Barbara Strevett, 1931 - 2017.

Barbara was born in 1931 and went to Hooe primary school where she was a little rebellious. She went to Bexhill Grammar school aged 11, eventually starting work at Herstmonceux observatory in 1948, where she quickly learned bookkeeping skills, putting them to good use outside of work, with local organisations.

Barbara took an active role in the Hooe Sports Club in the late 1960's, as treasurer, playing stoolball, helping run the Horse Show and also raising funds by running the refreshment stall at Hooe Vintage Car Rally and providing the Judges' and Ploughmans' Lunches at the East Sussex Ploughing Match. When she finished playing stoolball, she continued by either being umpire or scorer and was formidable at both!

A keen gardener, she exhibited at flower shows around all the neighbouring villages for years winning many prizes, especially for her fuchsias. She also worked at the Red Lion shop and the Uplands Fuchsia Nursery.

Barbara followed in the footsteps of her father George in joining the Parish Council in May 1991, having been involved in running the village hall, as treasurer, since the late 1980's. She was able to comment thoughtfully on a wide range of topics and it was always wise to consider her views carefully. She was a forthright and valuable member of the Parish Council for over 26 years and her influence was exceptional.

Barbara was also a passionate and active member of the Hooe History Society, having given three fascinating talks about her life in Hooe, all with just picture slides for a prompt. She had so much information on the village and was always delighted to share it and recall people and events with complete accuracy, especially identifying photos.

Barbara was a well-loved and highly respected member of our community, as demonstrated by the congregation of over 200 that attended her funeral at Hooe Church. Her influence on the village has been immense and she will be fondly remembered for many years to come.

SAUSAGE & POTATO BAKE

Ingredients Serves: 4

- 900g potatoes, peeled and sliced
- · 250g sausages
- · 2 onions, peeled and sliced into rings
- · 1 (400g) tin chopped tomatoes
- ground black pepper
- · butter

Method Preheat oven to 180 C / Gas 4 and grease a casserole dish.

- 1. Line bottom and sides of dish with potatoes. Lay half the sausages (cut sausages in half lengthways if they're big) on top, then onions, then cover with half a tin of tomatoes. Season with pepper. Place another layer of potato slices, sausages and onion over this and add remaining tomatoes and season once again with pepper. Cover with a thin layer of potato slices, dot with butter and place in oven.
- Bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour or until potato topping is well browned and rest have all but dissolved.
- Serve topped with grated cheese. (I put the cheese on top before baking)

Ian Everest spoke to us in November on "Sussex connections in World War 1". This was lan's third visit to us this year and, once again, he did not disappoint, talking with great knowledge and enthusiasm on the significant Sussex contribution to the war effort.

December saw 29 of us gather at the Hope Farm Restaurant for our Christmas meal. This was a very enjoyable evening, the first time we have visited this venue. The full restaurant helped to create a pleasant jovial atmosphere.

Our talk on Thursday 18th January by Stewart Angell was on "Secret Sussex Resistance", about the Home Guard 'Auxiliary Units' of World War 11, made up of personnel drawn from local home guard units. Formed in 1940 they were to be the British Resistance, countering a German invasion by delivering guerrilla warfare tactics throughout their localised areas. Stewart started researching the Sussex Auxiliary Units in 1992 and, following extensive interviews with original patrol members and many hours in the field looking for the remains of their secret hideouts, his findings were published as "The Secret Sussex Resistance".

NAG February 2018 from the Chair

At the end of January 2018, Wealden District Council have no published plan for our village nor the district as a whole.

They "hope" to have a plan by March this year. A plan issued in Spring last year was stillborn.

We saw of a ghost of a plan plan at the start of 2017, but it did not have the necessary evidence to justify its housing numbers and was not put forward for approval by the full council, and we have been waiting since.

The New year waits, breathes waits whispers in darkness,

While the labourer kicks of a muddy boot and stretches his hand to the fire,

The new year waits, destiny waits for the coming" from TS Elliot Murder in the Cathedral.

Well - we in Ninfield wait.

For the last two years planning applications were being judged – not on a local plan but on National Planning Guidelines. As interpreted by Wealden planning officers, these national guidelines "presume" consent for any significant development in almost any site.

The "ghost" plan, had a village boundary suggested for Ninfield, which did not extend south of Manchester road but included the Ingrams 55 houses. In that "plan" the 20 acre field is within the new boundary with potential for 80+ houses.

So called "windfall" building i.e. not in any plan at any time but that just happen (hundreds each year in Wealden) are not counted in the total. Many other areas do count them as contributing to the needed total.

In Ninfield these "windfall" include 17 at Potmans lane, 3 at Moons Hill lane, and three other individual houses which are all outside the "perhaps boundary". Brownfield sites i.e. those with previous non housing development on them, are not being properly identified by Wealden, and they would all be potential "windfall" shousing.

For well over a year developers have held back from forcing Wealden to rule on their plans – soon the council will be pressured into making a decision, plan or no plan. We are still awaiting a decision on the Manchester road proposals. All of those would be outside the "boundary". So that's 159 thought officially desirable and 80+ more "requested" by developers.

The Next NAG meeting: No meeting until we have decisions from Wealden. If there is a major planning decision, or if there is a Wealden plan for our village, then be prepared to meet at short notice. Stay alert, Keep watch!

What? No central heating?

Wealden District Council has teamed up with National Grid and Affordable Warmth Solutions to help install oil central heating in homes

without any central heating. "We believe there are more than 400 homes in the District that still do not have it," said Councillor Graham

Wells, Cabinet member for Housing at Wealden District Council. "

This scheme is aimed at households in rural areas which receive some form of benefit. They are likely to be having to use expensive heaters and fires which will be failing to maintain a warm home."

Cold homes can aggravate existing health problems particularly if you are over 65.

Being too cold can increase the risk of trips and falls, as well as heart attacks and strokes.

Indoor temperatures should be kept to at least 18o c.

Through the Warm Homes Fund established by National Grid, Wealden is looking to install central heating in 40 rural homes. Half are likley to be owner-occupied and half the properties rented out privately.

Home owners will be fully funded; in rented properties, the landlord can expect grants for an oil fired boiler and other fittings which should cover around 70% of the overall cost. Contact

Another Saints Day in February is on the 24th, St Matthews Day, when according to tradition plants begin to grow. There are two rhymes for this day. One says "if it freezes on St Matthews Day it will freeze for a month". Another says "On St Matthews Day, sow both leaf and grass", and there is widespread belief that among our plants, the sap starts to rise on St Matthews Day.

But to end we mustn't forget Shrove Tuesday, or popularly known as Pancake Day which this February falls on February 13th, so do enjoy those mouth-watering pancakes and look forward to the next day St Valentines Day. But it is of course Ash Wednesday the first day of Lent, when it is said that "Marry in Lent and live to repent"
