The Hooe Open Group, Ladies Club, met on Friday 11th May to be entertained and enthralled by Brian Freeland, who is a veteran of the theatre, having spent most of his life in and around the profession.

In later life Brian Freeland has become a professional speaker, specialising in a number of areas of interest, including stories of life in and around the Theatre, Travel, as a member of the British Council, mostly in the Indian Sub-Continent, where Brian had made eight tours, representing the BC.

At the Club meeting on Friday afternoon, Brian gave a most interesting account of the life of women of the different Classes in Indian society. His talk was entitled Women of the Raj and covered the period from before India became colonised by the British, up to its independence.

Of particular interest was the attitude of wives of the colonial administrators, who mostly did not like mixing with the indigenous population or bother to speak even one word of the local language, thereby causing friction between themselves and the native population. It was said that if it was not for the British women, there would not have been a Mutiny.

It was altogether a most memorable afternoon, with a near record attendance.

After refreshments there was the customary raffle with some eight prizes on offer, rounding off the afternoon.

DID YOU KNOW ... that the present Hooe village hall was opened by Lady Idina Hythe on Thursday 21st November 1912. It was built by Horace Taylor, a builder in the village, at a cost of £300. The Chairman of the Parish Council at the time, Mr. John Edmund Brand, who acted as architect and Clerk of the works, said that he thought it would stand for at least the next 100 years.

# Recipe<br/>One Pot ChickenIngredients1 tbsp olive oil1 onion, chopped500g boneless, skinless chicken thighs300g small new potatoes425ml low-salt vegetable stock350g broccoli, cut into small florets350g spring greens, shredded140g petits poisbunch spring onion, sliced2 tbsp pesto

## Method

1. Heat the oil in a large, heavy pan. Add the onion, gently fry for 5 mins until softened, add the chicken, then fry until lightly coloured. Add the potatoes, stock and plenty of freshly ground black pepper, then bring to the boil. Cover, then simmer for 30 mins until the potatoes are tender and the chicken is cooked. Can be frozen at this point.

2. Add the broccoli, spring greens, petit pois and spring onions, stir well, then return to the boil. Cover, then cook for 5 mins more, stir in the pesto and heat through.

# I'VE BEEN THINKING AGAIN – BY MM

There was a young lady from Hooe Purchased seeds in good faith – like you do Took 'em home and she sowed 'em But alas, they were weeds – "Oh, boo hoo!!"

Well maybe I am exaggerating and I know I have grumbled before about seeds not growing so well of late. However, it is still worth growing plants from seed and a heated propagator really helps. As soon as the seedlings show, I move them to a light window sill, away from the heat or they become leggy. I have a propagator with seven separate trays, so moving plants on and sowing another tray is easy. When they have grown on a bit I move them to an unheated greenhouse.

Broad beans are very rewarding and also freeze well. I sow them in individual pots in the greenhouse mid-October and plant them out when they are growing strongly. I spoil them by covering with a fleece, then mesh until they flower the next year. I sow the favourites -Aquadulce and Aquadulce Claudia.

In September I sow onions, also covered over. Radar is a good variety and stores better than some. The loose leaved spring greens and dwarf green curly kale are useful as you can just pick a few leaves and they will keep growing on. Of the spring greens – Excel, Advantage and Hispi are lovely cabbages. I always cover with mesh or the wood pigeons and caterpillars will get them before me!

The pests don't seem to like Chard or perpetual Spinach much so I don't have to cover them. Also, I just tidy them in the Autumn and they keep growing. In April, I sow Runner Beans in pots in the greenhouse and plant out in May, those string wigwam supports are so easy to manage and last many years.

At the AGM on 16th May all of the above Councillors agreed to stay in post for another year, but the Chair pointed out that this was the last year. In May 2019 there will be Parish Council elections and at least two if not (more) would not be standing for re-election. There are currently seven of them doing the work of nine - the number of Councillors there should be for this Parish. So now really is a good time to go along and get involved. Please go along to the next meeting, 7th June, 7.15 at the Methodist Church Hall and find out more,

A planning application has been submitted to ESCC by Southern Water (SW) to upgrade the sewerage works at Hooe. The proposal is to build a new facility alongside the existing one and then refurbish the existing one so capacity will be almost doubled.

Ninfield has not been consulted on this as the works are not in our parish and information on the application was sent to the wrong Hooe Parish Council email address!.

SW proposes that all traffic movement to and from the site to be down Lower Street, approximately 30 movements per day for 20 months (That is for the new build, there will then be the refurbishment after that). Some of the items being transported will be oversize and need escorting! You can find the application on ESCC website under reference WD/806/CM. This will be discussed at the June meeting, meanwhile any queries please contact Pam Doodes or Jackie Scarff.

Currently most people do not know where the existing site is, as it is surrounded by high leylandii hedging which keeps the visual impact, noise and smell to a minimum. That hedge is being removed and as ESCC have a ban on leylandii it will not be replaced, holly has been proposed instead. The new building will be 7m high - much higher than the current one, but the big worry for Ninfield is the impact of traffic movement After the AGM and refreshment, the Annual Parish Meeting heard from many of the groups and societies in the village

Roger Saunders for the Village Society reported that they now had 30 members and had joined the Small Woods Association who offered advice, such as to clear a patch of undergrowth away and just see what happens, go and have a look! And a dementia friendly film show to be held which will be open to all on a quarterly basis.

As well as doing very well academically sport and music were high on the agenda as well with football trophies for both the girls and boys teams. Plans had been prepared and submitted by Pete Holland to Wealden Council for a new kitchen and toilets. The sad loss of Adrian Dommersen who had been Chair and booking secretary for many years was keenly felt as his expertise and knowledge would not be easy to replace, but Jane had stepped in and carried on with the bookings.


