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Resurrection The Jesus of faith..... Fr Malcolm

It is problematic attempting to make a historical reconstruction of Jesus. The only Jesus we can know and love is the Jesus of the Church and the Gospels.

Historical reconstructions are entirely dependent on the person who is attempting to research the original events that occurred in first century Palestine. It's a hit or miss procedure, more miss than hit.

Although the creeds make a number of assertions about Jesus, Christian faith isn't just about facts, no matter how feasible or seemingly accurate. Christian faith as a living experience is love for the Jesus who God raised from the dead by the power of his Holy Spirit. We don't live facts.

Jesus isn't just a figure from the past like Julius Caesar, but a living God who we encounter in the worship and sacraments of the Church. This is especially true of the Eucharist or Mass.

We cannot explain or intellectualize about the Risen Christ because it is an event beyond our earthly understanding. In other words, only God's Holy Spirit can enlighten us regarding the Resurrection of our Lord.

The most meaningful resurrection appearance of Jesus for many, and me, included is that of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus.

(Luke 24:13-22.) The two disciples don't recognize Jesus until he breaks the bread and only then are their eyes opened. Our Lord is given back to those two disciples. Emmaus ends with lovers meeting. This happens at every Mass.

This wondrous event stands out above all the rest in the accounts given by the four evangelists. The resurrection is a giving back of Jesus to his loved ones by God...to you and me living in 2020.

The Crucified Risen Lord is given back to Peter, who denied him, to the disciples, who all forsook him and fled, and to the women who loyally followed him his ministry to Calvary and the tomb. This brings us to the Holy Spirit and Pentecost. What the Holy Spirit gives us is the whole life and death of the Risen Lord.

The only Jesus we can know and love is the Jesus of the New Testament and who comes to us in the Eucharist.

Christian faith as a living experience is a response to the Real Jesus who God raised from the dead. He isn't just a figure from the past, but a living reality who we meet daily in the Hebrew Scriptures, the Gospels, Epistles, and above all in the Eucharist.

Alleluia, Christ is Risen. Alleluia, He is Risen indeed. Alleluia.


PHILLACK CHURCH MICE 88 A PELICAN & JESUS

All notes of Doves


Fill all our world: this is the time of loves.

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BISHOP PHILIP MESSAGE

Bishop Philip has signed an instrument, whose general effect is to extend the time for parishes to hold their APCMs to the end of October, with current office holders (churchwardens, deanery synod representatives and PCC members) remaining in office longer than they would otherwise do so. In particular, deanery synod representatives elected in 2017 will remain in office until 30 November 2020 (instead of 30 June 2020).

Gwinear & District Footpaths & Bridleways Association

Saturday 14th March 2020 - Bosparva, Gwinear Downs, Calloose, Bezurrel

There was light rain in the morning yet the afternoon was dry for our walk starting from the former Reawla Stores. We took the footpath up passed the children's playground and were soon climbing over a stile into a field, left fallow. The path goes diagonally across the field, over another stile and across another field. Over to the

right is Lemin Farm and its wind turbine. Eastwards the view is over to Praze and Crowan and beyond.

Another two adjacent stiles across a track then across another field down into a valley where it is extremely wet and we cross a fast-flowing stream then up to Lower Bosparva Farm. We stay on the farm track to join Bosparva Lane and head south west passed Drewollas Farm towards Leedstown. This brings us to the Praze-Leedstown road by Genesis Farm and we stop for our group photograph.



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Turning west we follow the bridleway skirting the north of Leedstown across Trenerth Road and on to Lambo, adjacent the Hayle/ Helston Road. We take another bridleway north west going steeply down into the valley at Calloose and its much-expanded holiday park. Round by the swimming pool and behind the clubhouse we climb up some steps and into a field where the footpath heads north east to Trenerth.

The "home stretch" of our walk takes us north west, a hundred yards along the Deveral Road then back into fields and over several stiles towards Bezurrel. From here the farm track takes us to Relistian Lane and then a short stroll back into Reawla.

A quiet afternoon with very few folks around! Our pleasure walk was 4.4 miles and comfortably done in two hours.
