From Martin's Study

My dear friends

I am writing this little piece on the Saturday before the Prime Minster is due to make a statement. Speculation is rife about possible relaxation of some restrictions, with only further questions about what it might mean for churches. No singing? Keeping 2m apart? Cleaning every surface after every service? Who knows?

At our elders' meeting last week, we agreed not to speculate, but to respond to the government and denominational advice as and when it arrives. Be assuired that we will make any decisions based on this advice and in the best intersts of all our buildings' users.

In the meantime, we continue to be church in some wonderful ways! At the study grop we discovered that church, in Greek, translates as "Ekklesia" - a 'calling out'. Have we thought of church in these terms before, as a 'calling out'?

Are we calling out to the world?

Are we 'called out', as separate but part of the world - perhaps with a distinct task?

Thoughts to mull over.

At present we may be feeling very separate from each other and from the world, but we are also making huge efforts to

contact each other, comfort each other, to say something important to the world about God's love in Jesus, through how we react to the pandemic. So therefore we are still church!

Since our Vision Day back in July, huge strides have been taken in putting that vision into action, not least with the church meeting vote to support the package of work to enable it.

Over the coming weeks and months, we will be exploring God's Vision for us in a more focussed way - so that we can all feel a part of it and take ownership of it.

This will be enabled even further by the URC's 'The New Normal' series, helping us to see how we are church as we return to our buildings.

Back in August last year I wrote from my study

"The elders and I are completely committed to enacting the vision that the Spirit is bringing to life among us. The vision Day was the first step in this process, and it has already created an atmosphere of hope and potential."

Throught my conversations with many of you, I know this to be true today. I also know that God is guiding us to a new place because of this pandemic. We have hard questions to ask, discussions to be had and changes to make - as local churches, as synods, as the URC and as churches in the UK. The pandemic has shown some major challenges and has enabled us to be creative and fleet of foot.

For St Paul's, we will be exploring our New Normal, through the lens of our Vision. We will make any changes to us as people, to our buildings, our mission, our worship, our commitment to our young people - through this lens: what does it mean to be a welcoming place for all?

A place where God's love is seen at work?

Despite the grief and trauma around us at present, we can hope in God's love and we can look to the future with positivity. God has shown us that we can change, even very quickly, when we accept the need to adapt.

The pandemic has forced us to work in different ways.

Our Christian faith should do the same.

The threat of climate-change should force us to act for the good of all creation.

The injustices in our society can be resolved if we have the will.

I pray that God will continue to interrupt our lives with love and grace.

I pray that you will know God's presence with you through these challenging

times - perhaps through the people of St Paul's URC.

I pray that the Spirit will revive us as a people and as a place of welcome.

Even so, in the strangely named 10 Minutes and 38 Seconds in this Strange World by Elif Shafak I encountered a passage which I would love to share with you. Zaynab122 has been talking to a friend, who confided that when her mother, who was from a Christian family, died, there was a row between her Christian aunt and her Muslim father about the style of her burial. Here are Zaynab122's reflections on this:

Zaynab122 nodded as a cloak of sadness engulfed her. Religion for her had always been a source of hope, resilience and love - a lift that carried her up from the basement of darkness into a spiritual light. It pained her that the same lift could carry others all the way down. The teachings that warmed her heart and brought her close to all humanity, regardless of creed, colour or nationality, could be interpreted in such a way that they divided, confused and separated human beings, sowing seeds of enmity and bloodshed. If she were summoned by God one day, and had a chance to sit in His presence, she would love to ask Him just one simple question: "Why did you allow Yourself to be so widely misunderstood, my beautiful and merciful God?"

Hi Big Chris,


Here is a picture of the spitfire I made. We also made VE Day cakes but have eaten most of them or given away to friends! Little Chris

NHS Volunteer service

rom 24 March ¾million people nationally volunteered to help the NHS locally with essential support for neighbours. The Royal Voluntary Service, running the scheme on an existing medical alert application was overwhelmed, checking and verifying everyone but it's now up and running with self-referral possible as well as from health professionals. As a volunteer you put your phone 'on duty' when convenient and get perhaps 1-2 calls a day (with a rather alarming siren noise!) to either accept or pass to the next person.

Although lots of people are registered in South Croydon, in one hour I had seven alerts during the setup period, but almost all were in Thornton Heath. Mostly it has been older people needing shopping or prescriptions (and a chat), plus a few false alarms, and it seems that in the six weeks of setup most people arranged help from local authorities and churches. Some people were a little confused when I called as they had no idea their GP or carer had flagged them with a need! It will be interesting to see how the scheme is taken forward in future, but it has been a great opportunity for outreach as most people know St Paul's and it's always lovely to chat with neighbours.



If you, or someone you know, needs a hand with collecting shopping or prescriptions, or just wants someone to talk to, our NHS Volunteer Responders are here to help.



Purley Food HUB

Each Wednesday for the duration of the coronavirus emergency, we are covering the postcode areas of CR2 (South Croydon), CR5 (Coulsdon), CR8 (Purley) and CR0 4 (Waddon) and delivering packages of food, toiletries, etc, to clients referred by our Ticket Partners and local churches, schools and GP surgeries. Other food banks are serving other parts of the Borough of Croydon, mostly through home delivery services like ours.

We continue to thank God for:

- The volunteers sorting food donations and shopping for extra supplies, refilling the shelves, packing the food bags, making the deliveries to clients' homes, carrying out the important logistics work and other practical tasks.
- The friends and supporters from the churches, local community, WI and Rotary, businesses and many others kindly donating food and money.
- The Trustees and Management Committee involved in planning and running the new service and the day-to-day decision-making.
- And EVERYONE keeping the Food Hub and our clients' difficult circumstances in their collective thoughts and prayers.
