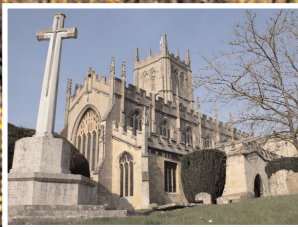

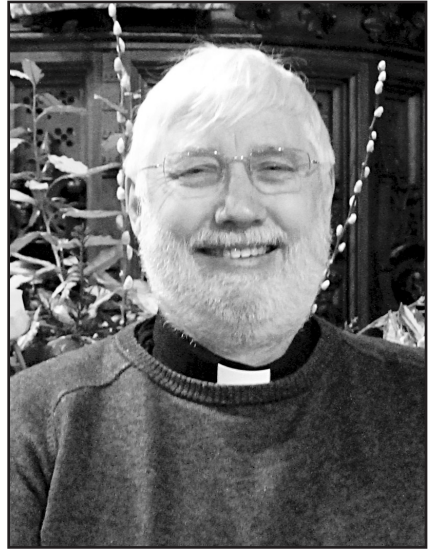

Thought for September

Families are important...

This was a phrase used by my father whenever I visited him during his later years. (He died in 2010 age 93). It is a phrase that has become very meaningful since the start of the Pandemic with so many families not being able to meet up for many months. Consequently you would also hear the phrase 'I miss my family'. People living on their own were grateful that they could Bubble with members of the family. Family celebrations took on a different form during lockdown or took place online.

We also hear the phrase 'Families come in all shapes and sizes'. There are now many divided families and step-families. There is no ideal family, we can look to the Bible and see a great mixture of families. For example, Joseph with his many brothers by two mothers, was sold into slavery, by his jealous brothers because of his boasting. Yet he is a prime example of trusting God in difficult situations and forgiving those who wronged him. Or the example of Ruth who on becoming a widow, devoted herself to her mother-in-law becoming a refugee in a foreign country. There are many more exam-



ples of families in the Bible but one person I like in the New Testament is Timothy. Paul writes two letters of encouragement to him, whom he calls 'his true son in the faith'. (1Tim1 v2). In the second letter he says, 'I am reminded of your sincere faith which first lived in your grandmother Lois and in your mother Eunice

and, I am persuaded now lives in you also'. (2 Tim 1 v5)

But the idea of family is not just blood relatives. I remember a conversation with an elderly lady in a church I used to attend who told me she had no family as her husband and children had died. I reminded her that she still had her church family who loved and valued her.

It is 100 years since the death of Mary Sumner, the founder of the Mothers' Union. In the Mothers' Union prayer are the words, 'Bless the work of the Mothers' Union as we seek to share your love through the encouragement, strengthening and support of marriage and family life.'

May we all as God's children and part of the church family in Calne show love and support to one another.

Meeting your PCC!

Every year we elect 4 churchwardens and 14 members of our congregation. Together with our Clergy team this makes up our Parochial Church Council.

What do we actually do? Well, as PCC members we are trustees of the parish and so we work with the clergy team to understand our finances, building maintenance requirements and get a general overview of all activities happening in the parish. Alongside our Designated Safeguarding Lead, we are also responsible for any safeguarding concerns raised.

To do all this we hold 12 meetings a year and an Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) which happens in April. The meetings are split into 2 groups, our main meetings where all members are in attendance and Standing Committee meetings which include all clergy, churchwardens, our treasurer, and secretary as well as 2 of our deputy churchwardens and these are used to prepare for our main meetings.

In the past year our biggest challenge has of course been keeping you all safe during the COVID-19 pandemic. The decisions have been tough, but we have done this through the exploration of all avenues. We hope you have felt safe with all the decisions that have been made.

In October this year, the PCC are holding a day dedicated to working on how we move our parishes forward in the best way and how we can adapt and work towards our mission in the community. This day should also give the PCC a chance to get to know each other.

For this meeting, we would like to hear from YOU our wonderful church family! We would like to know if there is something you feel needs bringing to our attention or something you might like to see changed or even how we could move forward post-COVID. Generous Giving - Transforming our giving in response to God's generosity

Like many charitable organisations nationally, the Church of England has lost income during the time of pandemic. Last year we were unable to pay our annual parish share of what we have been asked to contribute to Salisbury Diocese (c£74k) and there will be a considerable shortfall this year. The parish share pays for the cost of clergy (training, stipends, housing and pensions as well as some of the administrative costs of the diocese). This is a situation that as a parish we need to address if the mission and ministry of the church is to be sustainable alongside the maintenance of the historic buildings which are so valued within our communities and for which we are custodians.

Bishop Karen Gorham (Bishop of Sherborne and acting Bishop of Salisbury following bishop Nicholas's retirement in July) is asking that the people of each parish of the diocese



respond to the "Generous Giving" campaign which has been launched and runs from September 12th-October 3rd. There is a prayer and pledge leaflet which will be available from the end of August. Please do pick one up from church or ask for one if you're not yet attending church again. The past 18 months has been a really challenging time for everyone and as we emerge from the restrictions imposed as consequence of the pandemic please help your Anglican Parish to 'build back' and renew its life in a sustainable way as God would have us do. 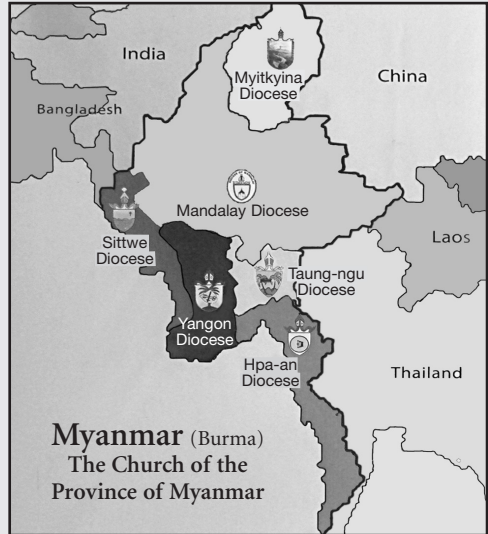
Myanmar...
