tea and cake, conversation and entertainment.

Our local LPAs are: Joanna Childs. Sadie Kenway, Kathryn Miller, Liz Roberts, Chris Robins, Jane Wells, Judy West,- Anita Uttley (Derry Hill).

Look out for our mug shots due to appear in Church shortly! We are not a substitute in any way for the Licensed clergy, but we can provide a listening ear and act as a signpost for you if you need help. Hopefully we will lighten your load and ease the strain on the cleray.

All our LPAs are subject to DBS clearance and have to undertake regular Safeguarding training at Level 2.

Several LPAs have retired over the last couple of years, so if you think vou would like to undertake this role, please speak to a member of the clergy team or any of the above. Of course, there are many who are involved in aspects of church life and minister to others without becoming an LPA and we give thanks for them. Celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II

Everyone will be looking forward to a long weekend from 2nd to 5th June in celebration of our Queen's platinum jubilee. One of the events taking



place in Calne is a full peal on the bells of St Mary's Church on the morning of 4th June. A peal is a sequence of bellringing, during which the permutations in the order of the bells changes over 5000 times. On 5 bells the number of permutations or 'changes' is 120, on 6 bells it is 720 and on 8 bells it is 40,320. The



bell ringers will be working to a system that ensures that any particular combination does not occur more than once. The peal will - if successful - last about 3 hours and 15 min-

utes starting about 9.30am. The peal will also be dedicated to Rev Bob Kenway as he prepares to leave Calne after 25 years as our parish priest.

It will be the last time that a peal is



attempted on the bells of St Mary's Church before the bells are taken away for restoration and then rehung early in 2023. A peal is an equivalent achievement for bell ringers to running a marathon for athletes.

When the bells are restored there will be two new bells and one of these will bear the inscription

"I celebrate the platinum jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II" .

Confirmation of Election and consecration of the new Bishop of Salisbury

The Confirmation of the Election of Dean Stephen as the Bishop of Salisbury took place at St Mary-le-Bow, London, on Friday 1 April. the next stage of his arrival into the diocese was his Consecration. Dean Stephen was consecrated Bishop at Southwark Cathedral on 25 April at 11am.

Bishop Karen says "Please join me in praying for Stephen as he prepares to be ordained Bishop, for Carol and his family, as they prepare to leave Gloucester just before Easter and move to Salisbury. There will be an opportunity for all of us in the diocese to welcome Stephen early in the summer as he is enthroned at the Cathedral. More details about this will be given in due course."
