From the Vicarage

"You don't get nowt, for nowt!" So says one of my Yorkshire friends and on the whole, it's true. In fact, most of us have become so used to having to pay for anything worth having that a free gift usually comes with a degree of suspicion.



When the weather permits, a small but committed band of volunteers from St. James' Church set up a table in the Glenbervie Enclosure car park in Church Lane and offer free tea, coffee and cake to those using the forest. Many people, whilst grateful for a free cuppa, want to know whether there's a catch. There's not. It is simply that Jesus calls those who seek to model their lives on his, to "love their neighbour as themselves" (Matthew 22: 39), which includes free coffee and cake!

It's a pleasure to be able to offer the whole community a free copy of the Rowledge Review this month and we hope you enjoy what you find in the following pages. The magazine is produced by the church as a way of serving Rowledge and its outlying hamlets of Boundstone, Holt Pound and Bucks Horn Oak.

"You were saved by faith in God, who treats us much better than we deserve. This is God's gift to you, and not anything you have done on your own. It isn't something you have earned, so there is nothing you can brag about" (Ephesians 2: v 8-9).

The first marriage, baptism and burial at St. James' by Neil Pittaway.

In one of my many researches, I happened to look up a 'Warner' marriage at St. James' to discover it was the very first marriage to be undertaken at the church. A widower, Henry Harrison from Hale married Harriett Elizabeth Warner, from Weybourne, who at the time was housekeeper in Rowledge to her widower brother, Richard Warner and his children. Here we see Marriages, Page 1, entry 1.



Marriages were few and far between at St. James' in 1871 and this first one came four months after the church's consecration.

This made me wonder what and when the first baptism or burial would have been. This is sadder for both were for William Benjamin Bryant, baptised by the Rev. Arthur Parker on January 29th 1871 and buried by him on March 25th. Once again, for both records we see page 1, entry 1.

Had he lived, William would have been uncle to Louis Bryant who died in WW1 and whose name is on our Memorial and great uncle to Sydney Bryant who died in WW2 whose name maybe should be on our Memorial.

By May 1871, the date of that first marriage, the Rev. Arthur Parker had buried four of the infants that he had baptised, William Bryant aged 3 months, Selina Knight aged 2 months, Susan king aged less than 1 month and Elizabeth Quennel, aged 5 months.

On page three of the baptisms at St. James', entry number 18 would surely have been a wonderful day for Arthur Parker when he baptised his own daughter. She was Annie Sylvia Parker, ten weeks old who thankfully lived until 1959 when she died in Bromley, Kent.

Missing from our Memorial. by Neil Pittaway

The Bryant name has been in Rowledge since before the Parish of St. James was formed. Last October I related the story of Louis Smith Bryant whose fell in WW1 and whose name is on our Memorial. Had he lived, Louis would have been Sydney Bryant's uncle as he was the older brother of Sydney's father, Arthur. Like Sydney, they were born in Rowledge as was their father, James, Sydney's grandfather. Sydney lived in Rowledge until the age of thirteen and will have attended school here as well as playing in the village band. Another of Sydney's uncles, Harry is named on the St. James porch Memorial to those who served in WW1.

And yet Sergeant Fight Engineer Sydney Herbert Bryant R.A.F.V.R. does not appear on

our Memorial, perhaps he should?

Sydney Herbert Bryant 1924-1944

Sergeant Flight Engineer. 214 Squadron Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. 1851276

Sydney Herbert Bryant would have been the nephew of Louis Smith Bryant who I bought to you last October as his name is on our Memorial after he fell in WW1.

Sydney was born in Rowledge in early 1924 to Louis Bryant's brother, Arthur William Bryant and his wife, Elsie May Bryant, nee Cole.

Arthur and Elsie were married at St Andrews, Farnham on August 2nd 1915.

Father Arthur, a grocer was born in Rowledge on April 19th 1893. Mother Elsie May Cole was born on September 4th 1890 and lived at West End Farnham. Sydney was Arthur and Elsie's youngest child. He had a sister, Dorothy born in 1918 and a brother Arthur born in 1921.

At the time of Sydney's birth in 1924, his parents were living in Yew Cottage, Rowledge and Sydney was baptised at St. James on April 20th 1924.

According to Sydney's nephew, John Cripps writing in the Farnham Herald in 2002, Sydney as a lad was involved with his older brother, Arthur in the Rowledge Youth Band. He would have attended Rowledge School, the family then living at 4 Glencoe Villas on the High Street

In 1937 Sydney at the age of thirteen moved with his parents, brother Arthur and sister Dorothy to 12 Downing Street Farnham where his father opened a Grocery

Provisions shop and are shown living there in the 1939 Register. Sydney's father Arthur remained at 12 Downing Street until his death in 1952 although neither he nor his wife, Elsie ever regained their health after the loss of Sydney. Both fell terminally ill on or very near the anniversary of Sydney's death.

