**Michaelmas** is celebrated on 29 September, traditionally the last day of the year's harvest season, and in medieval times the day used by farmers to mark the changing of the seasons.

It's also the time of year that darker nights and colder days begin - winter is coming - and people believed negative forces were stronger in the darkness and that they would need stronger defences to protect them during the later months of the year, so Michaelmas celebrations are associated with encouraging protection during the dark of the months ahead.

Michaelmas is also one of the four 'quarter days' of the year, the others being Lady Day on 25 March, Midsummer on 24 June, and Christmas on 25 December.

Being close to the solstices or equinoxes these days are three months apart and were the four days of the year when servants would be hired, rents becoming due or new leases started.

It is also the festival of Michael and All Angels. Michael is one of the principal angelic warriors, the protector against the dark of the night, and the Archangel who fought against Satan and his evil angels, hurling Lucifer (the devil / Satan) down from Heaven for his treachery.

Rev 12:7-9 7 Then war broke out in heaven. Michael and his angels fought against the dragon, and the dragon and his angels fought back. 8 But he was not strong enough, and they lost their place in heaven. 9 The great dragon was hurled down - that ancient serpent called the devil, or Satan, who leads the whole world astray. He was hurled to the earth, and his angels with him. (NRSV)

The Bible mentions many angels, but only four are called by name: Gabriel, Uriel, Raphael and Michael.

Archangel Michael leads and supervises the other archangels. He is a warrior and the powerful agent of God who wards off evil from God's people and delivers peace to them at the end of their life on earth.

According to English folklore we shouldn't eat blackberries after Michaelmas Day because the devil landed in a prickly bramble bush after being thrown out of Heaven, and in his annoyance scorched the fruit with his fiery breath as well as stamping and spitting on the fruit and cursing it.



The story continues by telling us that this curse is renewed each year and it's considered to be very unlucky to pick blackberries after Michaelmas.

## SCHOOL UNIFORMS

"Uniform For All" is a community uniform recycling project set-up with the aim of helping parents who are struggling to afford school uniform; however it is also a way to help recycle and try and protect the environment from wearable clothing being taken to landfill.

So far, over 500 families have been helped, with more than 7,200 items of uniform being made available for:

Falinge Park, Oulder Hill, Redwood and St Cuthbert's High Schools, and Spotland, Meanwood, St Vincent's RC, Caldershaw and Norden Primary Schools in Rochdale as well as schools in Heywood and Middleton.

Items required: jumpers, cardigans, shirts, skirts, ties, trousers, blazers, shoes, PE bags, summer dresses, coats, and lunch bags.

## Autumn Equinox 2023

## SATURDAY 23 SEPTEMBER AT 6:50AM GMT (7:50AM BST)

Once again our journey around the Sun has seen us travel on from the Summer Solstice in June and we will soon be arriving at the Autumn Equinox.

Meteorological Autumn begins on 1 September, but the Autumn Equinox is the first day of Astronomical Autumn and this transitional point is a key stage between the seasons of Autumn and Winter.

As our Earth travels around the Sun its elliptical orbit brings us to the point in the year where both northern and southern hemispheres are illuminated equally by the sun, giving us equal hours of daytime and night-time, hence 'equinox'.

We'll also be losing 2 minutes of daylight each day as we travel on towards the Winter Solstice on Friday 22 December 2023, at 03:27am GMT, and the shortest day of the year.

The full moon nearest to the autumnal equinox is the Harvest Moon, which will be on 29 September this year. It was said that the light from this moon provided farmers and farm workers with extra light to enable them to work late into the night around this time and harvest the crops, and no doubt they still take advantage of this.

The Autumnal Equinox also provides us with an increased chance of being able see the spectacular Aurora Borealis displays, or Northern Lights, that can occur In the higher latitudes of the northern hemisphere due to increased geomagnetic activities around this time.



Keats called autumn the 'Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness', and it's this season that we remember for the harvest and harvest festivals along with the temperature cooling and the nights beginning to "draw in".



The deciduous trees prepare for winter as the chemical chlorophyll in their leaves, which has made them green, declines to allow the other chemicals to become more prominent and so display a kaleidoscope of reds, yellows and ambers before the leaves fall. (Did you know that some of the chemicals responsible for this change in colour are the same ones that give carrots (beta -carotenes) and egg yolks (luteins) their colours?)

The word "fall" was actually a common term in England until around the 17th century, deriving from the shortening of the phrase "fall of the leaf" and may explain why Americans use this word to describe the Autumn season as their English ancestors took it with them when emigrating to those shores.

The word "Autumn" came into use here around the 18th century, deriving from the French term Automne, and one reason for its use may have been when the upper-classes of English society wanted to adopt a more refined vocabulary to separate them from the lower and working class population.

According to Greek mythology, autumn began after Hades abducted Persephone to be the Queen of the Underworld. Her mother was Demeter, goddess of the harvest, and in her distress caused all the crops on Earth to die until her daughter was allowed to return, marking spring.

In conclusion, it's September and Autumn is here... enjoy the season!
