himself. With a flurry of feathers, he landed on my hand, almost weightless, took the bread and was off again. He didn't wait to say thank you — or did he? I felt so privileged. That moment of total trust was thanks enough. Trust takes time to build. The confidence to someone doesn't happen in a flash. It is an act of faith. In trust we surrender something of ourselves to another person. It can be risky, but it enriches life.

And that was it. Our encounter was over. The robin flew away with his piece of bread. I went away with a smile on my face, my day was brightened by a flash of red, a snatch of bird song, and a moment of trust. Lord, help us to trust you more each today; to take the bread of life your hand holds out to us.



So, my dear friends, please keep safe and learn to trust more, this will make a difference, coping with life as it is now, or simply enjoying each moment. I pray that this little story gives you cause for thought, and just maybe help you to turn a corner in your life. God bless each one of you, Your friend and Lay Minister Ken.

The third temptation, verses 8 to 11. An alternative God.

Now the devil shows his hand. What he really wants is to persuade Jesus to worship and follow him and he is prepared to pay a very high price to achieve this. Jesus dismisses him and his offer. Away from me Satan! For it is written: 'Worship the Lord your God, and serve him only.'

We are not to be deceived however good the world looks at times. There is no other God, no other way for human beings to live in harmony with each other, with God and with his creation. He is our maker and God and the only one that we must follow and worship.

The temptation is over and verse 11 describes Jesus experiencing the very care and compassion that the devil tempted him to doubt as God's angels are sent to minister to his needs. So often we give up before this point because we don't see through the lies that the devil puts into our minds. God is asking too much, he doesn't care, you can have a great time without him. Hopefully considering Jesus' experience may help us to see straight as he did.

Dear Everyone,

As I mentioned a few weeks ago, the Garden Route Children's Trust of which I am a trustee, is running an online fundraiser. Participants set themselves a challenge to travel (walk, run, swim, cycle, whatever you like) a certain distance throughout January. The charity benefits from the entry donations and sponsorships and the participants benefit from the exercise! It seemed a good idea as I ate my way through the Christmas chocolates, but faced with a bleak, wet and windswept January day, my resolve was tested! Two things get me going each day; the encouragement of a small group of friends who are also doing the challenge and keep in touch through a Whatsapp group, and the fact that I have committed to the task publicly!

Most of us are familiar with the story of Jesus being tempted in the wilderness at the start of his ministry. The temptation comes immediately after God's public affirmation of Jesus as God's Son. Now Jesus embarks on his ministry but first he has to win the mind battle with Satan who is determined to deflect Jesus from his chosen path.

Matthew chapter 4 verses 1 to 11.

My Scripture Union notes stress that these temptations were specific to Jesus and his forthcoming ministry and that is true, but Jesus must have told his disciples about his experience with the intention of recording it for us, his followers. There is much here that Jesus wants us to learn too. Here is just a starter.

The first temptation, verses 1 to 4. An unreasonable God.

Jesus has been fasting as he prayed so, obviously, he was hungry. The devil exploited his normal human need suggesting that Jesus could prove his deity by turning stones into bread. The devil knows our susceptibilities all too well. He will always imply that God is somehow short-changing us or making unreasonable demands. God is not looking after you properly, use your power to supply what God has failed to provide, God shouldn't expect you to go through this. Jesus saw straight through it. Man does not live by bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God. Just at that moment, Jesus knew that he needed to hear God's word much more than he needed bread.

The second temptation vv.5 -7. A God who doesn't care Does God really care? Doubt is the devil's next tactic. Do something dramatic to prove God is all he says he is. The bible calls this *testing God* and Jesus is quick to respond with a quotation from **Deuteronomy chapter 6 verse 16**; *Do not* put the Lord your God to the test. If you look back to this quotation, it references an incident at a place called Massah described in Exodus chapter 17 verses 1 to 7. The people of Israel were travelling through the desert and had run out of water. They guarrelled with Moses, their God-appointed leader, accusing him (and, by implication, God) of bringing them out in the desert to die. Moses turned to God in prayer and God responded with a miracle providing water from a rock, but the place was named Massah, testing, because the people tested God saying, 'Is the Lord among us or not?' The people did not trust God to provide for them. They thought, because they could see no solution to their problem, that God did not really care for them. Christians fall for this type