When WW2 broke out in 1939, Sydney was just fifteen but as soon as he was old enough, he joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. His service number was 1851276. In November1943 he qualified as a Sergeant Flight Engineer and from January 1944was part of an eight-man crew flying B17 bombers with the 214 Squadron. He was learning to fly these aircraft and was classified as a co-pilot.

The photograph below shows Sydney on the left prior to his sergeant status with his brother Arthur (with Pilot Wings) and sister Dorothy. Arthur survived WW2, eventually flying Typhoon fighters with 198 Squadron and died in 2009 seven years after sister Dorothy.

On 21st June 1944 Sydney's B17 crew were sent on a clandestine sortie and were returning home over Holland when they were shot down near Nijmegen at 01.15 am on June 22nd by a German Night Fighter.

The photograph above taken secretly by a Dutch Civilian shows German Military personnel working at the plane's wreckage.

Five of the crew perished including Sydney Herbert Bryant. He was just twenty years old.

Sydney was initially buried on June 24th 1944 near Nijmegen, Netherlands with the other four members of his crew who perished. Their Guard of Honour, who gave a rifle volley salute was made up of Luftwaffe personnel who also laid flowers on the graves. A wonderful gesture of respect for the loss of fellow airmen especially coming three weeks after the D Day invasion.

After the war the five men were finally laid to rest at the Uden War Cemetery Noord-Brabant.

Sydney Herbert Bryant has a Memorial Headstone at Uden which is engraved at his family's request:

'THEY SHALL GROW NOT OLD, AS WE THAT ARE LEFT GROW OLD' WE SHALL REMEMBER YOU

One of the crew survivors, Air Gunner Sergeant Sparks, visited Sydney's parents at 12 Downing Street and this is recalled in a Farnham Herald 'Peeps into the Past' for 26th April 2002 as related by Sydney's nephew, John Cripps. It was *titled 'Ghostly goings-on in Downing Street'*. It is too long to reproduce here in full and this is an edited version of the somewhat mysterious events that followed the loss of Sydney.

No doubt, like thousands of other bereaved families, the Bryants through various visits and correspondence set about finding out what had happened to their son and by the beginning of 1949 seem to have obtained all the answers, but then the year began to open old wounds.

Over a period of several months three reminders of their son's loss arrived. The first, a package containing posthumously awarded medals was followed by his flying log book which was believed to have been destroyed. Then, out of the blue one of the four surviving aircrew arrived on a visit. Air Gunner Sgt. Tom Sparks, who had been ordered to bail out, had been captured and spent the rest of the war as a prisoner.

As one of the last to see their son alive, the Bryants insisted on him staying overnight and they put him in the guest room which contained family photographs, a piano and other furniture. Following an evening meal and listening to Sgt. Sparks' memories of the

night of 22nd June 1944, the Bryants retired to bed only to be awakened three hours later by the sound of crashing. They found Sgt. Sparks standing in his doorway somewhat shaken. He told is hosts that someone woke him just before all the photographs on the wall fell off and those on the piano had jumped off.

Surprisingly none of the photographs were damaged and after some conjecture as to what had happened all returned to bed. The rest of the night was quiet and at breakfast it was decided that traffic in Downing Street had shaken the photographs loose, although no one recalled hearing any.

The incident was forgotten until a few weeks later when the family retold the story to a friend it was realised that the photos had fallen at 01.15 am, the time that Sydney's aircraft crashed. It was also noticed by others that the guest room sometimes felt strangely cold. Sgt. Sparks made one more visit but declined to stay in the same room overnight.

Whatever the explanation behind the events of that June 1949 night in relation to the night of June 22^{nd} 1944, it is not so easy to dismiss as coincidental the dates on which the Bryants died.

After the shock and pain of losing his son, Mr Bryant was never a well man again and he fell seriously ill on June 22^{nd} 1952, dying six days later. Mrs Bryant who lived on for many years was taken ill in the middle of June 1977 and died on June 23^{nd} 1977, like her husband before her she never recovered from her son's death on June 22^{nd} 1944.

Sydney Herbert Bryant was certainly 'One of the Fallen of Rowledge' as well as Farnham.



He is remembered on the Farnham War Memorial in Gostrey Meadow and also, as seen here, on his parent's grave at the Green Lane cemetery. As a true son of Rowledge maybe he should have his name on our Memorial?

