As we celebrate Fathers’ Day, let’s remind ourselves once again, the focus is not on ourselves as Fathers, but on our Fathers. Everyone joins in the celebration as EVERYONE has a Father!

We ask your blessing on those men who served as father figures in our lives when our biological fathers were not able to do so.

May the love and selflessness they showed us be returned to them in all their relationships, and help them to know that their influence has changed us for the better.

Give new and future fathers the guidance they need to raise happy and holy children, grounded in a love for God and other people - and remind these fathers that treating their wives with dignity, compassion and respect is one of the greatest gifts they can give their children.

We pray for fathers who have passed on from this life, that in your love and mercy, You will forgive the all wrong and welcome them into Your loving embrace, and that our family will one day be reunited in your heavenly kingdom.

In the Name of Jesus our Christ and your Son, who taught us, the perfect father-son relationship is attainable through the power of the Holy Spirit. **AMEN.**

**HYMN**      **Father hear the prayer we offer****PRAYER**

O God, Father of us all; you know what is right and good for us, but too often, we only want our way or no way, instead of your way. Have mercy on us when we turn away from you, towards bright lights and instant rewards. Forgive us when we do not value your Fatherly love and concern for our well-being.

Lord, let Fathers know, their struggle is not in vain. We do not know the circumstances by which, they became hateful, intolerant, prejudiced, angry and insensitive, forgive them their attitudes, feelings and actions, some of which influenced us to change our ways, and some impacted us adversely. Deliver us from the evil which corrupts fatherhood, and teach us loving Father, the better way to be a father who reflects your life.

We beg you this prayer in the Name of Jesus Your Son. **AMEN**

**LISTEN to the words of THIS song.****MESSAGE**

Fathers' Day, like Mother's Day, is difficult for many, especially those who feel, or made to feel, it's all about them, and they don't measure up.

The Bible clearly instruct us, *Honour (respect, obey, care for, with due obedience and courtesy) your Father and Mother. Then you will live a long life (an abundance of God's blessings) in the land the Lord your God is giving you.*<sup>1</sup>

Clearly, the focus of this day, is **FATHER**. Everyone has a father. Some may feel, ***father doesn't deserve respect, care, obedience and courtesy because of what they did to ...*** Not all fathers are God-fearing, nor do all fathers treat their children kindly, but being the child of bad or uncaring parent does not negate this commandment. We are **NOT** instructed to honour

good parents and dishonour bad ones, to obey virtuous parents and disobey those we think do not live up to their God-given responsibility!

But God has not given us the responsibility to judge our father; any wrong he might have done is to be settled between him and his Father God. We don't know the circumstances which drove his behaviour. We are to **honour** our father. Jesus repeated it and Paul reiterated it to the Church in Ephesus and Colossae, *Children, be obedient your parents.. in the Lord (the way God intended and Christ demonstrated), for this is right and well-pleasing to the Lord.*<sup>2</sup>

The strength of this instruction is two-fold: first, we will always be our parents children. They introduced us to the world, and they taught us, to the best of their ability and knowledge, how to live in this world, for which we should be grateful.

Second, our children come under the same instruction, to honour us, their parents, and enjoy the positive outcome: God bless them with long life, lived in good health, in peaceful relationships with family and friends, in the home in which God has settled them! We set the role model: our children will learn to treat us, based on how we treat our parents.

It is interesting that in one single instruction, we are made responsible for the spiritual welfare of three generations: our own, our parents and that of our children (and generations after them).

Fathers are very special to God; some are fathers **of...** and some are fathers **to...** The Genesis accounts tells us that God's creation was complete when a **human being** in His own image, having the attributes and qualities of male and female<sup>3</sup>, received the breath of life. This human being was unable to relate with anything in the animal kingdom and lacked companionship. God separated the human into two beings, both in

His own image, investing in each, a distinct part of His characteristic attributes, that of male in one and female in the other, and man and woman were born.<sup>4</sup> On discovering the woman, the man is absolutely ecstatic and waxed lyrical in poetry and song:

The man's first recoded words, when God presented him with his wife, starts with gratitude to God (*At last!*) and he could not stop adoring her - *bone from my bone (sharing my DNA) and flesh from my flesh (sharing my spirit)! If I am 'man', then she will be 'woman'. She and I are one, because we both are made by God; we belong together, physically, emotionally and socially, and compatible as friends and lovers.*

The male of the human species becomes a friend, lover and husband of his wife, before becoming a father; **a father, therefore, finds his identity in being male.** The man is made complete in his relationship as a husband to his wife and a father to his children. By God's perfect design, the family is the central unit of society. This is the story of male and female, man and woman, father and mother.

Move forward many thousands of years. A young woman gives birth to a son, not conceived by the passion between a man and a woman, but through the work of the Holy Spirit. At God's appointed time, this Man is *baptised, He came out of the water and the Heavens were opened, and John saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on Him. A voice from heaven said, "This is My Son, My Beloved, in Whom I delight!"*<sup>5</sup>

Those present heard this, and later understood the narrative to portray God's vision of fatherhood.

First, when Jesus was baptised, before He started His work, at this momentous event, His Father was **present**.

Second, His Father made His presence **felt** by the presence of the Holy Spirit as a dove.

Third, His Father made His presence known by **speaking** - *This is My Son!*

Fourth, His Father publicly **declared** His love for His Son - *My beloved Son.*

Finally, His Father expressed His **pleasure** - *in Whom I am very well pleased!*

This is the picture of fatherhood as God designed it. Fathers are not perfect men (neither are their children!). Mike Wilkerson<sup>6</sup> notes, *Tragically, for many of us, the father-child relationship is fraught with fear, shame, dread, disappointment, or absence. For some of us, the word “father” has been darkened by the worst evils. Can you ever hope to know God as your Father, is your view of “father” is so broken?*<sup>7</sup>

On this day, for some, our father may not be alive, but we can still pray God’s mercy for the time they fell seriously short of God’s standard of fatherhood, and it is not too late to restore Godly fatherhood to your generations to come. We pray, *Our Father .... forgive us when we have sinned against you, as we forgive others who have sinned against us.*

Forgiving and receiving forgiveness are crucial steps in the journey of life. Today is another opportunity to restore our relationship with our Fathers, our children and others in their generation and ours. God instructed us, Jesus modelled it, it is time for us to follow. Welcome to Living the Character of God. **AMEN.**

**Three things we pray you grant us:**

**Nourish our bodies with food, enough for each day** - *may we be a healthy witness of Your unending loving care for each of us.*

**Forgive us all we have done wrong, only after we have forgiven those who have wronged us.** *How else will they know of Your greatest gift which allows us to be restored in Your image?*

**And, please do not lead us into hard testing in difficult times; protect and save us from the one who plots and plans only evil** - *his time on the earth is limited and he can do no harm to those who believe and trust in their heart, soul and mind that*

**ALL power and ALL glory, belong to You, the One, ONLY matchless King, forever into eternity. AMEN.**
