With the holidays over and the children back at school our thoughts are turning to Harvest. I have had an excellent year with good yields of raspberries, plums, runner and broad beans which are safely stored in our freezers. The apples and pears are looking good and will be picked over the coming weeks. I do hope that any of you who grow your own fruit and vegetables have had a successful year. I find it so rewarding to see the fruits of all the hard labour during the winter and spring in preparing the ground etc.

With Harvest in mind, both churches in Ninfield and Hooe will be celebrating the event during the 8th October services presided over by the Reverend Paul Frostick.

At a meeting of St. Mary's Parochial Church Council, it was agreed there would be Charity Sundays when members of the congregation could donate to specific charities announced several weeks in advance. The first of these will be during St. Mary's Harvest Service and the charities chosen are as follows:

- 1. WATER AID this is an organisation that provides technology amongst other things to enable communities in Africa to create deep boreholes to ensure that they are able to access clean water during periods of drought, which are becoming more frequent. We will have envelopes in church for donations to this worthy cause.
- 2. **BEXHILL FOOD BANK-** this organisation provides emergency food to the less well off in the Bexhill area and is supported by and manned by volunteers from the local churches. Please could you provide tins and other dry goods which can be distributed.

We very much hope that the policy of Charity Sundays will be successful and be the first of many to provide much needed help to those less well off abroad and in the local community.

INFIELD VILLAGE SOCIETY

The summer months tend to be a little guieter in Church Wood, which has enabled us to attend to maintenance and repairs around the village. Damaged notice boards, benches disappearing beneath brambles and flooding pathways have all received attention from our team of volunteers in recent months. However, in July we were asked if we could host an evening BBQ for the Methodist Church Youth Club. A few hours collecting fallen timber and twigs enabled us to all enjoy a most pleasant time adjacent to the picnic area. It was lovely to see such well behaved youngsters enjoying and learning about the woods.

Unfortunately holiday commitments prevented us entering a float in the carnival this year, but our stall in the marquee with numerous photos of our work throughout the woods through the seasons was well visited all day.

Regular visitors to Church Wood will notice some trees with fluorescent orange markings. These are usually diseased or unsound or are preventing new saplings from receiving light so are scheduled for removal. The resulting timber is usually put to good use in bridge repairs, levelling pathways or creating nesting areas for the wildlife.

It really surprises me that there are residents in the village who have never been to Church Wood. It is such a beautiful spot to just wander through, enjoying the sounds and the sights. It's so peaceful most of the time, and at others it's filled with laughter of children playing and families having picnics. If you are one of those residents, I really recommend you visit this wonderful asset of the village.

HRISTIAN WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION

This afternoon, September 13th, Joe, Jenny and Alison, fundraisers working for Pestalozzi International Village, came to tell us about the successes of the educational programme that goes on in Sedlescombe . Johann Heinrich Pestalozzi lived between 1746-1827, in Switzerland. He was the founder of what has now become an education charity that seeks out remarkable young adults with strong academic skills, from deprived countries, that with the help of furthering their power and potential can 'make the difference'. Each year 20 new students are found for a two year scholarship living at the village to be given a Head, Heart and Hands, all round education, a global perspective to help break the cycle of deprivation in their home countries and hopefully will have great achievements. One young lady dreams of helping the young people of her community to overcome poverty, homelessness and exclusion, as they build a new life in exile. She is from a Tibetan refugee settlement in India. Other students at Pestalozzi come from Belize. Bhutan, Indonesia, India, Nepal, Uganda, Zambia and Zimbabwe, all interacting and learning from each other, their differences in faith and culture.

To date, Pestalozzi village has given over 600 students this opportunity. It always comes down to funding, of course, as it costs over a million pounds to keep the charity in existence.

In our next usual slot of the second Wednesday afternoon of the month at the Ninfield Methodist Hall, Peter Doodes will talk about 'The Hooe Marshes and their part in our History'.

On Saturday 14th October we have an Autumn Craft Fair at the Reid Hall in Boreham Street.

Recipe of the Month

One Pan Egg and Veg Brunch

- 300g baby new potatoes
 ½ tbsp vegetable oil
- 1 knob of butter
- 1 yellow pepper, cut into small chunks
- 1 red pepper, cut into small chunks
- 2 spring onions finely sliced
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 sprig thyme leaves picked
- 4 eggs

Toast, to serve

Method

- 1. Boil the new potatoes for 8 mins, then drain.
- Heat the oil and butter in a large non-stick frying pan, then add the courgette, peppers, potatoes and a little salt and pepper. Cook for 10 mins, stirring from time to time until everything is starting to brown. Add the spring onions, garlic and thyme and cook for 2 mins more.
- Make four spaces in the pan and crack in the eggs. Cover with foil or a lid and cook for around 4 mins, or until the eggs are cooked (with the yolks soft for dipping into). Sprinkle with more thyme leaves and ground black pepper if you like. Serve with toast. Enjoy