It has been a difficult couple of years for all of us but especially for our young people. They had been ready to take the leap of increased independence only to be forced to stay indoors missing out on essential teenage milestones. The youth group as we knew it came to an abrupt stop and mental health seemed to decrease amongst so many.





My heart leapt with joy however, as this week the church was flooded once again with the sound of young people piling through the doors to raid our food supplies, play games and to learn more about faith and love through the eyes of Jesus.

We spent time looking at a very famous passage in the Bible (1 Corinthians 13: 4-8a) that says, "Love is patient and kind. Love is not jealous, it does not boast, and it is not proud. Love is not rude, is not selfish, and does not get upset with others. Love does not count up wrongs that have been done. Love is not happy with evil but is happy with the truth. Love patiently accepts things. It always trusts, always hopes, and always remains strong. Love never ends."

As humans, we will never be able to reach this level of perfection where we trust unconditionally, are never jealous and always has hope, but this is the love that God has for us and we can do our best to treat ourselves and others with this love.

With that in mind, #hungry came up with commitments that the leaders and young people are making to one another during our Wednesday night sessions. We hope that you will also use these commitments in your own lives whether it's face-to-face interactions or on social media.

#hungry Commitments

#hungry leaders and young people will:

- Show respect to people and not discriminate against people on grounds of disability, wealth, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, learning disability, mental health, different ways of learning, or sexuality.
- Be kind (you never know what someone is going through).
- Stand up for injustice.
- Listen well.
- Be patient.
- Be forgiving and be forgiven.
- Keep #hungry a safe space.
- Snack.
- Use Jesus as an example of how to live our lives.
- Encourage each other in the highs, support each other in the lows and pray for each other always.


Book Review from Clare Chardin

Take this Bread by Sara Miles

I've spoken previously of the importance of the Eucharist – Holy Communion - in my own life, but never as powerfully as this author.

I was, temporarily, less active after surgery on my foot earlier this summer (though not relieved of household duties!) and came to this dense book finding it a real page-turner.

It's an account of her life in faith. Her grandparents had been missionaries, but she was raised in a family which disregarded it. The author discovered faith, not in Sunday School, Youth Camp, College or even in her

daring early life as a war-journalist, but one day, in'mid-life', walking into a church in San Francisco (St Gregory's) and taking the bread into her hand, and Jesus into her soul, in Communion.

Nothing in her life, as a researcher, war journalist, restaurateur, organiser and activist in Nicaragua, El Salvador, the Philippines and South Africa had prepared her for the change that this brought about in her life, even the birth of her daughter. She had come into contact with and sought guidance from the church leaders and other faithful who

underpinned the revolutionary movements where she had been working. She had observed the influence the peoples' faith had in their belief in freedom – but she had not been 'touched' by Jesus to follow and serve Him.

Sara found her way, her truth and her light in that community. Her work 'to pay the bills' as a writer, left her restless for more. Walking her daughter to school with her (now female) partner they encountered the City's poor, hungry, disenfranchised, criminal, drug dealers and dependent. They needed to be fed, just as those five thousand, who had listened to Jesus' teaching that day. Jesus told his disciples 'You feed them'.

Sometime later a leaflet dropped into her door about a 'church pantry' (foodbank) operating in the city. Sara decided to feed them. Her social circle of liberal professionals was at best bemused, or at worse hostile, as was her church.

St Gregory's was a traditional Episcopal (Anglican) community with a complex hierarchy of clergy, volunteer 'deacons', committees and congregation, many of whom attended for its musical tradition. It had a beautiful, newly restored building with a central communion table. Eventually opposition evaporated and a weekly pantry opened to all the hungry, or who had lost their way in life.

Every step, every expansion was a challenge. Fundraising was key: food was purchased from a central supply, not donated. This ensured consistency of provision. Volunteers emerged from those who came for food: many of those with a previous life of abuse or crime found a purpose in life. The work was underpinned by prayer.

Sara then linked with other socially conscious agencies to form a network of pantries across the city. Her work took its toll on her family life: her daughter and her wife. Key to her mission were two things: a deeply held belief that Jesus would want us to eat with strangers, not just those 'like us', that anyone, regardless of their knowledge of (or lack) of the doctrines or ritual of the established church(es) should share in the giving and receiving of Communion, that which 'fed' her in her endeavours.

Interviewed at the end of the book her final words when asked what she hoped readers would take away from her story are: 'I hope that readers, whether or not they are religious will be able to take away Jesus' message: *Don't be afraid*. That they will find ways to act; to feed others, to accept being fed by others, that they will be open to people very different from themselves.

I do agree, but nowhere in her account, driven as she was, does she give us an insight into her motivation outside the corporate, her personal relationship with God. Could it be that those of us who 'do' should sometimes stop and 'be'?
